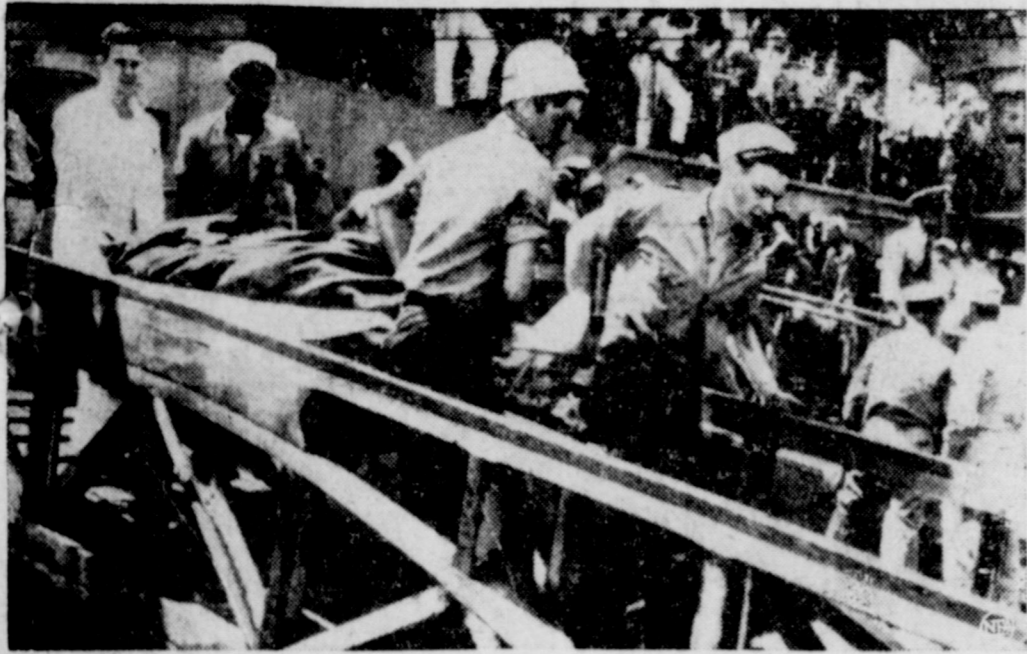

Girl Glad Saint Stopped Weeping

SYRACUSE, N. Y., April 16—(UP)—Eleven-year-old Shirley Anne Martin today said she was "glad" her broken statue of St. Ann stopped weeping.

The phenomenon ceased after a television demonstration Thursday. Shirley offered this explanation: "I think she's happy; that's why she doesn't cry any more," Shirley said. "Maybe St. Ann has stopped crying because it's near the end of Holy Week."

The Rev. Robert E. Dillon, chancellor of the Syracuse Catholic Diocese, said "it is certain that drops of liquid have appeared on the face of the statue when the young girl held it and kissed it."

"Whether this phenomenon is an instance of supernatural power at work has not been established," he added.

Thiefs Loots Freezer

KOKOMO, Ind. (UP)—Luther Howell is putting a padlock on his deep-freeze unit. While his family was away from home, a thief broke in and stole 40 pounds of meat from the freezer.

Planes Break All Previous Airlift Records

BERLIN, April 16 (UP)—Angle-American planes smashed all airlift records today by flying 12,834 tons of food and coal into the city in a dramatic 24-hour display to Russia that its blockade had failed.

The four-engined aerial freighters roared into each of western Berlin's three airfields at three-minute intervals from noon Friday to noon (5 a. m. EST) today. They topped the old airlift record of 8,246 tons, set only five days ago, by more than 4,500 tons.

In the final hour of the big push some planes were landing only by one minute apart. The total number of flights in the 24 hours was 1,398 compared with the previous high of 922. It was largely an American show. The British made only 272 flights.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay hailed the record as a "marvelous achievement" and a sign that the airlift can keep supplies on a level with pre-blockade shipments. He said that "given the aircraft we can maintain an average daily of 8,000 tons."

