private property.

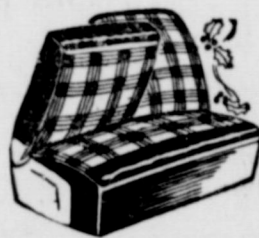
As the car was weaving and

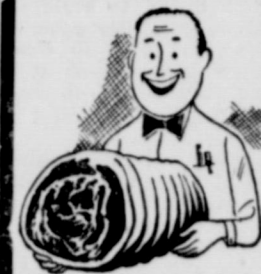

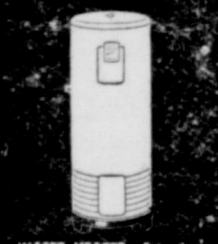

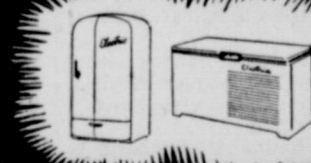

## Mason Attackers Are Discovered

HOUSTON, Tex. Aug. 18 (UP)—A young Pasadena man who admitted to Houston police he was one of a trio that attacked an Alice, Tex., radio commentator early Sunday was released early today as authorities planned to arrest the other two young men.

The 22-year old man made a statement to police concerning the beating of Burt Mason, whose father, Bill Mason, was killed July 29 in Alice. Young Mason said he wanted to prosecute only one of the trio, one who gouged his eyes repeatedly during the fracas, so the Pasadena man was released.

Police described the "eye gouger" as a 23 year old truck driver with a criminal record for assault to murder, aggravated assault and fighting.

The truck driver is one of the two men police were expected to pick up today. The second man will be questioned and released, detectives said.

In his statement yesterday following his arrest, the Pasadena man said the truck-driver "lost his temper" when Mason allegedly forced the truckman's car to the curb. According to the statement, the truck driver then halted Mason's car and the fight started in which the Alice man received painful head and body injuries.

## Mexicans Search For Geo. Ochoa

LAREDO, Aug. 18 (UP) — Mexican police searched for George Ochoa without fanfare today, and Laredo police chief David Gallagher was confident they would find him.

Gallagher said he did not know where Mexican officials were looking for Ochoa, wanted in two Laredo murders.

A fugitive warrant was issued for Ochoa by authorities in Houston and papers on the fugitive customs broker, including his birth certificate, will be forwarded to Washington.

Ochoa slipped across the border into Mexico last July 31, the day when Henry Whittenburg, Jr. of Laredo and McAllen, and Cpl. James Lindsey of Oneida, Tenn. were found shot to death in a Laredo hotel.

It was believed that Ochoa was attempting to gain a Mexican "citizenship" understanding. His papers show he was a citizen of the United States.

Before the fugitive warrant was issued yesterday, Webb County District Attorney E. J. Kazen asked Gov. Allan Shivers to assist in extraditing Ochoa.

When Gallagher was asked if police were looking for Ochoa on the U. S. side of the Rio Grande he said he did not think so.

"I wish that was where he was," Gallagher said. "We could wash this case up in a hurry if he was over here."

## Opens Second Attack On Red Light District

GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 18 (UP) — A medical leader here today launched his second attack on Galveston's "red light district," which he said is "greatly increasing the city's venereal disease rate."

Dr. Chauncey Leake, Galveston medical school head, suggested, "the key to control is complete suppression of prostitution."

He said he favored closing all brothels in the city and forcing them to remain closed.

"The incidence of venereal disease treated in our clinic has shown a steady rise since last December when the red light district was thrown wide open," Leake stated in a letter to Galveston newspapers.

"Associated with this is a rise in the number of undesirable characters in our community, to-

gether with thieves and narcotic peddlers," he added.

A year ago, Leake attempted unsuccessfully to close the city's "district."

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
