Uncertainty Marks Opening Of Money Conference

BRITISH EXPECTED TO TELL U. S. OF RESPONSIBILITY IN CRISIS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (UP) — American British and Canadian officials met here today in search of a way out of the dollar crisis that threatens to bankrupt Britain and perhaps wreck European recovery.

The three-power money conference opened in the state department meeting room in an atmosphere of somber uncertainty that was clearly reflected in the faces of the principals.

As the conferees took their places reports buzzed through the chamber that the British delegation was planning to take a firmer and more aggressive stand than has been suggested in its pre-conference statements.

British sources said their delegates may warn the United States in blunt, unmistakable language that this country must help bail Britain out of her crisis or risk the collapse of Democratic leadership throughout the world.

Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder, chairman of the conference, and Secretary of State Dean Acheson were waiting in the state department's official reception room when the British representatives arrived.

Sir Stafford Cripps, Britain's chancellor of the exchequer and head of his delegation, arrived with Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and British Ambassador Sir Oliver Franks shortly before the 11 A. M., E. S. T., starting time.

Canadian Finance Minister Douglas C. Abbott and External Affairs Secretary Lester B. Pearson showed up a few minutes later with Canada's ambassador to Washington, Hume Wrong.

Snyder appeared to be in a grim mood. He made a brief effort to exchange small talk with Cripps while Acheson and Bevin chatted like old friends and Marshall Plan Hoffman talked to the Canadians. Snyder finally gave up the attempt and led the delegates into the conference room.

A Scotland Yard detective, Ben Macey, accompanied the Britons into the meeting hall. But none of the dozens of financial experts attached to the three missions joined the party at the outset.

At 11:15 A. M. EST, the doors were closed and the conferees went to work. But the absence of the "experts" indicated that they were using their first meeting to decide on procedure, rather than to attend any definite negotiations.

From the outset, it appeared that the American and Canadian delegates planned to sit tight for a while and find out what solution, if any, the British have for their plight.

The British refused to show their hand in advance, although Cripps has made it plain that Britain is opposed to devaluing the pound sterling — a money maneuver suggested frequently on this side of the Atlantic as one way of increasing British exports.

British sources, meanwhile, hinted that Britain's newly announced trade deal with Russia might be indicative of a "tougher" stand by Bevin and Cripps at the money talks.

They said two British leaders may warn the American negotiators that their country's dollar shortage is merely a symptom of a spreading international disease which may endanger the position of the Western Democracies in their cold war with Communism.

These sources said that the British feel the United States, as the world's richest power, has a responsibility to solve the crisis in the same way that Britain handled similar responsibilities in her 19th century heyday.

Chances Dim For Victory Over Coleman

In a five minute chalk talk about the Eastland Maverick football team, Coach Wendell Siebert told the Lions Club Tuesday noon prospects were very dim for a victory over Coleman in the opening game of the season Friday night here.

While Coleman has only two starting lettermen back from last year, the system in the school provides for a host of reserves each year. Junior Carr, pass and speed king of the Blue Cat backfield, was described by Coach Siebert as being a big threat as the Mavericks are weak on pass defense. The coach added that practice this week is being concentrated on working out a defense against passes, but several of the backfield men were in the line during previous seasons and have yet to learn not to let an opponent get behind them.

Coach Siebert said the team is "beginning to take shape." Richard Bumpass and Bill Sikes were two of the larger boys in the line to receive special mention by the coach, and the work of left end Kenneth Williamson, 147 pounder from Morton Valley, was commended. In the backfield, Coach Siebert said some trouble had been encountered to finding a man to work the pivot post in the tight T-formation which will be used again this year. Edwin Aaron, 148 pounder, is a probable starter for the quarterback slot.

Weak link in the Maverick football chain is in the defensive end positions, the coach said.

FARM BUREAU MEETING IN ABILENE 17TH

A series of 25 bi-district meetings sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation will be held throughout the state of Texas September 6-21, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, federation president. The two meetings scheduled for this district will be held in the Hotel Wooten, Abilene, on Saturday, Sept. 17, and in the V.F.W. Hall, Comanche, on Mon., Sept. 19. Director Raymond McElrath of Coleman will preside. Meetings will start at 10:00 a.m.

