Mr. Snodgrass is survived by his wife, Mrs. Willie Pearl Rhyne Snodgrass, and six children; Mrs. Anna Faye Murray, Midland; Mrs. Lettie Sue Fox of Olden, Bennie Lee Snodgrass of Eastland, Willie Jack Snodgrass of the U. S. Army at Savannah, Ga., Harold D. Snodgrass and Dorothy Jean Snodgrass of Carbon.

Survivors also include five grandchildren.

Elbert Raymond Snodgrass was born in Tennessee, Dec. 1, 1886, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Snodgrass. He came to Texas as a youth and settled in the Carbon area. He was married to Miss Willie Pearl Rhyne in Jan. 1920, to which union was born six children, all of whom survive.

He served 25 months in the Army during World War I, several months overseas. He had been in ill health for several years and death came Oct. 27 after a short illness.

Funeral services for Mrs. Jane Welch, former resident of Carbon, were held at the Methodist Church Monday afternoon, with the pastor, Rev. Lively Brown, conducting. Burial was in Carbon Old Cemetery beside her late husband.

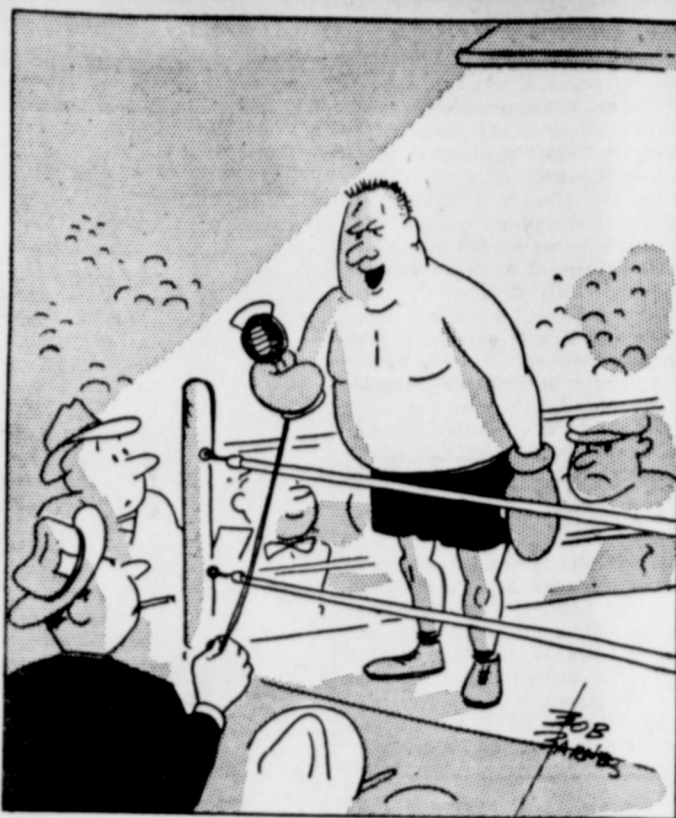

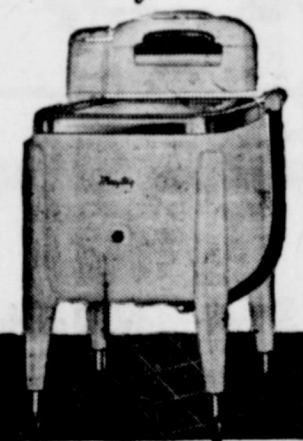

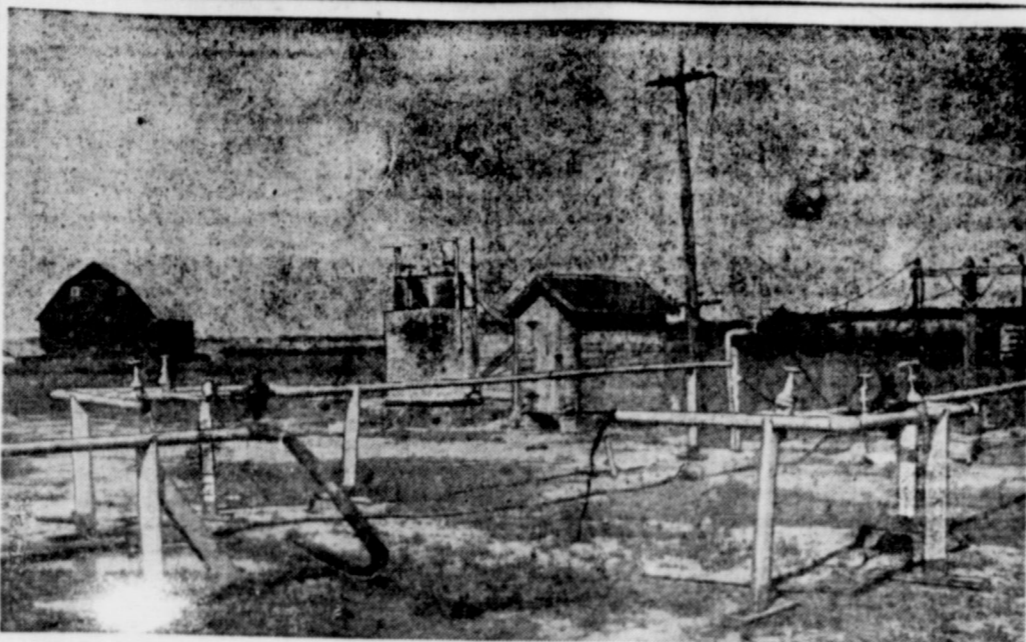

# SCIENTISTS UTILIZE UNMINED COAL



Electrocarbonization of coal produces coal tar, falling from the pipe (right center). This is a scene of the Missouri school of mines field experiment on underground electrocarbonization near Hume, Mo. Coal that has never been taken from the ground may in the future heat your home, cook your meals, run your automobiles—and relieve your headaches. Successful attempts have been made to utilize coal without mining it for the manufacture of gas, gasoline, coal-tar medicines.

FIELD EXPERIMENTS on underground electrocarbonization of coal are being conducted at the University of Missouri school of mines and metallurgy at Rolla, Mo.

The tests, being made on property of the Sinclair Coal Company near Hume, Mo., have proved the physical possibility of producing gas from coal in place by charging the seam with electricity. Researchers on the project say if the process proves through further tests to be economically feasible on a commercial scale, it will make large coal and oil

deposits available for use which have been unrecoverable in the past.

The method is intended to obtain the valuable constituents of coal, oil, and oil-shale deposits without actually excavating for the source materials, thus eliminating the "cost of mining" factor. Iron pipes sunk into the coal bed serve as electrodes and as channels for the escaping gas when it is generated. The gas produced in this manner is similar in quality to that developed by coking.

