50 Football Hopefuls Expected To Report For Opening Practice

Approximately 50 gridsters are expected to report Monday, Aug. 15 for the opening practice of the 1949 Eastland High School Mavericks' football team, according to Head Coach Wendell Seibert.

The players will meet with the coaches at 4 o'clock in the high school gymnasium for a briefing, and then go to the field for a conditioning workout. Coach Seibert said only shorts would be issued for the first week which will be spent in once-a-day conditioning exercises, beginning at 4 o'clock.

Uniforms will be issued Monday, Aug. 22 and scrimmage sessions started with full-scale workouts in the afternoons and special groups in the mornings. Chances are good for Eastland to have both a "B" and "A" squad this year, Coach Seibert said. While 47 boys reporting on opening day last year, only 28 remained on the roster at the close of the season. With an additional six players expected from Motron Valley, it is believed there will be sufficient number of boys for a "B" squad to play from a 5 to eight game schedule.

The supply of attractive grey and red nylon uniforms is being added to and a set of white jerseys have been ordered. Under a new ruling by the Interscholastic League, in event of conflicting colors, the visiting team must wear white jerseys.

a team to tangle with the Coleman Blue Cats in a non-conference battle here Friday, Sept. 9.

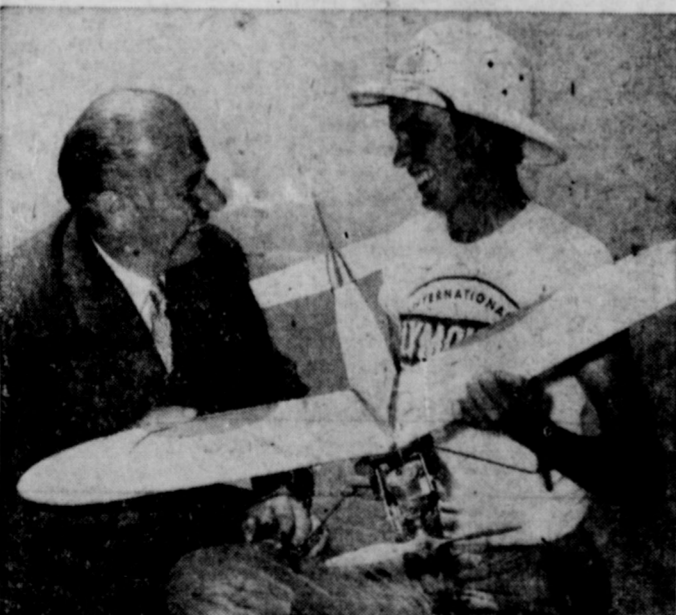
The Evans Reese farm at Robinson, located near Waco, was used for the demonstration.

Cracks Russian's World Speed Record

New Fishing Law Effective Sept. 1

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 13 (UP)—Texas anglers will find relief from the state's variety of fishing licenses when the Universal License Law goes into effect Sept. 1.

Fishermen who have been plagued with a number of special licenses as they fished from county to county will need only one license over the state.

The new license, costing \$1.65, will replace special resident licenses required in 21 counties, artificial lure license and special tags for fishing in Lake Worth and Eagle Mountain Lake, Possum Kingdom, Medina Lake, and the Texas side of Lake Texoma.

The Universal License, enacted by the 51st legislature and sponsored by Rep. Doyle Willis of Ft. Worth, may be obtained in the same manner as the artificial lure license now is obtained.

However, anglers should check the law's "exemption" provisions closely before venturing out on a fishing excursion.

If artificial bait is used, all Texans over 17 must have a Universal Fishing License regardless of where they fish.

When using live bait, anglers must have a license if fishing outside the county of residence.

Under the law, fishermen using dead bait may fish without a license in their home county or in adjoining counties.

Persons holding commercial fishing licenses are exempt from obtaining a Universal Fishing License for fresh water fishing.

All persons under 17 are exempt from holding a license.

The Universal License entitles Texans to fish anywhere in the state. However, if they cross the Oklahoma line on Lake Texoma, they must have a special uniform license enacted by the legislatures of the two states.

The Texoma license, the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission decided at its July meeting, will take effect next Jan. 1.

Out-of-state fishermen, under the Universal License Law, may buy a year-round license for \$5.25 or a five-day tag for \$1.65.

Improvements To Be Made on Roads

BROWNWOOD, Aug. 12 (Spl.)—Immediate enactment of a program providing a tax revenue from natural resources to assure future stabilization of the State's economy by investing in permanent improvements, such as rural roads, soil and water conservation, State hospitals and public buildings, is the pressing need in Texas today. This recommendation came from Gilbert Smith, former president of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners; and now Executive Director of the Texas Rural Roads Association, speaking here today before the 19th annual convention of the West Texas Press Ass'n.