Meters Are Catches

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (UP)—Policeman Charles Szarkowski, who has charge of the parking meters, asked drivers not to use anything but money in the meters. An average of three of his 318 meters are broken or jammed daily and he found 100 foreign articles in a two-week period.

MISS VRAZ FREED AFTER FIRM PROTEST FROM U. S.

PRAGUE, April 16 (UP)—Miss Vlasta Adele Vraz of Berwyn, Ill., was freed from prison by Czech authorities today after a stiff protest by the American Embassy against her arrest last Saturday on suspicion of "political activities."

Government authorities notified U. S. Ambassador Joseph E. Jacobs that Miss Vraz, head of American relief in Czechoslovakia was freed in the interests of better relations between the two countries. Jacobs said, however, that Czech police still contend that she was guilty of espionage.

Jester Signs Salaries Bill

AUSTON, April 16 (UP)—Governor Jester signed into law yesterday a bill appropriating \$9,750,000 (M) for equalization aid to pay a deficit in rural teachers' salaries.

The measure, approved by the House and Senate this week, was sponsored by Sen. G. C. Morris of Greenville. The new law appropriates \$6,000,000 (M) for the current fiscal year. Three million will go toward a deficit which arose in payment of teachers' salaries in the fiscal year which ended last Sept. 1. Morris said the remaining \$750,000 was placed in the law as "insurance" for all claims.

Claiming it was unconstitutional, Senate opponents fought the bill early in the session. The House sent the bill to Attorney General Price Daniel and later it was redrafted.

Discovery Belated

BOULDER, Colo. (UP)—Mrs. Elsie Hohl had had her 31 year-old marriage annulled. District Judge George H. Bradford signed a decree ending the second marriage of Mrs. Hohl when she said she had just discovered that her first husband, Samuel Covey, was still alive. She had married Hohl 31 years ago, thinking Covey was dead.

WASHINGTON, April 16 (UP)—The Weather Bureau predicted "fair weather" for tomorrow's Easter parade in practically all sections of the nation. In a special Easter forecast, the bureau predicted possible showers only along the lower coast of Florida and in the Lake Superior area. The rest of the nation should have clear, cool weather with lots of sun.

DALLAS, April 16 (UP)—Shrinodome's top official, Galto-way Calhoun of Tyler, lashed out at Communism last night at Hella Temple's annual spring ceremonial. Calhoun said no Mason can be a Communist, "each Mason is committed to a faith in God and the American way of life."

The East Texan called on Masons to wage an active battle against all "lams." He stated: "support everything good in your community—its churches, its schools, its service clubs, its Red Cross drives. If the good things are fed, the bad things will go hungry." Calhoun urged all Southwestern Shriners to go all-out in support of the Imperial Shrine's 75th conclave July 19-21 at Chicago. He said the Masonic voice against Communism will be heard around the world as a result of the Diamond Anniversary Season.

Air Endurance Record Broken



TEHRAN, Iran, April 16 (UP)—Iran appeared today to be seeking a final showdown with Russia, her tormentor since Czarist days. Usually reliable sources said the Iranian foreign ministry has informed Soviet Ambassador E. V. Sadchikov that Iran considers the 1921 Iranian-Soviet treaty "null and void."

The treaty permits Soviet troops to occupy Iran if and when Russia feels its security is threatened. Sadchikov was said to have been told that the treaty automatically lapsed when Iran joined the United Nations.

UN membership, Iran maintained, automatically repudiates all treaties signed under duress. Furthermore, these sources said, Iran informed Sadchikov that it would complain to the UN Security Council if Russia does not ease its pressure on this country.

Sadchikov left Tehran for Moscow by automobile yesterday to deliver Iran's message to the Kremlin. He was expected to remain in Moscow only a short time. His wife remained in Iran.

(The Iranian embassy in Washington said it understood that its government regarded only article 6 of the treaty nullified.) Article 6 permits the Soviet Union to send troops into Iran under certain circumstances. The embassy said Iran felt the disputed article had been replaced by article 105 of the UN charter, which provides that UN members shall grant it privileges "necessary for the fulfillment of its purposes.")

The Iranian action follows increasingly hostile Soviet radio broadcasts alleging that Iran has become a tool of war-mongering capitalist interests.