In conducting the meetings, President Hammond will be assisted by Austin A. Crowover, state field representative. The United States Congressman from the district has been invited to appear on the program and speak to the group on agricultural trends in Washington.

Another highlight of the meetings will be a queen contest scheduled for 3:00 p. m. The queen selected at each meeting will participate in the ceremonies at the state convention in November at which the district queen will be determined, and a state queen chosen from the district winners.

Farm Bureau spokesmen will give farmers and ranchers first hand information on developments in the agricultural field directly affecting the welfare of farm people; they will also seek the views of the people on current issues as well as future programs.

Enrollment procedures to be used in the state-wide membership program to be conducted in October will also be discussed. In reviewing some of the accomplishments of Farm Bureau in 1949, made possible by a good membership, President Hammond called attention to work of the organization in securing adequate storage facilities for grain producers which is estimated to have saved Texas farmers approximately \$45,000,000; also the Farm Bureau's efforts in securing a support price on cottonseed, estimated to have saved farmers of Texas another \$20,000,000.

All farmers and ranchmen, and agricultural agency leaders are invited to attend the meetings.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 7 (UP) — Vice-President Alben W. Barkley made it clear today that he wants newsmen to stop cramping his style while he woos Mrs. Carleton S. Hadley, attractive St. Louis widow who is 37 years his junior.

The romantically-minded 72-year-old "Veep" had three reporters and five photographers given a polite but firm bum's rush from the swank Starlight roof of the Chase Hotel where he took Mrs. Hadley, who is 37, dancing last night.

"This is my private life, and I don't want you to interfere with it," Barkley told one photographer.

At one point the newsmen engaged in an argument with 12 waiters who laid hands on some of them while threatening to eject them bodily from the night club. The scene stole attention from the floor show.

Barkley, who has visited three widows since Sunday, planned to leave this afternoon for Springfield, Ill., where he will unveil a bust of Benjamin Franklin tomorrow. It was understood that Mrs. Hadley would not accompany him.

13TH VICTIM OF MASS MURDER DIES OF WOUNDS

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 7 (UP) — A 12 year old boy died today — the 13th person slaughtered by religious fanatic Howard Unruh in his vengeance against storekeepers whom he considered the "moneychangers" of the neighborhood. He wounded three others.

John Wilson died in Cooper Hospital 18 hours after Unruh felled 16 men and children in a 20-minute shooting spree that turned a quiet residential section into a scene of blood and terror. The three remaining injured — a woman and two boys — were still in the hospital but their condition was not critical.

The Wilson boy, his mother and grandmother were shot while they sat in an automobile waiting for a traffic light. The two women were killed instantly with single shots.

Unruh told police his resentment against the neighborhood storekeepers — the druggist, the shoemaker, the barber and the tailor — drove him to the killings. "Neighbors had been talking about me for some time and making derogatory remarks about my character," Unruh told police. "I had been thinking about killing them for some time."

Police said neighbors told them the 27-year old Unruh "hated everybody, especially storekeepers whom he referred to as 'money changers'."

Temperatures Run High Again

Temperatures are running a few degrees above normal for all of Texas, the Dallas Weather Bureau reported today, and no immediate relief from the heat was in sight.

Maximums yesterday were in the middle or upper 90's over much of the state. Presidio had the high of 99 degrees and it was 97 at Dallas and 96 at Fort Worth, San Antonio and Austin. The low maximum was 80 degrees at Guadalupe Pass.

Ovornight, the lows ranged from 59 at Dalhart to 79 at Galveston, with readings generally in the 70's.

Only rainfall of consequence was a soaking 2.38 inches at Corpus Christi, Victoria had .04 inch and Palacios .03. Threatening conditions were building up on the coast and that area may receive showers during the day, the Weather Bureau said.

