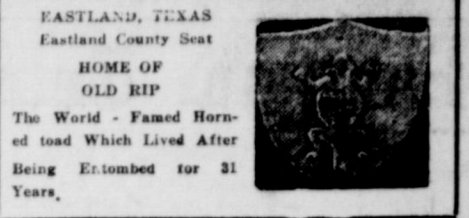

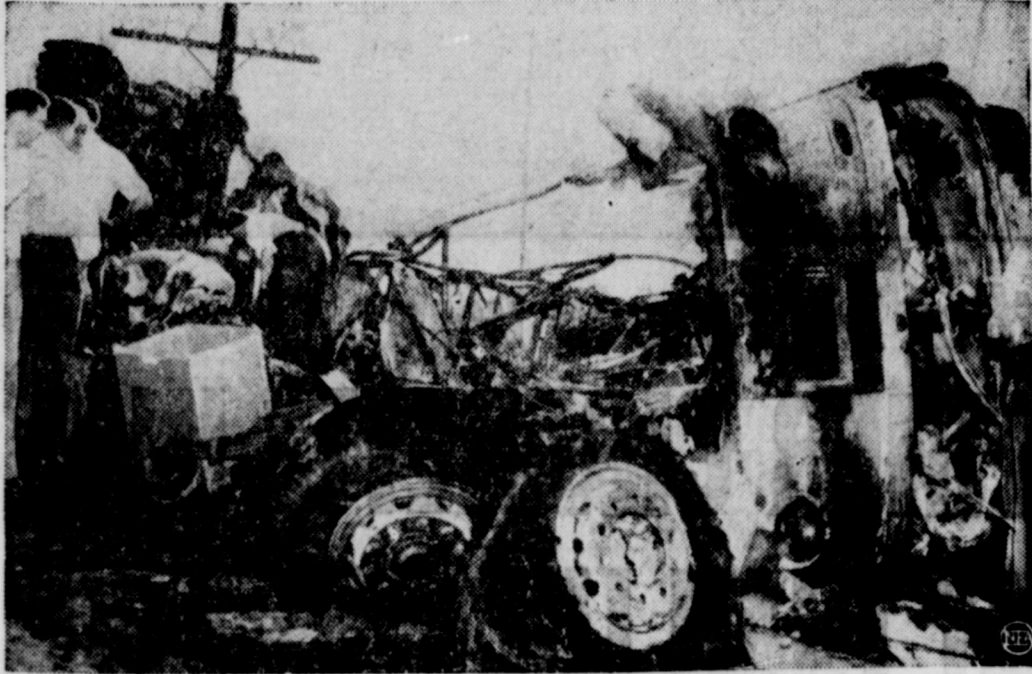

Three Killed In Midnight Crash

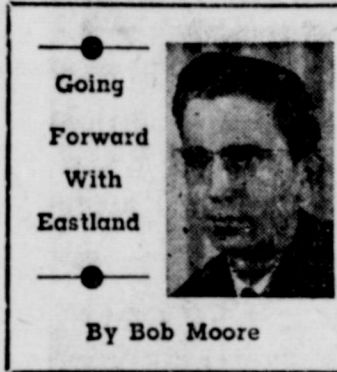

Large Turn Out At Polls Asked For Election Here

A large turnout at the polls is urged by school authorities for an election to be held Saturday, Aug. 13, to adopt a unified tax not to exceed \$1.50 per \$100 valuation for the Eastland Consolidated Independent School District, and to assume the bonded indebtedness of all incoming districts and for the districts to assume the outstanding indebtedness of the Eastland District.

White's Auto Sale Saturday

R. V. David of San Angelo has announced that a liquidation sale will be held at White's Auto Associate Store, formerly operated by Tony Falletti, beginning Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

He said he would agree to the \$1,450,000,000 total only if spending were spread over a two-year period.

Senate Republican Leader Kenneth S. Wherry, Neb., said that he can't see "any difference between half cash and half contract authority."

"They're just trying to water it down," he said. "There just isn't any difference if they obligate it all this fiscal year, whether its cash or contract authority."

