Motor vehicle dealers bettered their year-earlier records by 41 per cent, while all other durable goods stores shared in the general downturn. Hardware stores were off 13 per cent from September 1148; lumber and building material, 11 per cent; furniture and jewelry,

1948, small sales increases were recorded by filling stations, 5 per ed by durable goods stores in cent; country general stores, 3 per cent; and office, store, and from August. This level was 9 per cent below September 1948,

Stimulated by back-to-school buying, apparel store sales increased 27 per cent from the preceeding month. Men's and boy's clothing stores turned in a 32 per cent elimb, and shoe stores registered a 31 per cent jump. Women's specialty and family clothing store sales were up 26 per cent.

Department store sales advanced 14 per cent over August; office, shoe, and school supply sales, 11 per cent; general merchandise, 10 per cent; and country general

stores, 7 per cent. On the other hand, filling station sales decreased 7 per cent from August to September, and sales of eating and drinking places slipped fractionally.





5. Blow your nose gently. If you don't, you may force infected material from your nose into your sinuses of middle ear and develope sinus trouble or serious ear in-

6. If a cold starts with chills, fever, or aching, or seems more severe, or lasts longer than usual, consult a physician without delay