Equipment for the field ex-

periments includes a series of pipes through which the gas flows, a water collector which removes much of the moisture, a flow meter, and a heat exchanger, a tower used for cooling the gas. There is also an instrument building and a water rheostat for controlling voltage.

The mining department of the Missouri school of mines and metallurgy has been engaged in the project for about two years, the first year being devoted to laboratory research to develop the best technique for field work.

ended that. Sikes, incidentally, played himself one whale of a ball game.

The rest of the first half was mostly a kicking duel until near the end, when Eastland recovered a fumble at midfield. A pass to Larry Falls carried to the Comanche 37, and Co-Captain Glenn Garrett—Falls is the other co-captain—took a pass from Jimmy Spalding to the 23. Kenneth Williamson dropped a goal line pass and another pass was incomplete, but on the last play of the half, with time running out, Falls cut off right tackle, evaded a half dozen tacklers, and raced across the goal line. The try for point was wide.

Each side made only one first down in the draggy third quarter, but as the quarter neared its end King, Comanche back who was a standout on the field, took an Eastland punt on his own 35 and returned to the Eastland 27, and Comanche drove on down to the 20.

The Indians barely made a first down on the 17, and then Robertson wound up on the final receiving end of the old flea flicker play—a forward pass followed by a quick lateral—and went all the way. King kicked the point, and

that was just about the ball game. Not quite, because from there on in Eastland kept in the hole all the way as King intercepted two passes at crucial moments and Eastland staved off a Comanche touchdown with a stand down on the 4-yard line.

And on a final dramatic pass play, when Eastland had recovered a Comanche fumble on its own 7, and had time for only the one play, Garrett took the ball from Spalding on the 30, juggled it a moment, broke stride, got it safely, and was away out in the clear—but fell down on the 33 when he lost his balance from the contortions he had made in catching the ball.

Garrett, playing at end, was a warhorse throughout the game.
