



PRICES AND PRODUCTION ON DOWNGRADE-These newscharts show now industrial production and prices declined in the first quarter of 1949, according to current economic reports is-sued by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System. Production is down from 195 per cent last November to an estimated 179 for April. The decline has been general, since activity has decreased in 13 of 19 industry groups. In prices, basic commodities dropped the most, while consumer prices show only slight reduction. Most significant decline this year has been in metal markets, with steel scrap and non-ferrous metals scrap down 40 to 50 per cent. The price support program for many farm products has prevented more marken declines in that field.




