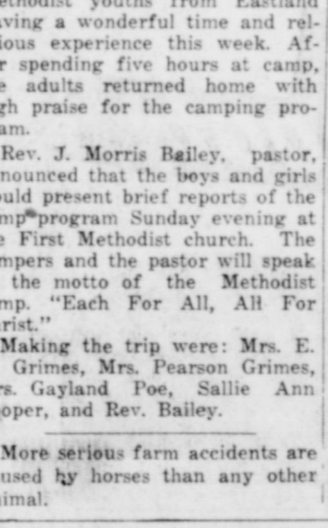

HOUSTON, July 28, (Sp)—University of Houston's five home football games will be televised this year.

Dr. E. E. Oberholtzer, president of the University, today signed the contract with Houston station KLEE-TV. Guy Savage, sports director of KLEE-TV will describe the games. Sid Balkin is general manager of the station.

The Cougars open their fall schedule against William and Mary college in Houston Sept. 17. The game will be the first collegiate football game ever televised in the Houston area.

Other Cougar home games to be sent out over the video waves are with University of Wichita, Oct. 1 West Texas state Oct. 15, Hardin-Simmons university Oct. 22, and Trinity university, Nov. 19.

KLEE-TV is the only television station now operating in Houston, telecasting on channel No. 2.

It will give those fans unable to attend the games a chance to watch the Cougars in action against some of the better teams of the nation."

He said whatever his committee decides to do will be disclosed next January at the NCAA's annual meeting.

The commissioners, promising to enforce the "sanity code" more strongly, announced American college track stars would participate in the 1951 Pan-American games at Buenos Aires.

Kenneth L. Wilson of Chicago, western conference commissioner, said plans were being made to fly the athletes to South American and also for American colleges to participate in a fund-raising campaign to pay the U. S. teams' expenses.

The 10 commissioners, representing the nation's major conferences, devoted much of yesterday's session to a discussion of television as related to intercollegiate athletics.

### Rosary Tonight For Former Champ

GLENDALE, Cal. July 28 (UP)—Rosary will be recited tonight for Vince Dundee, 40-year old former middleweight boxing champion who took the full count in his battle with the same incurable disease which struck down Lou Gehrig.

The veteran ringman, a victim of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis for years, was found dead in his bed at Laurel sanatorium yesterday. Doctors said the disease, which slowly paralyzes the spinal cord, should have killed him five years ago.

Dundee, who defeated Lou Brouillard for the middleweight title on Oct. 30, 1933, was told five years ago by specialists at Johns Hopkins hospital that he had only six months or a year to live.

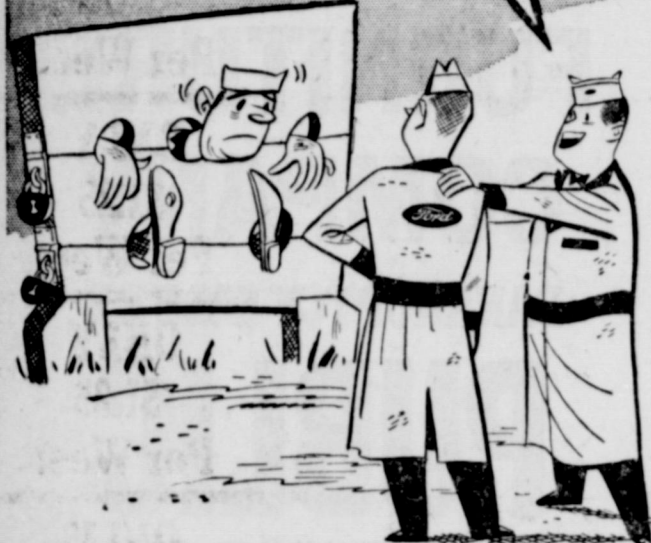

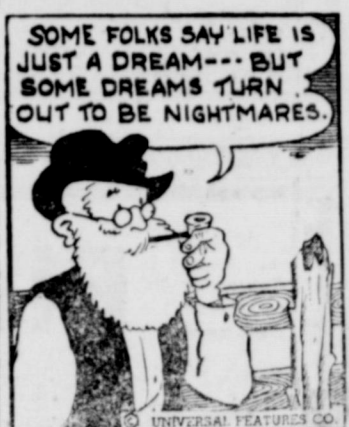

WICHITA FALLS, July 28 (UP)—The second polio fatality of the year at Wichita Falls General Hospital was counted today, with the death of a 14-year old Electra girl. Charlotte Trainer died at the hospital of bulbar polio. The earlier death was that of a 14-year old Archer City girl.

COMMERCER, July 28 (UP)—Northeast Texas' blackland cotton crop was threatened today by a serious shortage of insecticides to combat the cotton boll weevil and the boll worm.

R. A. Rix, head of the agriculture department at East Texas State Teachers College here, said dealers had exhausted supplies of the two main insecticides—D-D and DDT. He said the shortage resulted mainly from a heavy attack by the boll weevil and the boll worm.

CAMP HOOD, July 28 (UP)—Construction began today on 34 apartment buildings for the families of Camp Hood non-commissioned officers.

The 272-unit project will cost more than \$3,000,000 (M) and will be paid for by congressional appropriation. J. W. Bateson Co., Inc., of Dallas has the major construction contract.

CAMP HOOD, July 28 (UP)—The public was warned today to keep out of the Camp Hood impact area on week ends from now until further announcement.

Texas Air National Guard planes will practice bombing and strafing in the area. Maj. Gen. A. C. Smith, commanding general, said the activity would commence each Saturday at noon and continue to 7 A. M. on Monday.

AUSTIN, July 28 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers left for Mission last night, after clearing his desk of all measures left by the 51st Legislature. He planned to stay there until Saturday, when he will go to his family home at Woodville. He was to return to the capital Monday.

TEXARKANA, July 28 (UP)—John Henry Wilson, 42, of Comby, Texas, was crushed to death last night beneath the wheels of a truck. The truck was driven by R. B. McGrew of Houston, a driver for Anderson Pipeline Corp.

BAYTOWN, Tex, July 28 (UP)—The Texas & New Orleans Railroad station here was destroyed.
