U. S. Protests Explusion Of Embassy Aids

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 27 (UP)-The United States protested formally to Czechoslovakia today against the arrest and expulsion of members of the U. S. embassy here.

James K. Penfield, U. S. Charge D'Affaires here, delivered what was described as a "stiff protest" to Vavro Hajdu, deputy foreing minister.

The protest was against the ouster of two American embassy attaches from Czechoslovakia and the arrest of another. All were ac-
