
A menu of charcoal-broiled rib-eye steak, baked potato, salad, hot roll, peach halves and iced tea will be served.

Wind, Weather Are

+ + + + THE COUNTY ASCS committee's monthly newsletter gives some space-age news this month.

It appears that the committee's age-old problem of measuring acreage has taken on a new look.

Prentice Mills, executive director of the ASCS, says that a few months ago, his organization began measuring land through aerial observation. The new method is less costly, quicker, and much more effective, he says.

The ASCS has rigged a camera in an airplane in such a manner that it can photograph up to a quarter-section of land at one time. Slides are taken of each farm. The slide can then be projected onto the farm's aerial map and focused to the point that the permanent points (county roads, wells, buildings, etc.) on the aerial map and slide match up.

It is then a simple matter to draw the crop and field lines in on the aerial map as pictured on the slide. The aerial map is drawn to exact scale. After drawing the lines on the aerial map, the ASCS computes the acreages for each crop.

"Pictures do not lie," says Mills. "We have measured acreages on more than 1,000 farms on the High Plains by this method in the past few months, and we believe that we have the acreages right on the money. We have ground checked about five per cent of these, and have found no errors."

"The truth is, when it comes to measuring contoured fields, terraces, sprinkler circles, lake areas, etc., we do it much better and much cheaper than can be done on the ground. Actually, this method costs us and you about one-half as much as measuring from the ground," Mills says.

The ASCS official says that in many cases, farmers have oddshaped fields that may have never

City Okays Switch In Ambulance Setup

At the Bovina City Council meeting last Thursday, March 10, a proposal by the City of Friona to provide ambulance service to Bovina, beginning on April 1, 1977, was accepted and a letter will be sent to Friona city officials, notifying them of the acceptance and expressing appreciation for being included in the service.

Effective that date, Parsons-Ellis, which has operated the service in the past, will relinquish all ambulance runs to this city and Friona, as well as county-wide calls.

Following a discussion with Ralph Shirley, representative for Pioneer Natural Gas Co., the council voted to send a letter to Shirley, requesting an increase in rent from Pioneer. Don Bandy is to be advised that his request to amend the zoning ordinance must first be acted upon by the zoning commission.

General Telephone Co. of the Southwest is to be asked to place a telephone serviceman in Bovina. The city has been without a serviceman.

More information is needed from Lawrence Kreigel concerning his knowledge of the possibilities of bringing a corn by-products business to Bovina. The council agreed

that serious efforts to induce additional businesses to come to Bovina is worthwhile and indicated its full support of such attempts. The council took under considera-

tion the planned uses of revenue sharing funds for 1977 and the various pieces of equipment to be included in the capital improvement program for the same year.

The city council discussed the need for the purchase of a new shredder.

In fact, any farmer that has an acreage that he wants measured may make a special request for this aerial observation, and the ASCS will be happy to comply. The acreage measured will become the farmer's official acreage report to the ASCS.

After the ASCS has finished working on a particular farm, the farm owner may have the slide to keep if they wish.

Council Kicks Off Contest

Texas cities and communities interested in participating in the Governor's Community Achievement Awards Program have until March 23 to enter.

All cities, towns and communities in the state are eligible to enter, announces Mrs. Vernon Jackson of Grand Prairie, president of the Beautify Texas Council. The Council jointly sponsors the awards program along with four regional Chambers of Commerce, The Texas Department of Community Affairs, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

Winners will be selected from six population categories--0 to 2,500; 2,501 to 5,000; 5,001 to 10,000; 10,001 to 20,000; 20,001 to 60,000; and more than 60,000.

According to Mrs. Jackson, an entry should be in the form of a typed report based on communitywide cleanup projects conducted from March 1976 through March 1977. The report should outline the following--citizen participation, community-wide beautification, property improvement, economic development, theme or slogan, committee coordination and summary.

The report should be mailed to the Beautify Texas Council, Drawer CS, College Station, Texas 77840.

Plaques will be presented to the six winning entries by Gov. Dolph Briscoe at the annual meeting of the Beautify Texas Council June 22 in El Paso. An additional Award of Excellence will be given to one of the six winners with the best overall program of community beautification.


