## **GEN VAUGHN** TO APPEAR ON TUESDAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UP) John Maragon will testify tonorrow before the Senate commitee investigating "five centers" and his friend, Maj. Cen. Harry H. Vaughan, will estify Tuesday, it was announred today.

Maragon originally had been scheduled to appear today and Vaughan tomorrow.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UP) -Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan informed the state department shortly after V-E Day that President Truman was "personally interested" in a trip of Vaughan's friend, John Maragon, into restricted areas in Italy, Senate investigators were told today.

The state department classified Maragon as a person whose "travel is authorized by the president." Maragon was seeking

Vaughan's move to help Maragon get a passport was disclosed in a letter made public by the Senate investigating committee inquiring into the activities of Maragon and other alleg-

Maj. Gen. Vaughan wrote a letter on White House stationary asking an Army commander Europe to help "my good friend"

\$723.15 in expenses for helping a New York exponsition buy surplus war material.

Maragon earlier had denied unded oath that he received any money from the company.

The letter written by President Truman's military aide was placed in the record in advance of testimony by Maragon himself.

The fast-talking man of many businesses has figured in the investigation of the capital's "influence industry" from the beginning. As a friend of Vaughan he used to have the run of the White

George Chadwick, Washington attorney and a former official of Trans-America Traders, Inc., told the senators about the payments to Maragon for services rendered by the one-time immigrant boy in Europe.

Chadwick also testified that Maragon once attacked him in his office in a futile atttempt to recover a paper which Maragon claimed showed he was entitled to an \$8,000 fee. The witness displayed a crumpled paper as evidence that Maragon had failed. Committee Counsel William P. Rogers produced the "my good friend" letter from Vaughan in connection with evidence that

Maragon went to Europe in early 1948 to buy property from the Foreign liquidation Service, the agency which handled disposal of surplus war property abroad. The letter, signed "H. H. Vaughan" over the typewritten

name of "Harry H. Vaughan," was addressed to Maj. Gen. Clyde L. Hyssong, listed as central field commander for Europe at Paris. Hyssong supervised the foreign liquidation program in his area.