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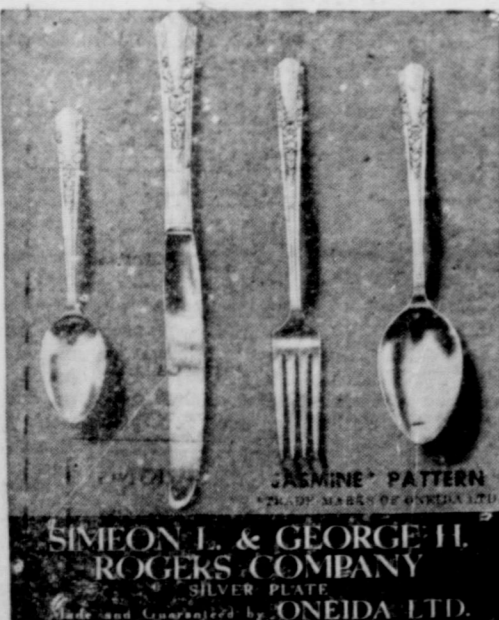

Embargo Cripples Towns, Industry

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 7 (UP)—Four hundred St. Louis plants and many southwest towns were cut off from transportation today as the Missouri Pacific Railroad declared a freight embargo in the face of a threatened strike.

The communities and industries rely on the sprawling railroad for the necessities of life and commerce.

About 5,000 operating employees are expected to walk off their jobs Friday at 2 P. M., throwing another 25,000 workers of the road into idleness.

Involved in the dispute with the company were the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Order of Railway Conductors and Brotherhood of Railroad trainmen.

They protested 282 unsettled claims growing out of differences in operating rules which they said involves \$3,000,000.

A passenger, mail, baggage, and express embargo was scheduled for early Friday, about 12 hours before the strike deadline.

A management spokesman said that no walkout was expected on the Missouri Pacific's subsidiary roads, the Gulf Coast Lines and the International-Great Northern although there will be no through service.

Paul N. Neff, chief operating officer of the line, said the company has agreed to arbitrate the dispute. The unions refused, saying that the National Railroad Adjustment Board was five years behind in its work and that a settlement would not be reached for

Blowout Laid To Rock Slide

JEFFERSON, Tex., Sept. 7 (UP)—A rock slide deep in the earth was blamed today for Marion County's second spectacular gas blowout in less than 60 days.

The blowout occurred Sunday in the rich Jefferson-Rodessa gas field in East Texas, while a well was being drilled.

Gas, under tremendous pressure, threw tons of dirt and mud into the air and destroyed an estimated \$65,000 worth of drilling equipment.

The well was 338 feet deep at the time the gas started spewing into the air.

The blowout left a crater some 40 feet in diameter. Its depth was not known.

Dave Flesh, a petroleum geologist, said the first blowout probably was caused by a mass movement of underground formations. It occurred in a slough along a nearby Bayou.

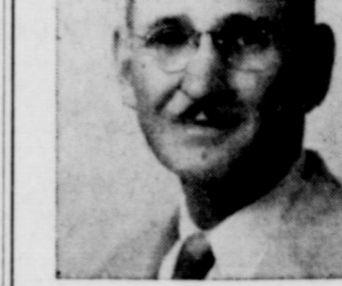

National Guard Armory Burns

LAMESA, Tex., Sept. 7 (UP)—Sentries remained on duty today while authorities tried to estimate damages caused by a fire that almost destroyed the National Guard armory here late last night.

The fire broke out about 10:30 P. M., 40 minutes after Troop C of the 124th Mechanized Cavalry had completed its regular weekly drill. It was extinguished by the Lamesa fire department an hour later.

Capt. Mac Wassell, commanding officer of the troop, said a dis-

carded cigarette butt could have started the blaze.

Wassell declined early today to estimate damages, but he said about \$250,000 worth of equipment was stored in the corrugated iron building on the Dawson County Fair Grounds.

The building, valued at \$8,000, was insured.

All of Troop C's records were destroyed in the roaring fire, which sent residents of nearby homes scurrying for safety.

Wassell said that a specially-constructed storage room prevented 30,000 rounds of ammunition from exploding.

He mobilized the entire troop for all-night guard duty to keep unauthorized personnel off the premises.

