### 35 Teachers For Eastland Schools Slated

Based on average daily attendance at the present count, Eastland Public Schools are entitled 1949-50 term, Supt. W. G. Womack stated.

Mrs. D. E. Fraizer of Eastland and Miss Louise Snoddy of Mesquite have been hired by the Board to teach in the grade schools this year.

Mrs. Frazier holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene she taught in Carbon Public Schools last year. Miss Snoddy has a Master's degree from Southern Methodist University at Dallas, and taught in Mesquite Public Schools for several years.

Following completion of the faculty, definite assignments will be made and announced, Superintendent Womack said.

The faculty will be composed as follows: 29 white classroom teachers, one colored teacher, one band director, two vocational teachers, one full-time principal, and one superintendent.

### Scholarship For District Is Awarded

BELTON, Aug. 4—Miss Patsy Josey, Sylvester, has been awarded the Fannie Breedlove Davis scholarship from District 17 of the Texas Baptist Woman's Missionary union, for the 1949-50 school year at Mary Hardin-Baylor college. Miss Josey was selected from a group of applicants in eleven counties in West Texas, which comprise the district.

The scholarship is awarded in honor of one of Mary Hardin-Baylor's former students, Mrs. Fannie Breedlove Davis, who led in the organization of the Texas WMU, and who aided in the founding of the South side WMU. She served as the first president of the Texas group.

Miss Josey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Josey, graduated in the upper quartile at Sylvester high school, and is active in school and church affairs. She plans to major in voice and minor in religious education at Mary Hardin-Baylor.

Each year seventeen scholarships are offered to girls in Texas, one each in the 17 WMU districts. A scholarship is also awarded to a girl in each of the five southwestern states bordering Texas.

Counties in District 17 are Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan and Eastland.

### SMITHWICK ORDERED HELD IN JAIL WITHOUT BOND

ALICE, Tex., Aug. 4 (UP)—Deputy Sheriff Sam Smithwick, charged as the murderer of crusading Newscaster W. H. (Bill) Mason, was ordered held in jail without bond today, pending action on the case by a Jim Wells county grand jury.

District Attorney Sam Reams indicated that he would demand Smithwick be put to death when the case is called up for trial by jury.

The windup of the preliminary hearing this morning was devoted largely to argument on whether the burly deputy sheriff should be given his freedom on bail.

State's evidence was presented Tuesday morning, and then Justice of Peace Brown Fuller granted a delay until today to permit Defense Attorney Henry Wilder time to decide whether to present evidence.

Wilder presented none. He argued that Smithwick should be granted his freedom on bond and suggested that \$10,000 "should be sufficient."

The history of Jim Wells County, he said, would show that no defendant in any such case had ever been given the death penalty.

Reams jumped to his feet and told Fuller that the statutes plainly prohibit the defendant being given his freedom in any case "where there is the indication that the defendant will get the extreme penalty."

And, Reams continued, "this is a case in which the jury would probably give the death sentence."

The evidence showed, the district attorney said, that Mason was slain as he sat in his car, with his hands up, pleading "wait a minute! wait a minute!"

Smithwick came to the jammed courtroom vigorously chewing a wad of gum. At the first mention of the death penalty, his jaws stopped working briefly, but a moment later he resumed his chewing.

He appeared interested in the proceedings, but not too concerned. The setting for the conclusion of the preliminary was the same as for its beginning Tuesday: an overcrowded courtroom dotted by numerous law enforcement officers including six Texas rangers.

In his unsuccessful plea for bond, Wilder, who is county judge of Liveoak County, addressed Fuller:

"It (the matter of bond) boils down to this -- it is a case of whether you, in your own mind think the defendant in this case will receive the death penalty.

"The records of this county will bear me out assuming that the facts are true—that no defendant in this county has ever received the death penalty in a similar case.

"Judging from the past history of this county, even if the facts are proven before a jury, it would not result in the extreme penalty.

### Waitress Body Mangled By Slow Moving Freight

RICHMOND, Tex., Aug. 4 (UP)—A 25-year-old Richmond waitress was cut to pieces by a Santa Fe freight train near here early today as she tried to lift her body from the path of the slow-moving freight.

Fort Bend county deputies sought the driver of a dark sedan which pulled away from the crossing toward Richmond seconds before the engine mangled the attractive woman, identified as Dorothy Murchison.

Engineer H. B. Pringle said he saw the woman raise her head from the tracks just as the train's headlamp lighted the crossing. The guard decapitated her and her left leg and left arm were severed. Her body was dragged 125 feet.

Just before Pringle made a complete stop, Conductor Carl W. Block saw the sedan speed away from the scene. Block said the auto returned while the train crew was looking for the woman's body, stopped a few minutes, then left again.

Sheriff's deputies said Miss Murchison was seen "quarreling" with a man before midnight in a Richmond tavern. Investigators were puzzled over how she got on the tracks and why she couldn't move herself when she raised her head and saw the train coming.

There was no evidence indicating she was tied to the tracks or ties.

The sheriff's office said the woman's mother lived in Texas City, which Miss Murchison left several months ago to work in Richmond.

Vocational agriculture has been approved as an accredited course for the 1949-50 term of Eastland High School, it was announced by Supt. W. G. Womack.

The approval was made by the State Vocational Department, Superintendent Womack said. A teacher for the course will be elected by the Eastland Independent school Board before school starts Sept. 6.

Efforts had been underway for the past several years to have vocational agriculture approved for the curriculum, because agriculture is one of Eastland's primary industries.

# NEW YORK MOBSTERS SUSPECTED IN ROBBERY OF AGA KHAN, WIFE

NICE, France, Aug. 4 (UP)—Police said today they believed the daring \$600,000 daylight robbery of the Aga Khan and his beautiful French wife may have been masterminded by New York mobsters.

A transatlantic police alarm

for the four masked bandits, along with a full description of the 43 pieces of loot taken from the Aga Khan's wife, the Begum, was cabled to police in America.

Insurance investigators who flew from Britain to the Riviera are exploring the possibility that the gems may have been placed aboard a ship or plane enroute to the United States.

The American mobsters who staged the stick-up of the fabulously wealthy Aga Khan may have been among those known to be vacationing on the Riviera or those deported from the United States.

Police said they believed the robbery of the Aga Khan yesterday was conceived by the same

master mind who ordered the \$600,000 looting of the Van Cleef and Arpels Jewelry house in the northern resort town of Deauville just 24 hours earlier.

The four men who held up the Aga Khan were masked with dark glasses and they made their getaway in a stolen car in the New York manner.

Insurance investigators were under orders to locate the Begum's gems before some of the priceless pieces were broken up to be sold.

"Most of them are too big and well-known to be sold intact," the Begum said.

The twisting roads of the Cote D'Azur swarmed today with scores of police on patrol and manning road blocks, but avenues of escape were almost limitless for the four bandits.

They abandoned their car a fast front-wheel drive Citroen sedan, in the streets of Cannes a few hours after the robbery. It had been stolen in Paris several days ago.

The jagged coast of the Cote D'Azur is broken by many smuggler's caves where the bandits could have concealed a getaway speedboat. The hills back of the Riviera are among the wildest in Europe. The Nice airport is only a few miles from the holdup scene outside the Aga's villa.

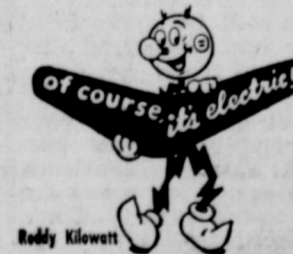