In sounding a warning, Smith said: "The day is inexorably coming when the natural resources of this State will be exhausted, as oil and natural gas are being drained off to other sections of the country in such a rapid fashion that within 25 years Texas will be a great blighted area." He urged action to stabilize this condition before it was too late.

"As our natural resources are depleted," the Director of the Texas Rural Roads Association said, "the state will have to rely more and more upon its agricultural economy, and certainly no one can disagree that rural roads are the arteries feeding our agricultural economy."

"The State Highway Department has been doing a splendid job in building one of the finest highway systems in the Country," Judge Smith declared. "But it is now time to bring the rural roads of this State up to par and to take Texas out of the mud, we must balance the scales between the highway and the rural roads programs."

Government Rest Tokyo Rose Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13—The government rested its treason case against Tokyo Rose today, closing six arduous weeks of testimony by 46 witnesses.

Wayne Collins, attorney for the defendant, Mrs. Iva Toguri D'Aquino, on Monday will begin a rebuttal based on the contention that Mrs. D'Aquino intended her wartime broadcasts over radio Tokyo as entertainment for allied troops rather than as a treasonable attempt to break their morale.

A special session with the jury absent was ordered for today by Judge Michael Roche. The hearing, which might give a clue to Collins' tactic, gave Collins an opportunity to argue on several motions.

He was expected to ask for a judgment of acquittal and for an inspection of several recordings used in direct examination.

Prosecutor Tom De Wolfe decided to end his case after a little more than half of his total of 71 witnesses testified. He said he has already made arrangements to fly a number of the Japanese who were not called back to Tokyo.

The tenor of the trial has been much the same throughout. De Wolfe put his witnesses through their paces quickly, then Collins would subject them to intensive, grueling cross examinations. Two of the early witnesses were kept on the stand several days while Collins probed their backgrounds and motives for testifying.

Fox To Head New Ag. Course In Eastland High School

Marshall D. Fox of Graham and formerly of Eastland was elected to head the newly approved vocational agriculture department for Eastland High School, and John Digby Crump of Stamford was named science teacher at a called meeting of the Eastland Independent School Board Thursday night, it was announced by Supt. W. G. Womack.

Fox is a native of San Saba and was graduated from Texas A. & M. College in 1937, and has since received his Master's Degree from the same school. He has had 12 years experience in vocational agriculture work, beginning as a teacher in Brownwood and later teaching at Hico and Cisco. Following three years U. S. Naval service he came to Eastland from Cisco, where he organized the third Vocational School of Veterans in the State of Texas. He was coordinator of the Eastland County Vocational School until September, 1946 when he accepted a position as District Agricultural Supervisor with the State Board of Education. 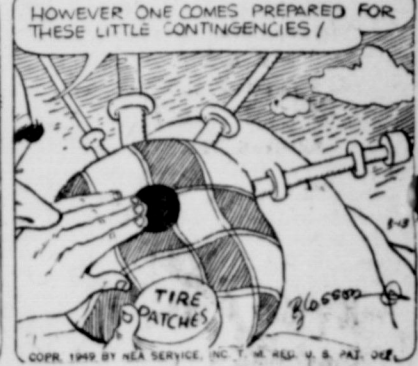

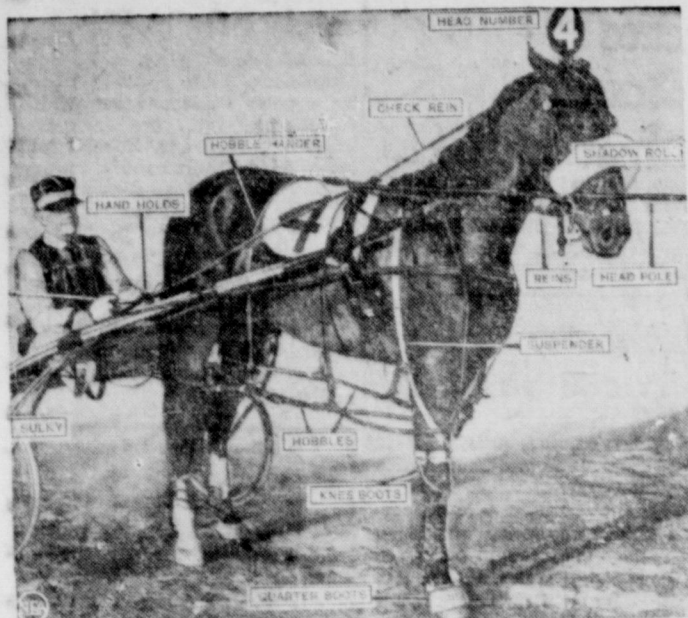