The broadcasts seemed to imply that Russia felt its security was being threatened by activities in Iran, a development that under the 1921 treaty presumably would permit Russia to send troops into Iran.

There also have been sporadic border clashes in the disputed frontier zones between the Azerbaijan province of Iran and the Azerbaijan Soviet republic and between northeast Iran and the Turkman Soviet Republic.

County Seeks Cash Due From State Of Texas

Eastland County will join with 32 other counties in a meeting at Austin on April 19 in concerted effort to have the state pay its full share of the cost of operating the officers of prosecutors in the counties.

In total, the state is about \$1,000,000 in arrears. During the past 12 years the county should have received \$99,450.39 but actually received only \$60,300.

County auditor Don Parker and County Judge Lewis Crossley will meet with the representatives of the other counties in Austin Tuesday.

District attorney, Everett Grahman was supposed to accompany the county officials but could not be reached for confirmation Saturday.

YAQUI INDIAN LENTEN RITUALS NEARING CLIMAX

GUADALUPE, Ariz., April 16 (UP)—Arizona's Yaqui Indians danced a weird ritual representing worship at Christ's tomb today as their centuries-old half-pagan observance of Lent neared its Easter climax.

Music from goat-skin drums, pebble-filled gourds and crude flutes was slow and sorrowful, in contrast to last night's wild pagan dance following the re-enactment of the Crucifixion.

Tomorrow at sunrise, the Yaquis will chant a paen of glorification and victory as they march to the village Catholic Church, restore the statue of Christ above the altar and hear mass.

Hundreds of visitors flocked here to watch the celebration of Christ's passion, which the Indians picked up from 16th century Spanish missionaries. Some of the tribesmen set up cold drink and hot dog stands to serve the crowds.

The ancient ritual began Wednesday when a group of Yaquis representing "Los Fariseos" (The Pharisees) started a daily search for Christ, represented by the statue. Thanks to the betrayal of Judas, he was found last night in a cottonwood bower which passed for the garden of Gethsemane.

Then "Los Pilatos," or soldiers

Negotiations For Peace In China In Agreements

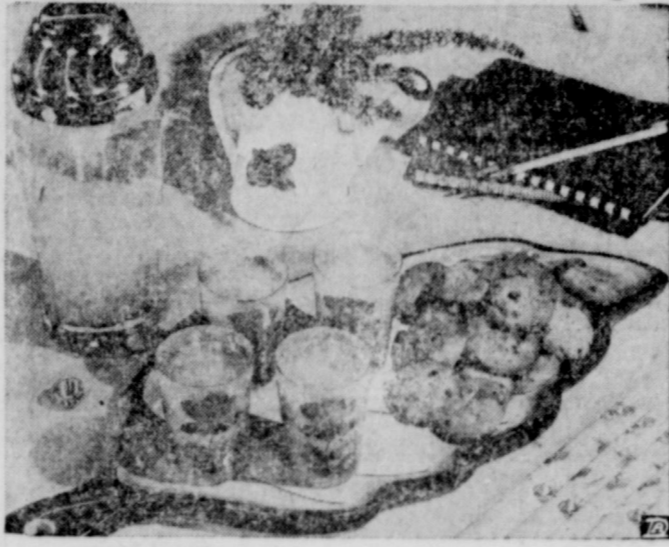
NANKING, April 16 (UP) — An official source said today that Nationalist and Communist peace negotiators at Peiping have agreed to revise China's constitution and political institutions.

MATAMORAS, Mex., April 16 (UP) — Border officials continued an investigation today into the mysterious movement of rifle ammunition southward into Mexico.

Some 287,000 rounds of .22 rifle ammunition were found hidden in 500 empty beer cases on a truck near San Fernando by customs officials Wednesday. The truck driver told agents he was just going to a brewery when halted on the Victoria-Matamoros highway.

The two occupants of the truck were returned to Matamoros for questioning and other rounded up in the investigation. One border official speculated the ammunition was destined for Guatemala, scene of an attempted uprising last week.