In other congressional developments, "Five Per Center" investigators set out to discover whether Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughn, President Truman's Military Aide, was linked to the incident that led the army to suspend Maj. Gen. Alden H. Waitt, Chief of the Chemical Corps.

B-36—Rep. James E. Van Zandt R., said the Air Force's defense of its B-36 procurement program so far has been nothing more than a "sales talk" and a "good story." But, he said, it has raised "suspicions" about Air Force relations with Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp., manufacturer of the giant plane. Van Zandt touched off the inquiry by airing reports of political intrigue in connection with Air Force policy toward the B-36.

Minimum Wage—House members were trying to decide who won the fight over the minimum wage bill. Each Faction—Administration Democrats, Southern Democrats and Republicans—found something to crow about in the tentative decision to approve a 75-cent floor bill that would exempt about 1,000, 000 workers now covered by the wage-hour act. A final formal vote on the measure was due today.

Clark—Hearings on the nomination of Attorney General Tom C. Clark to the Supreme Court were scheduled to wind up today under Chairman Pat McCarran, D., Nev., refused to say when his Senate Judiciary Committee would vote. The nomination has received bitter criticism from leftwing organizations.

Hoover—GOP Congressmen reacted to former President Herbert Hoover's warning that the nation is headed toward collectivism with new demands for cuts in taxes and government spending. Senate Republican Leader Kenneth S. Wherry, Neb., said, "our only out is to cut the budget." Rep. Charles A. Halleck, Ind., GOP Floor Leader in the 80th congress, added that "reckless extravagance high taxes and the continued march toward Socialism threaten the security of our Republic."

Martine—Rep. Francis Case, R., S. D., charged that the Maritime Commission "has been guilty of amazing waste and extravagance" in fixing shipbuilding subsidies. An investigation by the House Expenditures Committee, Case said, showed that the commission has been "flouting the law." The committee is studying charges by the general counting office that the commission went at least \$25,000,000 too high when it set subsidies for six ships at \$80,000,000.

