U. S. Protests Expulsion Of Embassy Aids

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 27 (UP)—The United States protested formally to Czechoslovakia today against the arrest and expulsion of members of the U. S. embassy here.

James K. Penfield, U. S. Charge D'Affaires here, delivered what was described as a "stiff protest" to Vavro Hajdu, deputy foreign minister.

The protest was against the expulsion of two American embassy attaches from Czechoslovakia and the arrest of another. All were accused of spying.

Last Friday Samuel Meryn was arrested at his home by Czech police. The same day Isaac Patch was ordered out of the country on 24 hours notice. Four days later John G. Heyn likewise was ordered out.

Embassy officials had been unable to see Meryn since he was arrested. The Czech granted permission to the embassy for an envoy to see Meryn yesterday, but at the last minute the meeting was "postponed."

The Czechs attributed the delay to "incorrect" reports of the affair broadcast by the Voice of America. Today the U. S. officially corrected a voice broadcast to which the Czechs objected. It was described as saying the Czechs repeated requests by the embassy to see Meryn.

Penfield said the Czechs had not specifically refused embassy requests to see Meryn, but added that efforts had proved unavailing.

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Seek Identity Of Dead Robber

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Brownsville officers today awaited a report on a check of FBI fingerprint files, hoping that it would yield a clue to the identity of a man shot to death by city policemen as he fled from the scene of an attempted safe burglary.

The man, in his early 30s, registered at a hotel yesterday as J. B. Dillon, but he gave no home address. He carried a driver's license bearing the name of Robert Stewart Peters, Louisville, Ky., but officers said they had checked and found the man was not Peters.

Three policemen surprised the man early yesterday when they answered a call to Wall Motor Company to investigate a report that two burglars had broken a window.

He leaped from the window and fled, with two patrolmen on foot and one in a squad car in pursuit.

Patrolman Douglas Ward brought him down with three shots from a sub machine gun two blocks from the scene of the break-in.

Refusing to talk, he died en route to a hospital.

Officers held a suspected accomplice, but they admittedly got nowhere in trying to question him.

Meanwhile, authorities were attempting to link the burglary attempt, in which the knob was cracked from a safe, with a safe-cracking in Harlingen last month and one in Brownsville last July.

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Rites Friday For Retired Oilman

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 27—Funeral services for William O. Gatton, Sr., 71, former manager of the Fort Worth district for Magnolia Petroleum Co., will be held here tomorrow.

Gatton died at his home here late yesterday, after having been in poor health the past two years.

Born in Parsons, Kan., he came here as a youth with his parents. His first job was as clerk with the Standard Rope and Twine Co., at Houston.

In 1914, Gatton went to work for Magnolia at Dallas, becoming assistant manager of the marketing department. From Dallas, he went to Little Rock, Ark., as assistant manager of that district.

Three years later—in 1919—he was made manager of the Amarillo district and became well known there for his civic efforts. He was made manager of the Fort Worth district in 1930, retiring in 1939 after 25 years with Magnolia.

FOUR-STATE MANHUNT ON FOR ESCAPED MEN

WILMINGTON, Del. Oct. 27 (UP)—More than 200 state police were ordered into a four-state manhunt today for eight escaped convicts, heavily armed and led by two life term murderers.

Local police in all Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware communities also were alerted and radio alarms were sent out to all states on the eastern seaboard.

The convicts were armed to kill, police were warned. The desperadoes reportedly have 10 revolvers and two rifles they took from the prison arsenal in a daring break from the New Castle County Jail last night.

The search for two of the fugitives was concentrated in the Kennett square section of Pennsylvania where an automobile which they commandeered at gunpoint in a Wilmington suburb was found abandoned.

Road blocks were set up on every road leading from Wilmington and all leadings in the area were patrolled in an effort to head off the fugitives' flight.

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Searchers Hunt For Searchers

GROESBECK, Tex. Oct. 27 (UP)—Searchers looked for searchers yesterday after one group found Maurine Brown, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Brown of Oletha who disappeared for five hours into a densely wooded area near her home.

Twenty-six boys of the Thornton school at Oletha, a community near here, joined the search. Three of the boys found the girl, safe, but the remainder of the day was spent in rounding up the remainder of the searchers, who were scattered widely.

LEAK IN GAS MAIN FOUND NEAR EXPLOSION SITE

DALLAS, Oct. 27 (UP)—A small crack was discovered last night in a gas main near the explosion-shattered Cedar Springs Housing development, and it was scheduled to be thoroughly investigated today.

