25 To 35 Bushels To Acre Expected By Some Farmers

Rains fell Wednesday over almost all of Eastland County at just the right time for most of the peanut crop, as they have been doing all summer.

The result was that the peanut farmers went into September with the most optimistic outlook, on the whole, that they have had in many a year.

Instead of crops of 15 and 20 bushels to the acre, such as have been considered good in many a year, peanut growers were thinking in terms of 25 to 35 bushels to the acre.

And as to hay-one farmer said "We'll be floating in a sea of peanut hay, unless something happens.'



Austin (Spl.)-James E. Taylor of Kerens, former newspaper publisher and chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, resigned this week to become executive director of the Texas Motor Transportation Association. Governor Allan Shivers in calling a special election November 8 to elect a successor described him as "a leader in the Texas Legislature and one of the state's most able and earnest public servants".

As chairman of the Gilmer-Aikin Committee on education Taylor pushed its public education reform program successfully to legislative adoption over strong opposition. He leaves the legislature to head one of the state's major industry groups. It is the largest employer group in Texas and the second largest taxpayer, he said.

The new motor transportation executive is a graduate of Baylor University. He served two terms in the House of Representatives before the war, commanded a field artillery battalion of the 36th Division in Europe during the war and was elected Senator before he returned in 1945. The Taylors will make their home in Austin. Their daughter, Shirley Ann, is a freshman at Baylor.

In that BPR day (before paved roads) we learned the true richness and mellowness of our soil. Through the deep mud freight wagons heavy with casing were drawn by six horses, eight or ten mules, or by that many

oxen, and great was their toil To a restaurant just across the street from Ranger's railway station, a mule powered ferry in weather bad.

Carried passengers at two bits each, which for that short ride across the muddy road, one to pay was very glad.

During boom times, a well that flowed less than five or six thousand barrels of oil a day was considered by promotors and drilling contractors a well not so very good,

And a fair number of small producing wells were capped or abandoned, sooner or later to be hidden by tall, brown grass, cactus, thick brush or a mesquite or oak wood.

lot of new wells are now being put down and some old ones redrilled, no longer to be left

to just idly lie; scattered over the county are faithful old wells a plenty, still their daily allowables pumping. May they live on and never die. Now a well is permitted to flow only a limited number of barrels of oil each day-we have

state controlled proration. So these once abandoned, now valuable (we hope) small wells are being uncapped and cleaned out-they're in for a real reclamation!

And oil, won't you please still repose, as you did, in the same places or near around

Where with our very first wonderful, breath-taking discoveries you were found!

The wells in 1919 and before then that gushed in the most oil were near Ranger.

Its main street was so thick with Model T's, other cars, wagons, horses and mules, and even yokes of oxen, Mister Stranger,

That every day its traffic jam was worse than on any former Saturday (when all farmers and cowboys had come to town) and worse than any county fair or cattle auction day had ever been.

Cars and heavily loaded oil field supply drays in the mud would stick fast so others couldn't get past them; and to force their teams to pull harder, the way the animal drivers talked to and beat those poor horses, mules and oxen was a sin! Not far from Ranger is the Mer-

riman graveyard— Called the "Million Dollar Ceme

On which would-be oil well diggers though they tried hard, Were not permitted to drill or even to tarry.

So they got busy and bought up the surrounding ground. And planted their derricks on its fence line nearly all around.

U. S. Tax Collections Take Drop In Texas

AUSTIN,- Federal internal revenue collections totaled \$56,372,-072 in July, falling 9 per cent from a year earlier, the Universiity of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Income taxes declined 17 per cent from a year ago and withholding taxes dropped 9 per cent. During the same period employ-metn taxes climbed 7 per cent.

The First District (South Texas) reported a 20 per cent decrease from July 1948. Income taxes dropped 27 per cent from the previous year and withholding and employment taxes fell 18 and 4 per cent respectively.

In the Second District (North Texas) collections stepped up 1 per cent. Employment tax collections reported a 24 per cent hike over July 1148. Withholding taxes gained 2 per cent, while income taxes slid 1 per cent during the
