INDUSTRY NEXT TO BE HIT

The nation's railroads cancelled nore than 600 trains today as one 14 years old, were arrested the coal and steel strikes cut Monday. The boys have made deeper into the nation's economy.

Effects of the coal mine walkout, now in its sixth week, were felt most sharply. But the steel shutdown, in its fourth week, is expected to hit the automobile industry a crippling blow by the month's end.

Railroads slashed their schedules sharply to conserve dwindling coal stockpiles. In Chicago, the nation's rail hub, cancellation of 214 passenger and suburban trains was announced.