Ship Railway Plans Revealed

LOS ANGELES, April 16 (UP) — A Mexican government official today described a plan to build a giant "railway for ships" from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific, saving 1,600 miles over the Panama Canal route.

White haired Modesto C. Rolland, 67 year old director of Mexico's free ports, said frankly that he was here on a "drum beating" trip seeking some \$300,000,000 in American capital which he estimated would pay for the project. A regular canal across the Isthmus would cost \$5,000,000,000 (B), he said.

At the terminal points of Puerto Mexico and Salina Cruz, ships would be floated into huge bathtub-like boxes and run 162 miles across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec on as many as 24 rails. Electric motors would push them along at 18 miles an hour.

Under this plan it would cost \$1 a ton to transfer goods across the Isthmus in contrast to the present cost of \$5 for shipping

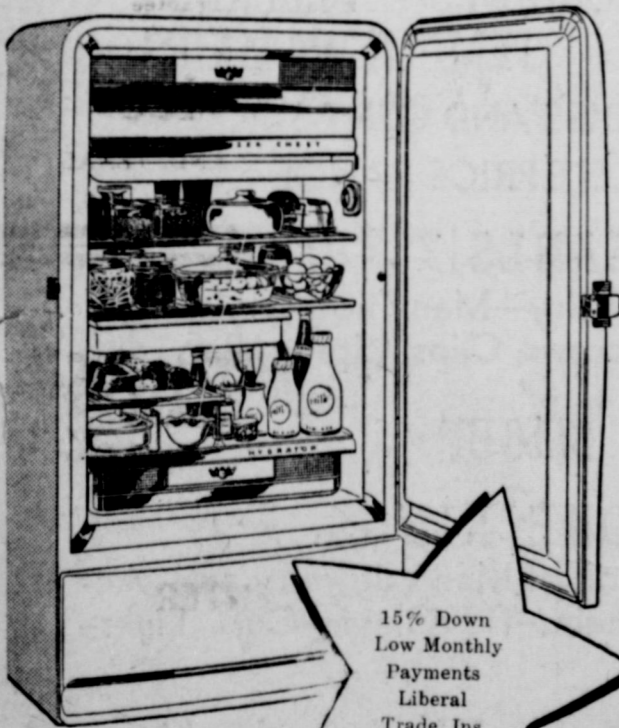

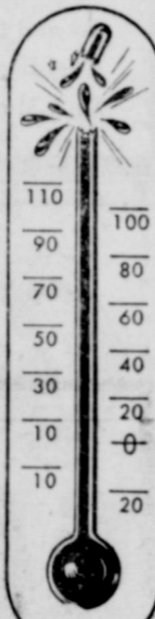

Yankee Meat Square



Lagging spring appetites will perk up at the sight of Yankee meat square with creamed vegetables, buttered asparagus, and spiced crabapples.

Add another tempting casserole dish to your spring menus by serving this Yankee meat square. It combines cooked cubed meat, enriched bread cubes, eggs, and meat broth or milk in a nourishing main course. This is not a fluffy mixture, but has more the consistency of bread pudding.

Yankee meat square makes a simple company dish, for the mixture may be pressed into a nine-inch ring mold. After baking, unmold and fill center with creamed vegetables. Buttered asparagus may be the green vegetable on the menu, with a needed spicy accent supplied by pickled crabapples.

Cubes of meat scattered through the square give "bite" and meat flavor to it, while the enriched bread supplements the food value with B-vitamins, iron, and food energy.

The bread cubes used in making this dish may be made from day old bread, but they should not be dry and hard. The meat square or ring is easy to unmold if pans are lined with waxed paper.

YANKEE MEAT SQUARE

4 cups enriched bread cubes
2 cups cooked meat, cubed
2 eggs
2 cups meat broth or milk, or liquid from canned vegetables
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Mix bread cubes and meat. Beat eggs, add broth or milk, salt and pepper. Pour over bread mixture. Mix well. Pour into greased eight-inch square pan. (Lining the bottom of pan or ring mold with waxed paper prevents sticking.)

Press firmly into pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes. Unmold, cut into squares, and serve with creamed vegetables or tomato sauce. Makes six servings.
