

Total amount of refunding bonds issued was \$731,295. Refunding bonds issues were: water and sewer, 1941, \$307,-775; tax refunding, 1941, \$357,-370; and tax refunding, 1946, \$66,150. These were issued at the rate of 85 cents on the dollars of total bonds outstanding.