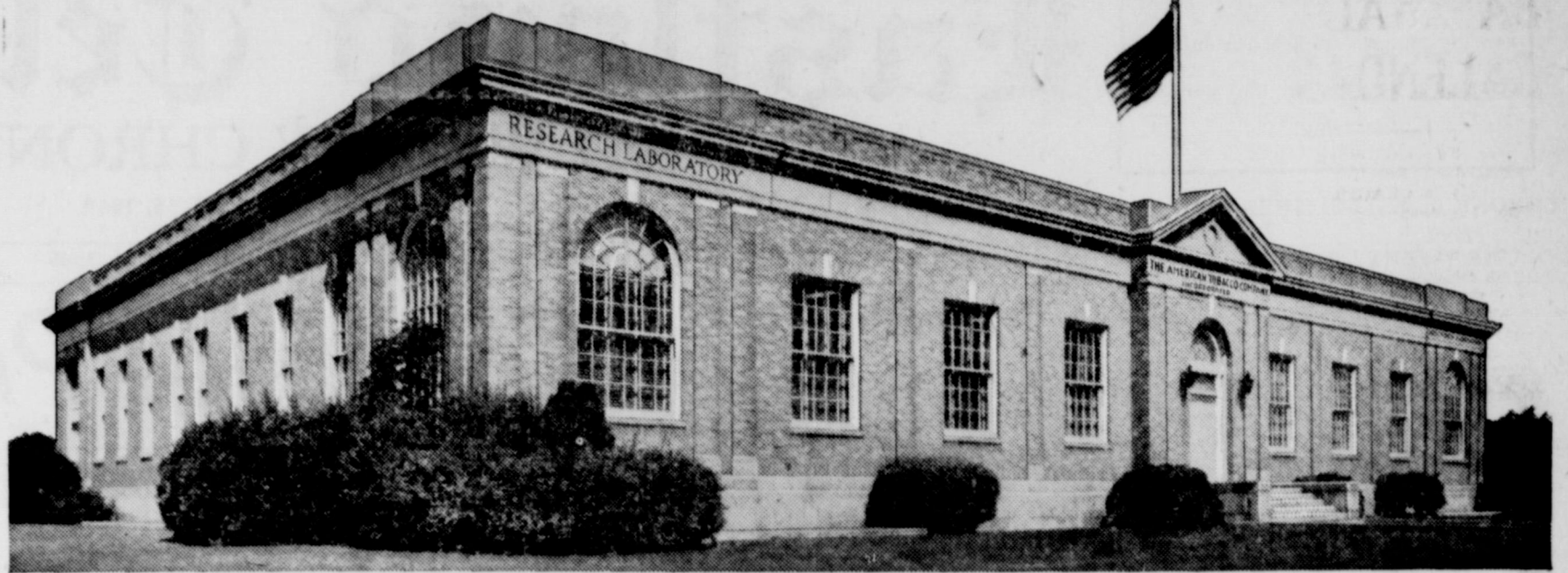

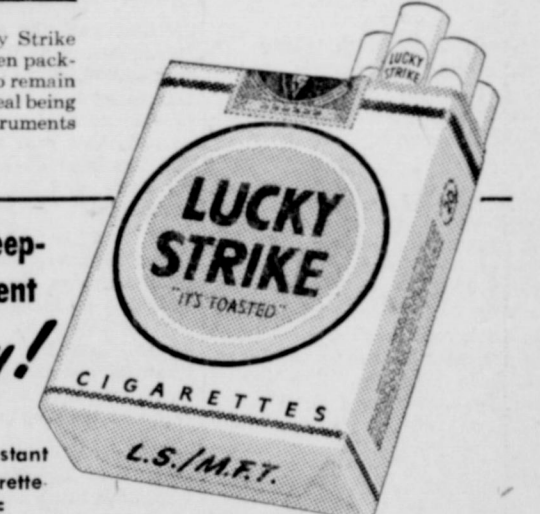

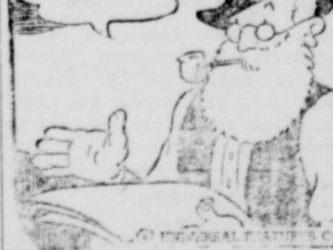

Boy Dies After Dramatic Race

HOUSTON, Aug. 11 (UP)—A dramatic 150-mile race against death failed this morning. Three-year-old, curly-haired David Baldree, son of a Hearne cotton picker, died at 5:30 A. M. in a Houston hospital, 14 hours after an ambulance had made the dash from Hearne to get the child into an iron lung. David last week was treated for a sore throat and only yesterday was diagnosed definitely as a polio patient. Oxygen was administered during the two-hour trip here, but as the ambulance neared Houston, the oxygen supply gave out & the final miles were covered with the youngster gasping for breath. David's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Baldree, moved a week ago from Elgin to a farm near Hearne.

Chemicals Blamed For Sickness

GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 11 (UP)—Chemicals used in fumigating grain were blamed today for a mysterious Malady which has stricken more than 150 longshoremen here. All the men had worked in the hold of the SS Lipscomb Lykes, loading grain sorghum. None of those who became ill were in serious condition.

Assault Rules A Heavy Favorite

BOSTON, Aug. 11 (UP)—King Ranch's Assault, the world's fourth leading money winning horse, will rule a heavy favorite Saturday when a field of six probable starters parade to the post at Suffolk Downs for the \$50,000 added Massachusetts handicap. Assault, triple crown winner in 1946, has earned \$41,400 so far this year to bring his total earnings to \$668,020.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Aug. 11 (UP)—A 16-year-old youth was returned today to the state training school for boys, following the death of a Fort Worth laundry worker. It was the third trip to the Gatesville school for the youth, whose parole was revoked this week after the death of A. J. Dean 37. Social Security Program Grows

SOCIAL SECURITY IS — There are now more than 90 million holders of social security cards, representing Federal insurance accounts," said Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Social Security Administration. This makes the Federal social security program the largest single group insurance effort on earth.

Although the Social Security Administration keeps an individual account on each worker, taxes are withheld by the employer, and only one tax report per quar-

ter is made by each firm. One such report will contain from one to several thousand names. This large group handling of employee records lowers the per unit cost.

