Going Forward With Eastland

In the current issue of "Rural Roads," official publication of the Texas Rural Roads Association, appears the following article:

### AESOP FABLE—OR IS IT?

Joe Bloke is a farmer. Just an ordinary guy. He and his wife Ethel live on a farm in Eastland County. (Any similarity of Joe and Ethel's situation to persons living or dead we hasten to assure is purely coincidental.) They have three kids, two of whom attend school (when the bus can pass their house.) Joe went to A. & M.; Ethel had two years at East Texas. Joe knows the value of soil conservation and is 'hipped' on animal husbandry, but can't develop either project as he would like on account of the muddy roads in front of his place.

Now Eastland County has about 1,200 miles of rural roads; their total receipts in the Road and Bridge funds for 1948 was \$140,318.46, which gave them \$116.93 per mile to build and maintain rural roads each year. Their taxable valuation was \$20,828,610.

County Judge P. L. Crossley told Joe the other day: "It looks like the money allocated under the Colson-Briscoe bill will build a road within about a mile of your farm."

"That's fine for Joe—now he's only 1-5th as far as he was from an all-weather road. But still he can't get those kids to school nor get his mail—well, in bad weather he's just isolated because he can't make that "Last Mile" of muddy roads.

Continuing with the bed-time story; the 51st Legislature passed a law levying a 1 cent tax per 1,000 cubic feet on the production of natural gas. So Eastland County gets this year about \$147,985.80, additional in rural road funds.

Under the Federal-Aid act they get another chunk of \$49,328.00, and this Fall another \$27,130, from the surplus, in the State Road Bond Fund so Joe Nelson, chief accountant for the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness estimates.

(Still pipe dreaming) So Eastland County decides to do something about it. They take their R & B receipts, pledge them off in 20 years a county-wide bond issue of over Two Million Bucks. No dream, it'll do it too.

They decide to start with good roads, so they build 448 miles of all weather roads.

They take the 147 Thousand plus, received from the natural gas tax and the \$49 thousand plus, they get from Federal aid and put it in the R & B funds to replace the 140 thousand they earmarked for the road bonds. They use this money to improve additional existing roads, throwing in the \$27,130.73, from the gasoline tax surplus, and wind up with about 850 miles of rural roads but now have about \$450 per mile for improvements and maintenance, and enough money to properly maintain their 448 miles of all-weather rural roads because in 1951 they levy the 30 cents ad valorem the State remitted to the counties.

And would you believe it. Joe and Ethel and the kids drive to town when they please—they have a good road in front of the farm and Joe's income just about doubled the first year. They're gonna have another blessed event about Christmas and Ethel's not even worrying about Doc Riley getting out there to take her to the hospital.

The County adopted the County Unit System of road operations and is now in the process of an expansion of their rural roads and before long every rural road in the County service farm units can be traveled in all types weather.

AND the Eastland County Tax Payers are NOT paying one thin dime more in taxes. TRUE.

NOTE: Well, it was fine while it lasted—don't you think?—This

## Commission Head Improving After Car-Cab Crash

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 6 (UP)—William J. Murray, Jr., chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, was reported improving after a car-cab collision late yesterday afternoon.

The Murray family had returned to Austin by plane from Amarillo and was driving to the Murray home in the cab. Murray was sitting in the front right seat when the accident occurred.

Hospital authorities reported that Murray, 34, suffered a multiple fracture of the right hip, a back injury, bruises, shock and possible fractured skull.

Murray's two younger daughters, Marsha, 5, and Janice, 2, were also admitted to the hospital. They suffered bruises and lacerations, but their conditions were reported good.

Jo Anna Murray, 8, suffered a black eye while Mrs. Murray was reported uninjured.

Investigating officers reported that the cab in which the Murray family was riding was crossing Airport Boulevard, a main thoroughfare, when the accident occurred. Murray was pinned in the cab until wrecker and ambulance drivers were able to pry him loose.

Editor's Note: Murray is a nephew of Mrs. Willard Swaney of Ranger Swaney said early this morning that they had not been notified of the accident.

## RACER CRASH MAY PUT CURB ON NATIONAL RACES

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 6 (UP)—The crash which killed round-the-world flier William P. Odom, a housewife and her baby threatened today, to end high-speed closed course racing over suburban areas at the national air races.

Odom, 29, holder of six post war speed and distance flying records, was killed yesterday while rounding the third pylon in the 225-mile Thompson Race, final event of the air show. Favored to win, he lost control of his green F-51 Mustang while traveling at more than 400-mile-per hour.

The plane smashed into the small shantle home of Mr. and Mrs. Bradley C. Laird at Berea, O., going almost all the way through the structure. Odom and Mrs. Laird, 24, were killed instantly in the explosion and fire that wrecked the house.

