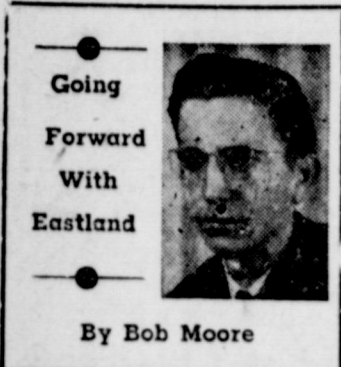

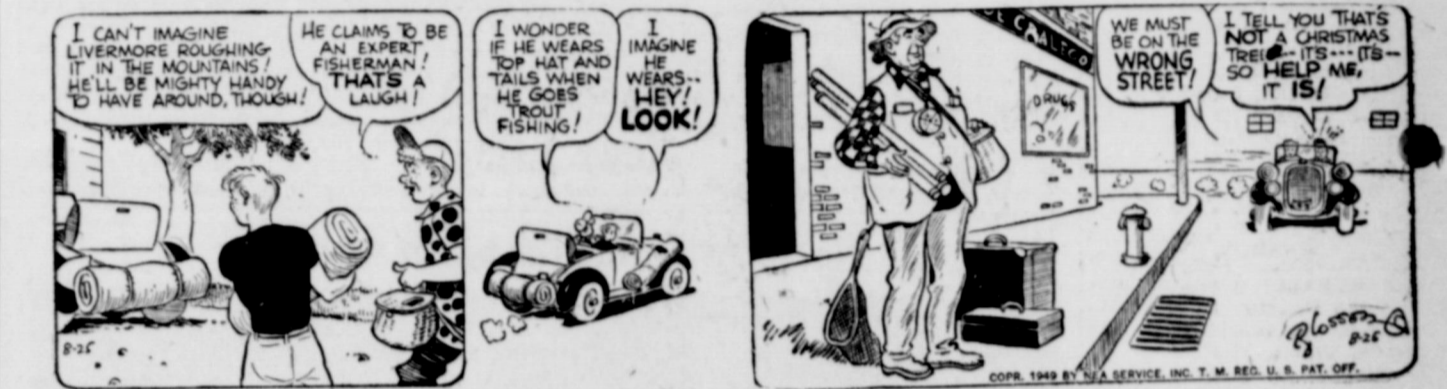

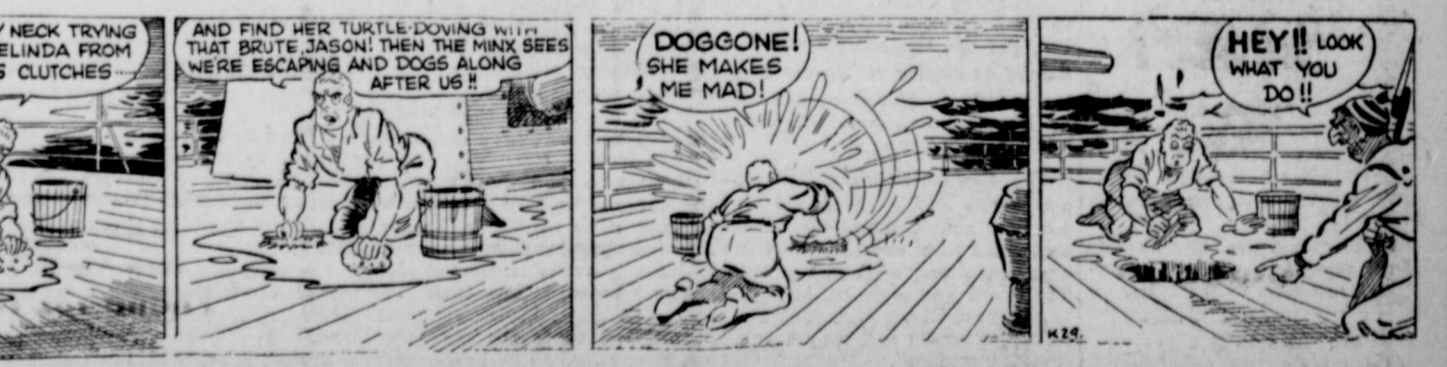

### Loyalty Pledges Mailed By U. T.

AUSTIN, Tex. Aug. 25 (UP)—Forms requiring University of Texas students and faculty members to sign loyalty oaths were in the mail today.