This pooling of the risks of dependency in old age and at death among millions of citizens, plus the savings from economical administration explain in part the high individual benefits paid in comparison to individual taxes paid.

It also helps explain why the law does not provide for selection of risks. There is no need to exclude a person of poor health when so many are in the system.

Explosion Rocks Newspaper Plant

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Aug. 11 (UP)—An explosion on the North side of the strike ridden Springfield News Leader early today rocked the press plant of the news paper and shattered three huge glass windows which separated the plant from the street.

Police said the explosion was probably caused by a half stick of dynamite placed on the outward side of the building on the sidewalk. The blast occurred at 3:49 A. M.

Shattered glass from the three 16 by 4 feet panes crashed into the plant and slivers of the glass fell into intricate machinery of the newspaper's seven unit press but no one was injured.

Newspaper officials said a check is being made to determine if any serious damage was done to the presses. They said there will be no interruption of the newspaper's service. The afternoon edition of the morning and evening paper will be published as usual.

There was no indication that members of the striking International Typographers Union were implicated in the incident or were even aware of the occurrence. Police pointed out, however, that there have been several clashes between strikers and non-strikers since the strike was called early in June.

The explosion occurred several hours after the morning edition of the paper, the Springfield

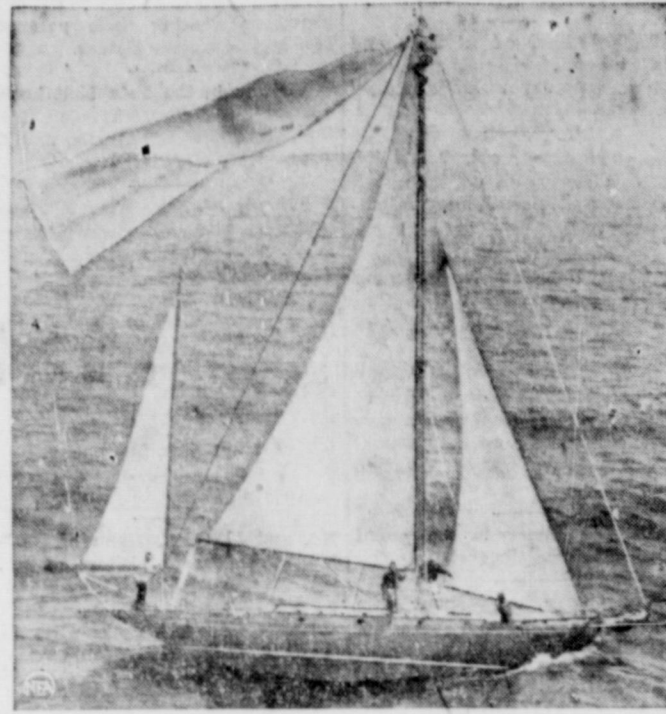

Rock Movement Causes Blowout

JEFFERSON, Tex. Aug. 11 (UP)—A million cubic feet of gas is escaping daily from cracks in earth caused by an underground rock movement near Black Cypress Bayou, Geologist Dave Flesh said today.

"Of course that's not much," said Flesh, "but if it's from the same reservoir, it will draw gas off the Jefferson Field and drop the pressure."

Water wells which had been dry 15 years begin to flow again last Monday when a massive movement of deep rock formations caused a gas blow out in a slough near the Bayou.

Large stones were catapulted into the air by the pressure of gas spewing through underground channels. Great sections of soil were tossed upon three tops.

Gas also turned crayfish holes into miniature geysers.

Curious onlookers, assured the area was not dangerous set fire to one of the crayfish holes, but nothing happened. But Sheriff Joe Riggs ordered his men to flare the gas wherever it was leaking to prevent an accumulation which would set off a major explosion.

Flesh, one of the men who discovered the highly productive Jefferson Well in 1937, said that small fissures had appeared in the earth's surface three to four miles surrounding the blowout.

He explained that a slippage had occurred along the old fault line and gas had built up such a tremendous pressure that it finally forced its way to the earth's surface.

The blowout left a hole about 400 yards long and 100 yards wide in the bottom of the slough.
