# **Thaw Agitates** Floods Threat

By United Press A late winter thaw melted the big snowdrifts covering the western plains today and the run-off into ice-jammed rivers threatened to set off major floods within a matter of days.

In many sections, the heavy snows that were measured last week in terms of feet were now being measured in inches.

Tiny rivulets of water spilled off the slopes, joined, and became dashing brooks that dumped their burden into major streams still locked in by thick ice from the prolonged winter's freeze. The Missouri river spilled over

the Millar Gear, Jones, Wynkoop, Schmidt and St. Benedict's Abbey Levees in Nebraska, Missouri and Kansas. The Jones Levee is only a mile below Rulo, Neb., which was flooded disastrously two years ago.

The Des Moines weather bureau warned residents along the lower Des Moines River to expect floods if the weather stayed mild. It warned of a break-up in the ice on the Des Moines and its tributaries, as well as along the Racoon and **DOUBLE OR NOTHING TURNS**

RHODES, Feb. 23-(UP)-Israel and Egypt will sign tomorrow an armistice formally halting their hostilities in Palestine, United Nations officials announced today. The agreement may lead to a settlement of the long strife in the Holy Land.

An announcement confirming the success of Dr. Ralph Bunche, acting UN mediator, in directing negotiations which produced an Israeli-Egyptian agreement, said the document would be signed at 10:30 A. M. (2:30 A. M. CST.)

The text of the armistice, a compromise proposal submitted by Dr. Bunche to the Israeli and Egyptian delegations, will be made public 30 minutes after the formal signing ceremony in his presence.

The 5,000-word armistice agreement comprised 12 chapters and three annexes. The chapters deal with military agreements for demilitarization and withdrawal of forces in the various areas of South Palestine, where Israeli-Eqyptian fighting flared sporadically from the expiration of the British mandate last May until early this

The annexes consisted of definitions of various terms,

and of an exchange of letters understood to relate to an exchange of war prisoners.

The armistice was the most encouraging development in Palestinian affairs since violence erupted when the UN assembly approved a partition plan on Nov. 29, 1947. The frequent flareups developed into full scale warfare last May when the British withdrew, the state of Israel was proclaimed, and the neighbor ; Arab states moved against it.

High hopes for an agreement had persisted here for several days since Dr. Bunche handed his compromise proposal to the delegates. Israel agreed to the terms conditional no Egypt accepting.



One informed source said the agreement was understood to skin over the knotty problem of Beersheba, one of the main obstacles in the final negotiations. The ancient city in the Negev was captured by Israeli forces to ward the end of 1948. Subsequent UN resolutions called on the Israeli army to withdraw to positions held before the campaign which began in the middle of October.

Egyptian demands for demilitarization of Beersheba met strong Israeli objections.

Everything was ready for the Armistice signing, Officials made no secret of their expectation, even before the Egyptians returned, that the ceremony would be held within a matter of hours.