The forms were initiated in compliance with a new state law

which requires students and faculty to swear they do not champion Un-American causes.

University officials said the filled out forms must be returned by Sept. 3 or the students registration would be cancelled.

The pledge requires the signer to affirm he would support the U. S. in case of war and that he is not a member of any group advocating overthrow of the government.

Wendell Addington, a senior student and the University's only avowed Communist, said he would sign the oath, although he objected "strongly to the spirit" of such an undertaking.

Students enrolling in September will be required to sign the oath at that time. Forms in the mail were addressed to students who pre-registered during the summer session.

The 51st Legislature enacted the law which requires that loyalty oaths be signed by students and faculty members at all state-supported colleges and universities.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UP)—Vice President Alben W. Barkley may not be a serious Romeo, but he certainly talks a good romance.

That was the impression hundreds of cheering Democrats got last night after hearing the 71-year-old "Veep" skirt laughingly and teasingly around his friendship with a comely 37-year-old St. Louis widow.

The lady is Mrs. Carlton Hadley. Widower Barkley has made several flying trips to the mid-west in recent weeks to visit her. He said that he was never discouraged marriage with her.

Last night, however, Barkley, himself poured new fuel in the fires of romance when he spoke at a Democratic dinner honoring the

new national chairman of his party William M. Boyle, Jr., of Kansas City.

Everybody from President Truman to J. Howard McGrath, outgoing party chairman and new attorney general, had something to say about the "Spirit of St. Louis." The president said he was glad about Barkley's interest in St. Louis. And Barkley waxed lyrical about the ties between his home state of Kentucky and Missouri.

The references to the lady from St. Louis began with McGrath who introduced Barkley as "the squire of Paducah and the new spirit of St. Louis."

Sidney's Mayflower Hotel Orchestra ground out a schmaltzy version of "St. Louis Woman" as the grinning Veep walked to the center of the rostrum and bowed to the president and to McGrath.

### Loans Promised On Corn Crops

**DALLAS, Aug. 25 (UP)**—Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma farmers today could look forward to interim loans on their 1949 corn crops under the U. S. department of Agriculture's price support program.

Latham White, director of the production and marketing administration's commodity office, announced yesterday that final loan rates would be made at 90 per cent of parity on Oct. 1.

He said the interim rates were based on 90 per cent of the July 15 parity with a deduction of four cents a bushel as a safety margin against possible changes in parity between now and Oct. 1.

White said Texas rates vary

by counties from \$1.38 to \$1.42; Arkansas from \$1.43 to \$1.56 and Oklahoma from \$1.38 to \$1.42 per bushel.

Local interim loan rates will be posted in a few days by county offices of the production and marketing administration, he said.

## LOOPHOLES in the Law

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson, of Dallas is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.)

Joe was a small town tough. He had the reputation of being mean and when he got drunk, which was often, he was meaner than ever.

He was drunk and mean one day at high noon. He staggered down Main Street in his hometown, shouting and shooting his pistol into the air. He was arrested and charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol.

The charge read, in part, as follows: "... that Joe did, on or about the 4th day of October, 1939, in the County of Harrison, the State of Texas, then and there unlawfully, on or about his person, carry a pistol." Joe was brought to trial, but then the charge was dismissed and he was released.

The reason for this action was that the word "and" should have been used instead of the

word "or" in the sentence about "did then and there, on or about his person, carry a pistol." Joe couldn't be convicted of the charge because the court ruled this should have read, "did then and there, on AND about his person, carry a pistol."

Technicalities like that one often defeat justice. The State Bar is working for the elimination of such technicalities by seeking to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes.