The Laird's 13-month-old son died four hours later of burns, and the dead woman's father, B. J. Hoffman of Minneapolis was hospitalized with second degree

## Attempt To Save Equipment At Well Blowout

MARSHALL, Tex., Sept. 6 (UP)—Workmen raced against time today to salvage as much equipment as possible from Jefferson's second gas blowout in less than two months.

Already it had been estimated that \$65,000 worth of equipment at the Alford Oil Company's No. 1 Black Cypress Bayou had been lost since the blow out occurred Sunday morning.

Fire danger was great and prevailing winds—south and southeast—today blew across the only road leading to the well on an island in the Black Cypress Bayou.

The well is some two miles northeast of Jefferson and a mile northwest of the first similar blowout in the Rodessa gas field of Marion County. The first blowout caught fire and is still burning. Workmen at the second well are guarding against fire.

Ed Stanley, chief engineer of the Texas Railroad Commission's oil and gas division of the Kilgore field office, was due here today to look into the situation.

There was considerable speculation that a gas leak had developed in some well in the area permitting the gas to penetrate sand and cause the blowout.

Final rites for Tom J. Nabers, 77, Desdemona Justice of the Peace for the past 20 years, who died Aug. 30 in a Gorman hospital, were held Friday morning, Sept. 2 at 10 o'clock in the Desdemona Methodist Church. The Rev. H. J. Sanders of Comanche officiated with the assistance of Rev. J. Tickner of Desdemona and Rev. C. W. Pittman of Gorman. Interment was in the Desdemona Cemetery.

Born in Comanche, Nabers had been a resident of Desdemona the past 25 years. In addition of serving as Justice of the Peace, he was a native civic worker being chairman of the Red Cross campaign drive, Rural Roads committeeman, booster of school activities and a teacher of Sunday School. Prior to moving to Desdemona, he served as Deputy Sheriff at Comanche.

Honorary pallbearers were; Buck Read, Anee Brown, Dove Lewis, Morris Nance, Bill Parks and Clabourne Eldredge, all of Desdemona; Harold Kelly, Rising Star; Aubrey Wafford, Ranger; and Mr. Richards, Desdemona.

The service had originally been set for Thursday, but was postponed because one of the relatives was delayed in arriving. Mrs. Anee Brown was pianist. A special song "The Lord's Prayer" was given by the Harmony Girls of Eastland, which included Mrs. C. W. Hoffman Jr., Mary Hoffman, Betty Pickens, Betty Harkinder, Gladene Womack and Tina McNally. The Methodist Choir also performed.

Out-of-town persons attending were from Comanche, De Leon, Gorman, Eastland, Ranger and Stephenville.

## Accident Victim Resting Well At Ranger Hospital

Mrs. E. L. Martin was reported to be resting very well this morning at the West Texas Hospital where she was being treated for injuries sustained in an accident on Main Street Monday morning about 10:00 o'clock.

Mrs. Martin sustained a broken arm, a gashed knee and bruises on the shoulder. She was injured when the Martin car in which she was riding with her husband went out of control at the intersection of Main and Austin Streets. The car crashed into two other cars, knocked down a parking meter and struck another building before heading head-on into the corner of the Piggy-Wiggy building. Martin was uninjured in the wreck and none of the occupants of the other cars was injured.

Considerable damage was done to the Martin car when it crashed into the Piggy-Wiggy building.

About the same time as this accident occurred another accident took place about three blocks out on North Austin street when a truck apparently plowed into the left front side of a sedan at the intersection of North Austin and Cypress streets. The truck appeared to have dragged the car across Austin to the curb where both vehicles were brought to a stop.

The State Highway patrol investigated the wreck on Austin and Cypress at the request of Ranger police and names of the persons involved could not be secured this morning. A boy hurt in the wreck was said to be from Fort Worth and had been released from the Ranger General Hospital where he was treated.

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## Brownwoodite To Head USO Fund Campaign

EL PASO, Tex., Sept. 6 (UP)—A 26 year old Army private was to be charged today with murder in connection with the death of an Army officer he didn't know he had killed until he saw the victim's picture in a newspaper.

The soldier, Pvt. Charles E. Meloche, cleared up the mystery surrounding the death of Lt. Edward L. Helmstetter, 27, yesterday by reporting to Fort Bliss Post Commander Maj. Gen. John L. Homer that he was responsible for the officer's death.

Both men were stationed at Fort Bliss.

The Canadian-born private said he struck the officer twice with his fist early Sunday when the victim accosted him and his girl friend as they walked home from a date.

"But, I didn't know I had killed him until I saw his picture in the paper Monday alongside the story of his death," Meloche told General Homer and police.

