Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District of Texas was today selected by the Congress to fill the vacancy of the House Foreign Affairs Committee created by the death of the Chairman of that Committee, Sol Bloom of New York. Mr. Bloom, who was 79 years of age and serving his 26th year, died last week.

Congressman Burleson is young, both in years and in point of service in the House, to be assigned to such a position, but the gice of the Ways and Means nmittee, which presents such matters to the Congress for approval, has been a foregone conclusion for several days. Although the Delegation from the State of New York presented their own candidate for the post. Congressman Burleson was the choice of the majority.

Texas has not been represented on the House Foreign Affairs Committee since 1946, when Judge Luther Johnson of Corsicana left Congress to become Judge of the Tax Court of the United States in Washington, D. C. Burleson will now be Texas' counterpart to Senator Tom Connally(who is Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee in the United States Senate.

WASHINGTON, March 17 (UP) The Atomic Energy Commission was cleared today of charges that it disclosed atomic secrets in a recent annual report on its operations.

Chairmen Brien McMahon, D., Conn., of the joint congressional atomic energy committee said military experts had assured him they found "nothing objectionable" in the publication of photographs and maps contained in the report.

McMahon's committee planned to meet later today, however, to mu other charges that secbeen contained in an article in the January issue of Fortune Magaz- gram. ine. Like the atomic commission report, the article contained maps and photographs of atomic installations.

MEXICO CITY, March 17 (UP) -The powerful oil workers union has rebuked the government-controlled oil industry for granting American oil interests drilling rights in Mexico without consulting the union it was disclosed today

But the union notified Petroleous Mexicanos (Pemex) that it would take no action on the move until it was determined whether the foreign interests respected 'the sovereignty of Mexico and the interests of the workers."

The drilling agreement, reached a fortnight ago, gave a group headed by California oilman Edwin Pauley the right to conduct the first tidelands drilling operations in Mexican history.