R. Skagerberg, an explosion expert for the Public Housing Authority, was reported en route by air from Washington, D. C. He will conduct an investigation while workmen remove the debris. A U. S. Bureau of Mines man also will investigate.

Fourteen persons were injured when the four-unit apartment structure exploded Tuesday night. Five still were hospitalized today but all were expected to recover.

James L. Stephenson, Jr., director of the Dallas Housing Authority which operates the Cedar Springs project, said maintenance men discovered a "hairpin sized" crack in a four-inch central gas main at the project. The main was nine feet under ground and four feet distant from the side of the crumpled building.

Stephenson emphasized that discovery of the crack did not fix the cause of the blast. This, he said, must be determined by the explosion expert or other authority.

The Lone Star Gas Co., said it was not investigating the accident. A spokesman said the firm's investigatory facilities were available if needed, but that Lone Star did not maintain gas lines at the project.

Periodic tests are made for respaving gas at all federal housing projects, Stephenson said. He added that no sign of escaping gas was noted when the testing machine was used at Cedar Springs prior to the \$35,000 explosion.

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Hawkins Admits Killing Clark

JERSEYVILLE, Ill., Oct. 27 (UP)—Leonard (Lucky) Hawkins, who was captured in Dahart, Tex., last week after one of the greatest manhunts in the Texas Panhandle in recent years, has changed the confession he gave to police, state's attorney Alvin Pettit said today.

Pettit said Hawkins, who will have a preliminary hearing in connection with the fatal shooting of Albert Clark next Tuesday, had signed a statement admitting he fired the fatal shots which killed Clark.

Clark's body was found in a field near here three weeks ago. He had been shot and robbed. Hawkins, a former bush league ball player who was Clark's traveling companion, was captured last week and returned here.

At first Hawkins told police that he and Clark picked up a hitchhiker known only as "Mildred" and began arguing near here over his attentions to her. In that statement he said Clark pulled a gun and was shot accidentally during a scuffle.

Pettit said that after questioning by state criminal investigation and identification officers yesterday Hawkins signed a statement in which he said that no woman was involved. Pettit said that in the new statement Hawkins said that he and Clark got into an argument over whether to drive to New York to the world series.

Pettit said that in the statement Hawkins said he wrestled the gun away from Clark and shot Clark.

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Flagstad To Sing New Strauss Songs

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27 (UP)—Soprano Kirsten Flagstad says she will present four new pieces written by the late Richard Strauss for the first time during a London appearance in May, 1950.

She said Strauss wrote the songs in 1948. He wrote her he admired the way she sang some of his more difficult songs and for that reason wanted her to be the first to sing the new songs.

Warns Against Identification Thru SS Cards

Do not accept social security cards as identification in cashing checks. This warning was issued by Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Social Security Administration.

Nothing that recently sheriffs of some counties have reported a recurring wave of hot checks in their communities, Fisher explained that a social security card is good only for the Social Security Administration to credit wages to the name and number shown on the card.

These wages then form the basis for the Federal Government to pay retirement benefits to workers after they are 65 years old, and to the survivors of workers who die. Social security cards also are used by State governments to credit wages and pay unemployment insurance to those who qualify.

Fisher emphasized that the social security card is not good identification for any other purposes and definitely should not be accepted as identification in cashing checks.

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Three Killed In Head-On Crash

LAS CRUCES, N. M., Oct. 27 (UP)—An automobile collision 29 miles west of here yesterday claimed the lives of three men, including Deputy Administrator Williams J. Neal of the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington.

The other dead were Ted C. Perry, Safford, Ariz., an employe of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and Charles M. Bostick of Peoria, Ill.

Neal and Perry had been attending the regional convention of the National Rural Electric Cooperation Association in El Paso at which Neal had made a key speech Tuesday.

They were en route to Safford in Perry's 1947 Chrysler when the vehicle collided head-on with Bostick's 1949 Cadillac on U. S. Highway 80.

Mrs. Perry, injured in the accident, was taken to a Las Cruces hospital for treatment.

Temperatures warmed up generally over Texas the past 24 hours with only Brownsville reporting any rain and that but .10 of an inch.

The state low of 38 degrees was reported by Dalhart, Amarillo and salt flat. West Texas reports generally were in the 40s and in East Texas in the 50s, although Tyler had 46 and Texarkana 45, it was 48 at Dallas and Fort Worth.

Temperatures along the coast this morning were in the upper 50s with Brownsville's 61 the high minimum. Highly yesterday was 74 at Brownsville, Laredo and Presidio. Low maximum was 56 at Guadalupe Pass.

