By United Press The cool spell which has lingered over Texas for a week will hang a little longer, the Dallas Weather Bureau predicted today. Yesterday was one of the coolest days of the summer in the Big Bend country where the maximum was only 65 degrees at Guada-lupe Pass and Marfa.

Overnight, the mercury dipped to blanket weather with Guadalupe Pass reporting a minimum of 53 degrees. It was 56 early today at Salt Flat, 58 at Van Horn Amarillo and Dalhart, 59 at Presi dio and El Paso, 72 at Dallas and 74 at Brownsville. Most readings this morning were in the 60s low 70s.

Yesterday's high was 95 de grees at Laredo bpt Persidio, usally a hot spot, had a maximum of only 78 degrees.

Rainfall was scattered. Here are some of the reports: Beaumont .62 inch; Ozona .60; Austin and Corpus Christi .28, and Persidio .16.
