## Mavericks Open Season With Coleman Friday M. H. HAGAMAN, PIONEER RANGER RESIDENT DIES

M. H. Hagaman, pioneer Ranger resident and builder and its first mayor, died this morning about 5 o'clock at the family home on Tiffin Road.

Mr. Hagaman had been in failing health for some time and for the past several months had been confined to his bed at home.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 4 o'-clock at the First Methodist Church in Ranger with Killingsworth's in charge of arrangements. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

The body will lie in state at the church from 3 to 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.