Prior to Meloche's voluntary admission of his part in the incident, police and Fort Bliss authorities had been at a loss to explain how Lt. Helmstetter had met his death.

The victim's body, clad in civilian clothes, was found lying in a residential driveway about 12:45

## WIFE CHARGED WITH MURDER; GRAND JURY CALLED THURSDAY

Emory Moad, 40, who had been employed as a cook in Stamey's Drive-In of Eastland for the past two years, died this morning about 11 o'clock in a Cisco hospital of a gunshot wound.

Moad was shot at about 1 P. M. Sunday while sitting in a car near the Cisco home of his estranged wife. He was struck once by a bullet from a .38 caliber pistol. The bullet entered his right side and came out through his back.

Cisco Chief of Police M. L. Perdue said another bullet, which imbedded in one of the car doors. Moad drove to the home of a brother, Roy on the opposite side of town after he was wounded.

Perdue said he and Policeman Wayne Parsons were called to the scene of the shooting by O. G. Lawson, who lives in the neighborhood and heard the shots.

In critical condition, Moad had been under an oxygen tent until death came. Funeral arrangements are pending.

District Attorney Everett M. Grisham of Eastland said a murder complaint had been filed against Mrs. Moad in the office of Justice of the Peace W. R. Brown at Cisco, with bond set at \$5,000. Immediately following the shooting, she was arrested and charged with attempted murder in Brown's office. She was placed in the Eastland County Jail, where she remained until Monday afternoon when \$1,000 bond was posted.

The District Attorney said Mrs. Moad would be re-arrested and placed in the County Jail, pending posting of the new bond.

A special Grand Jury panel has been ordered by District Judge George L. Davenport of 91st. District Court, at the request of the District Attorney, for Thursday morning at 10 A. M. Following selection of a jury from the 16 member panel, the Moad case will be considered, the District Attorney said.

## PRIVATE ADMITS FATAL FRACAS WITH OFFICER

The officer's jaw was broken loose from his skull, he had a serious skull fracture, both eyes were blacked and he was bleeding profusely. An Army autopsy showed he suffocated from blood pouring from the broken jaw into the upper respiratory tract.

"The first blow knocked him down and I followed him down, hitting him once more as he struck the ground."

"When he lay there without moving, I stood up and did not hit, kick nor molest him any further."

"I told Patty (Miss Patricia Donaldson, his date) that I wanted to phone the police as the man had attempted to attack her, but she was very nervous and wanted to go on home."

T. W. Sherrill, who was cut on his back and arm, was treated at a Royce City Hospital.

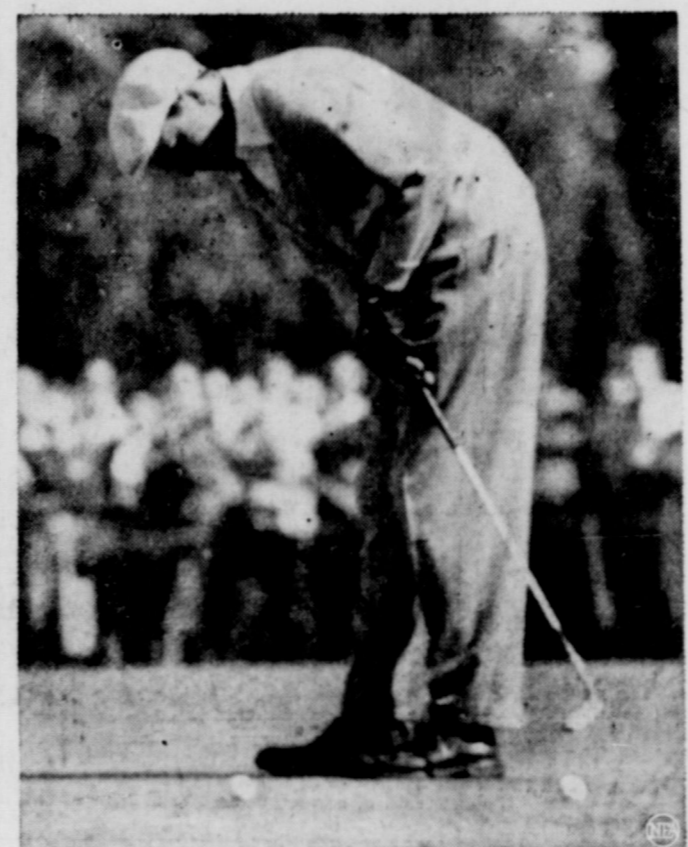
Gas accumulated inside the clockwise building after the press room had caught fire. Firemen in front of the burning structure were attempting to connect a hose at the time.