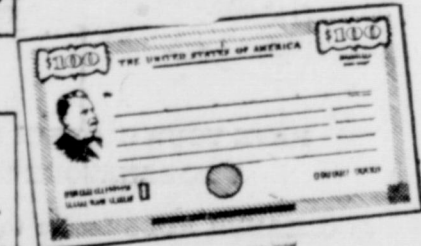

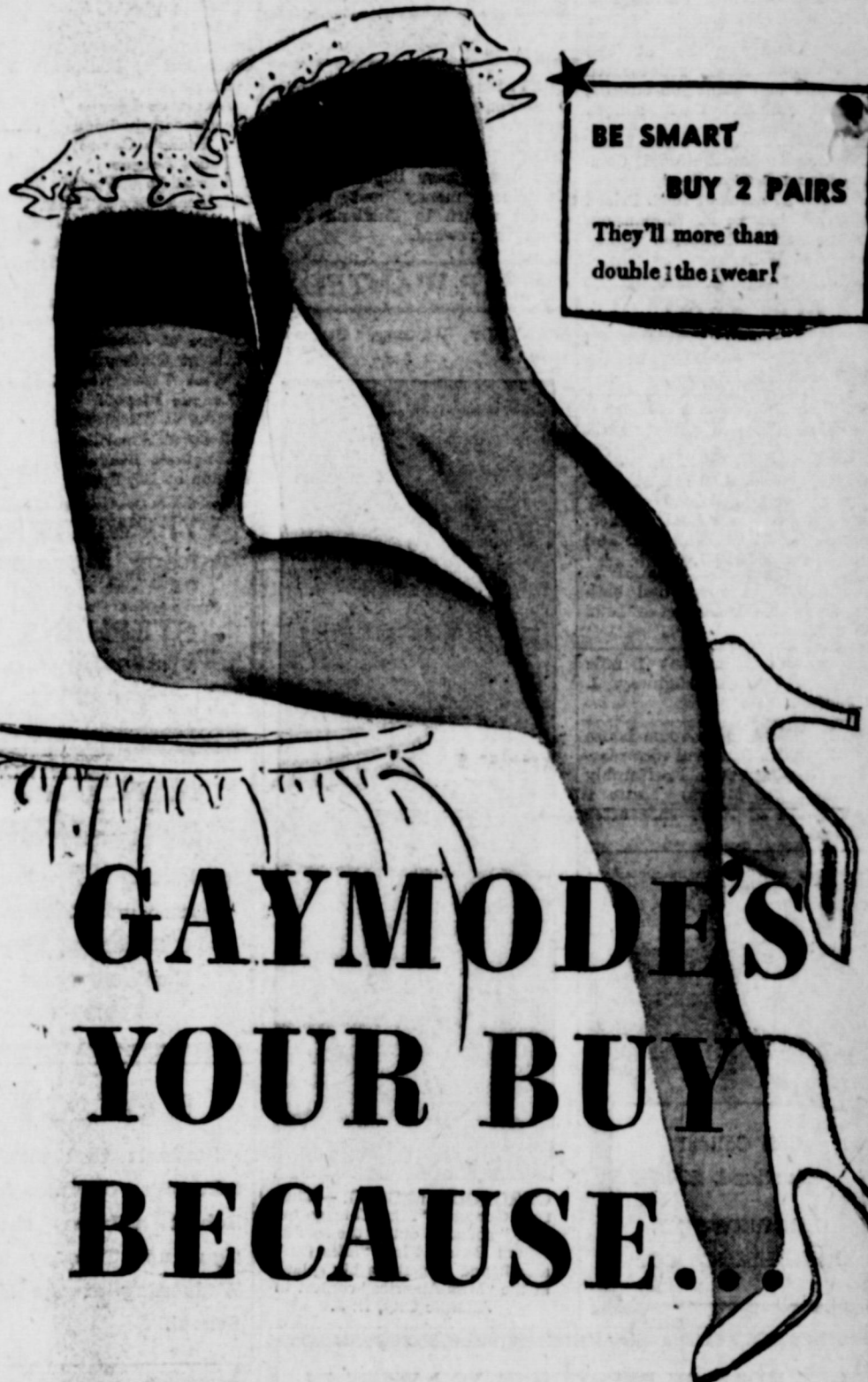
