## Wheat Harvest Week Away

Wheat harvest, 1966 version, is expected to get underway in the Parmer County area in a week to two weeks. "I believe we'll be started by the 15th (of June)," County Agent Joe VanZandt said this week.

This year's crop is expected to be every bit as good and possibly better than the 1965 wheat. The county average was 52 bushels per acre last year, according to VanZandt.

"We had spotted hail damage last year and that hurt our yield some," he points out. While this year's crop has escaped serious hail damage up to now, it has suffered to some extent from extreme dry weather conditions during the growing season.

"In most cases, it just wasn't possible to give the wheat all the irrigation it needed considering the lack of rainfall," the agent points out.

Weather conditions between now and harvest time will have effect on the yield, some farmers believe. This is especially true in case of hail.

"Barring hail, we'll cut a good crop again this year," seems to be the consensus of opinion of area farmers.

## Moisture Considered Ideal --

# 2.25 Inch Rain Breaks Dryspell

"Just what the farmer ordered." That is an appropriate description of the kind of rain which fell here Tuesday and Wednesday nights of last week.

The overall total for both nights in the Bovina area was 2.25 inches, with approximately half falling each of the nights. While the total amounts of moisture varied in the area, the rain was general in nature with all parts of the county receiving some, and in almost all cases as much as an inch.

The total south of Bovina was lighter than it was here and north of town. At Rhea, there were reports of as much as five inches and some hail damage, as much as 50 per cent in a few instances.

"This is the one (rain) we had been waiting for," commented one farmer after the moisture fell here.

The rain was considered doubly good because there was no hail with it in this immediate area. The moisture fell slowly, too, for the most part, allowing the thirsty soil to soak it up. There was little runoff.

Last week's rain helped to prove the theory that "if it's going to rain, it will rain by June." The showers started May 31, bringing to an end one of the driest springs in the history of the area. Total amount of rainfall for the year

had been .8 of an inch until last week.

Only a minimum of wind accompanied the rain. Some heavily-loaded wheat, nearing maturity, was knocked over by the wind and rain, but straightened in a few days and no serious damage was done.

All farmers were pleased with the rainfall. Some, however, said they needed "about that much more" while others were of the opinion that it would be better "if we can get our wheat cut before it rains again."

# McCracken Resigns As Chamber Manager

# Fed Program Aids Students

Otis Spears, superintendent of Bovina Schools, has announced the initiation of a new federal program in Bovina, the Work-Study Program.

The project is designed to give students a chance to make extra money to stay in school. Under the plan, students enrolled in vocational courses in the schools are eligible to work, under local wage scale, for any state tax supported institution.

Because agriculture is the only eligible vocational course offered in the Bovina Schools,

only boys enrolled in vocational agriculture will be able to take advantage of the new project. Students can work both summer and winter; in the summer the boys can work up to 180 hours per month, and during school, 45 hours per month.

Jessie and Wayne Stone are presently working part time in the schools; and Joe Meza, Jr. is working full time. Other applications which were made were rejected at the state level.

Washing windows, dusting, and maintaining school grounds are being done by the boys.

vote was considered light. Bovina had almost twice as many votes cast as any other one box. The total in the county was 740.  
 At Friona, in the Justice of the Peace race, J. W. Roberts defeated the incumbent, Walter Loveless, 142 to 103. Total vote at Friona was 219.  
 Parmer Countians gave an overwhelming majority of their votes to Crawford Martin over Franklin Spears in the statewide attorney general's race. County totals were 543 for Martin and 162 for Spears. Bovina favored Martin by a count of 269 to 95.  
 Except for the voting precincts which were concerned with JP races, the turnout was especially light. Total at Farwell, for instance, was only 38. Lazbuddie had 19 and Oklahoma Lane 10. The attorney general's race was the only one which voters in those boxes marked their ballots.  
 The total vote in the Bovina box in the first primary was 433. Thus, the second primary total was only 43 less than that of the first primary.

## Faculty Has 6 Vacancies

Of the 34 teachers in the Bovina Independent Schools last term, 28 will return for the 1966-67 year, according to Otis Spears, superintendent.

At this time he is seeking replacements for the following teachers: first grade, third grade, special education, junior high and high school English, and science.

Because of the large enrollment in the fourth grade last year, another fifth grade teacher will be needed next year. At times during the 1965-66 year there were as many as 42 in a classroom in the fourth grade.

Also in the high school, there will be a place for a combina-

tion Spanish and social science teacher who will coach.

Teachers not returning next year are Mrs. Margaret Renfro, teacher of special education, who has been rehired at Tahoka; Mrs. Bonny Ward, third grade, whose plans are still indefinite; Mrs. Kay Ray, high school English, who has moved to Stratford where her husband will farm and she will teach; and Mrs. Gene Douglas, high school science, who will attend pharmacy school at Southwestern State in Oklahoma. Mrs. Vernon Estes, who replaced Mrs. Leola Williams as first grade teacher, will also not return.