Skies were fair over much of the state this morning, except in the central sector where partly cloudy weather prevailed. A little drizzle was reported at Brownsville at 8:30 A. M.

The Trinity River at Dallas stood at 33.5 feet and falling at the morning reading. Flood stage is 28 feet. At Rosser, down stream from Dallas, the river was expected to hit 27 feet. Flood stage there is 26 feet. The river there, as in the Dallas area, has levees to prevent overflow.

VETS DEBTS TO BE TAKEN OUT OF INSURANCE PAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—The Veterans Administration today told veterans who owe the government money on certain benefits that all or part will be deducted from next year's big insurance dividend.

Veterans affected will be those who were overpaid on subsistence allowances while taking educational courses under the GI Bill. Also those who were overpaid on pensions, other VA benefits, and defaults on loans made good by the VA.

The VA estimates that some 600,000 veterans presently owe the agency about \$70,000,000. The VA thought it would collect between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000 through deductions from the National Service Life Insurance dividends.

The VA is scheduled to begin paying off \$2,800,000,000 about Jan. 15 to 16 to 16,000,000 veterans. The "kitty" is being cut up because veterans paid too high premiums on their national service life insurance.

The bulk of the \$70,000,000 owed the VA, the agency said, represents overpayments on subsistence allowances to GI's taking educational courses.

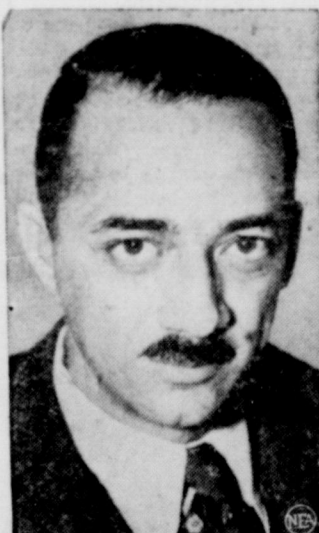

REVOLT AGAINST COMMUNISM HALTS EAST GERMAN TREATY

By JOHN B. McDERMOTT

BERLIN, Oct. 27 (UP)—Observers said today that a growing revolt against communism in East Germany apparently has caused the Russians to cancel plans for a separate peace treaty with their East German state.

Under a peace treaty, Russia would have to withdraw its occupation troops within one year, leaving the East German state in a precarious security position from the Kremlin viewpoint.

West German officials quoted West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer as saying he would ask the three-power Allied high commission to consider this question next week.

BERLIN, Oct. 27 (UP)—Wilhelm Pieck, president of Communist East Germany, asked the West German Federal Republic today to negotiate with his government on establishment of a unified Germany.

Pieck suggested in an article in the Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland that a unified Germany could gain a

"We are not interested in making a separate peace treaty," Grotewohl told the surprised news men. "Our efforts are directed at a peace treaty for all Germany."

"We are fighting for fulfillment of the Potsdam agreement, signed by the four occupation powers. We believe that this agreement would be the most favorable for Germany."

He said also his government would deal with the Berlin dispute "in the spirit of the Paris agreement providing a modus vivendi."

This was immediately viewed in western quarters as a prelude to an eastern offer to resume four-power discussions on Berlin.

These discussions were broken off by the Western Allies last Sept. 28 when the Soviets refused to fulfill commitments they made to end the city's bloody railway strike in June.

Grotewohl said discussions would begin today on granting former Nazi party members full privileges in the Eastern state provided they had not been convicted of major war crimes.

From the Western capital of Bonn, meanwhile, came reports that the West German state soon will ask the Western Allies to end their state of war with Germany.

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Officials today sought a clue to the cause of the explosion of a huge gasoline transport truck which killed two men.

Schools Cleared By TIL Board

Top Communists In Norway Ousted

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 27 (UP)—The Norwegian Communist party, which lost all its 11 parliamentary seats in the recent elections, was disclosed today to have purged Communist Secretary General Peder Furubotn and six other top leaders.
The Communist chieftains were accused of "titlism" but it generally was accepted their major crime was losing every seat in parliament won by the Communist in 1945.
The purge was announced by the official Communist organ Friheten. It said the purge was decided upon at a central executive committee meeting which inquired into the reason for the smashing Communist election defeat.
Johan Strand-Johansen, Communist candidate in Oslo who also lost his parliamentary seat, led the purge against the Communist leaders. Informed sources said Strand-Johansen would become the new secretary general.
