Santa Claus Coming To Eastland Saturday

Lewis Still Scorns Big Time Coal Operators

NEW YORK, Dec. 8 (UP)—John L. Lewis stayed away from contract negotiations with big anthracite companies today to sign up more small soft coal operators who have agreed to his demands for a 95 cent-a-day wage increase.

Lewis announced in Washington that "additional companies" will sign what he referred to as the "basic bituminous coal wage agreement." He indicated that he was too busy negotiating contracts with individual companies to return to New York to join in negotiations with hard coal producers who employ 78,000 miners.

Italian Land Grab Continues

ROME, Dec. 8 (UP)—A tattered army of landless peasants marching under the Red banners of Communism staked out claims on the great estates of Italy's landed gentry today for the fifth straight day.

The Communist-sponsored land grab campaign seemed to be gaining momentum daily. More and more detachments of from 50 to 300 persons, in some cases led by husky peasant women, were moving onto untilled land from the Po Valley in the north to Sicily in the south.

In most cases, the groups planted their red flags as a token of hoped for ownership and departed with little fuss when police ordered them to leave. Occasionally, a group planted some seed.

In all cases, only uncultivated land was occupied. No attempt has been made to molest the owners, their crops or their buildings.

GENERAL SAYS PROTECT OUR FREEDOM, SECURITY

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 8 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower exercised a citizen's right to speak up on national affairs last night and warned Americans to be zealous of their personal freedom and security.

He drew an overflow crowd of 15,000 Houstonians into Sam Houston Coliseum for his address to the annual membership meeting of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. It was the 109th annual meeting, and by far the biggest of the series. Mostly such affairs draw only a few hundred.

But Eisenhower, being "talked up" as a potential presidential candidate three years hence, packed the house and had his listeners cheering.

In the accepted sense of the term, it was not a "political speech," but he did not avoid matters politic.

Regimentation and the solvency of the national security are very closely linked, said Eisenhower. "Security can not be achieved in a bankrupt economy," Eisenhower declared, nor in a state where regimentation is practiced.

He called his talk "The Rambling Observation Of A Soldier," and it was delivered on the eighth anniversary of the Japanese attack that touched off World War II and elevated the Texas-born Eisenhower—now president of Columbia University—to the position of the Allies' Chief Military Strategist in the battle for Europe.

As he meticulously avoided reference to his own future political stake, so did Eisenhower avoid reference to any specific national ills.

But he gave anti-administration

listeners something to cheer loudly when he said: "We do fear that things being done, often with high motives, finally will lead us to the path from which there is no retreat—the path of regimentation."

There were these other high points in his address:

On education—"the basic purpose of all schooling is to make our children effective citizens in a free country. It is the thing a free people need if they are to govern themselves . . . it is generally the most important single phase in our way of life."

On military unification—"it is my opinion that as you leave Washington, unification becomes more of an accepted document among the people."

Waco Masonic Shrine Dedicated

WACO, Tex., Dec. 8 (UP)—Sen. Tom Connally dedicated a \$2,000,000 Temple for Texas' 185,000 Masons with the recommendation that the world solve its quarrels through the doctrines of Masonry.

The veteran Texas senator was one of several prominent persons among 4,000 Masons who gathered here on Pearl Harbor Day for dedication of the new grand lodge memorial temple to members of the order who have served in war and peace.

Connally recalled the history of Texas masonry, and some of its standard-bearers whose names stand out in Texas history—men like Stephen F. Austin, Sam Houston, Anson Jones, William B. Travis and Jim Fanning.

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Chiang, Cabinet Quit Mainland
HONG KONG, Dec. 8 (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and the Chinese Nationalist Cabinet today fled the mainland of China and established their new seat of government on the island fortress of Formosa.

Chiang left Chengtu this morning in his personal plane as Communist forces closed in on the Nationalists' last mainland capital from three directions. Communist capture of Chengtu was expected in a day or two.

The cabinet, meeting in an extraordinary session last night, agreed to remove the seat of government from Chengtu to Formosa. It also created two Guerrilla headquarters to command all military operations on the mainland.

One of the headquarters was established at Sichang, capital of Remote Sikang Province in the mountains of far Western China.

The entire Nationalist position in Southwest China collapsed along with the defense of Chengtu. Nationalist officials fled Kunming, capital of Yunnan Province, and left the city in the hands of provincial army men who were reported ready to join the Communists.

Repeat Performance
NEW YORK, Dec. 8 (UP)—An man in a blue beret and his companion walked into Joseph Eggers' gasoline station early today and asked: "Recognize us?"

"Sue do," answered Eggers. "Where's the money?" said the man in the blue beret.

"Same place," Eggers responded.

The questioner then reached into Eggers' pocket, took \$85, ordered him into the wash room and fled.

Eggers told police the same two holdup men robbed him on election night.

Texan Killed, 2 Hurt In Crash

ROLLA, Mo., Dec. 8 (UP)—A Highland, Tex., truck driver was killed and two persons were injured last night when a Texas-bound semi-trailer failed on a hill 13 miles west of here on highway 66 and crashed into two automobiles.

The dead driver was Reese J. Moran, 32. He was trapped in the flaming cab of his truck as it left the road and overturned. His body was burned beyond recognition but state troopers first identification was verified through his employer, the Southern Canning Company, of Highland.

The truck tore loose from the trailer. The latter smashed into a car driven by Louis Smith, 49, of St. Louis, and then hit a car driven by Ora Sperry of Highland Park, Mich. The Sperry family was not hurt.

Smith and his passenger, Dora Sullivan of Edgar Springs, Mo., were taken to the General Hospital at Waynesville, Mo. Neither was believed in serious condition.

Moran's body was held at the Hedges Funeral Home at Waynesville. State troopers said Moran may have been killed instantly in the crash instead of in the fire which destroyed his truck.

Two Ex-Convicts Held In Robbery
FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 8 (UP)—Two ex-convicts were held today after cafe owner Joe Smith identified them as the men who robbed him of \$500 yesterday.

The suspects are a 31-year-old McAllen man and his Houston companion, 32. They were arrested last night at a downtown hotel.

Smith was robbed by two gunmen who accosted him at the driveway of his home shortly after midnight Tuesday.

DULUTH, Minn., (UP)—In Canosia township the men fight the fires and the women raise the money. Fifteen women have formed an auxiliary to the volunteer fire department to raise funds for firefighting equipment. They call themselves "The Fire Belle."

GOVERNMENT MAY USE CONTROL TO CUT FIELD CROP PRODUCTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—The government may put a total of nine field crops under production controls to hold down surpluses next year, it was learned today.

The Agriculture Department officials said, in considering adding soybeans and dry edible beans to the list of seven crops for which 1950 controls are certain.

Production of dry edible beans set a new record this year and soy-

beans output was second only to last year's record-smashing crop.

The corn belt produces most of the nation's soy beans. Illinois alone accounted for almost 40 per cent of this year's production. Indiana, Iowa, Ohio and Missouri together accounted for more than 40 per cent. Minnesota also is a big producer.

The government cut the support price for dry beans from an average of \$4.80 per 100 pounds last year to \$3.12 this year in an effort to discourage overproduction. But the plan didn't work.

Without some control over plantings, officials fear, the government would have to strip all price supports from dry beans next year.

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As for soybeans, the problem here is tied up with plans for controlling surplus corn production next year. The government hopes to get farmers to take at least 10,000,000 acres out of corn production under a 1950 allotment program.

Unless a similar allotment program is provided for soybeans, and if soybean prices are propped, officials fear that corn belt farmers will use diverted corn acreage to plant surplus soybeans.

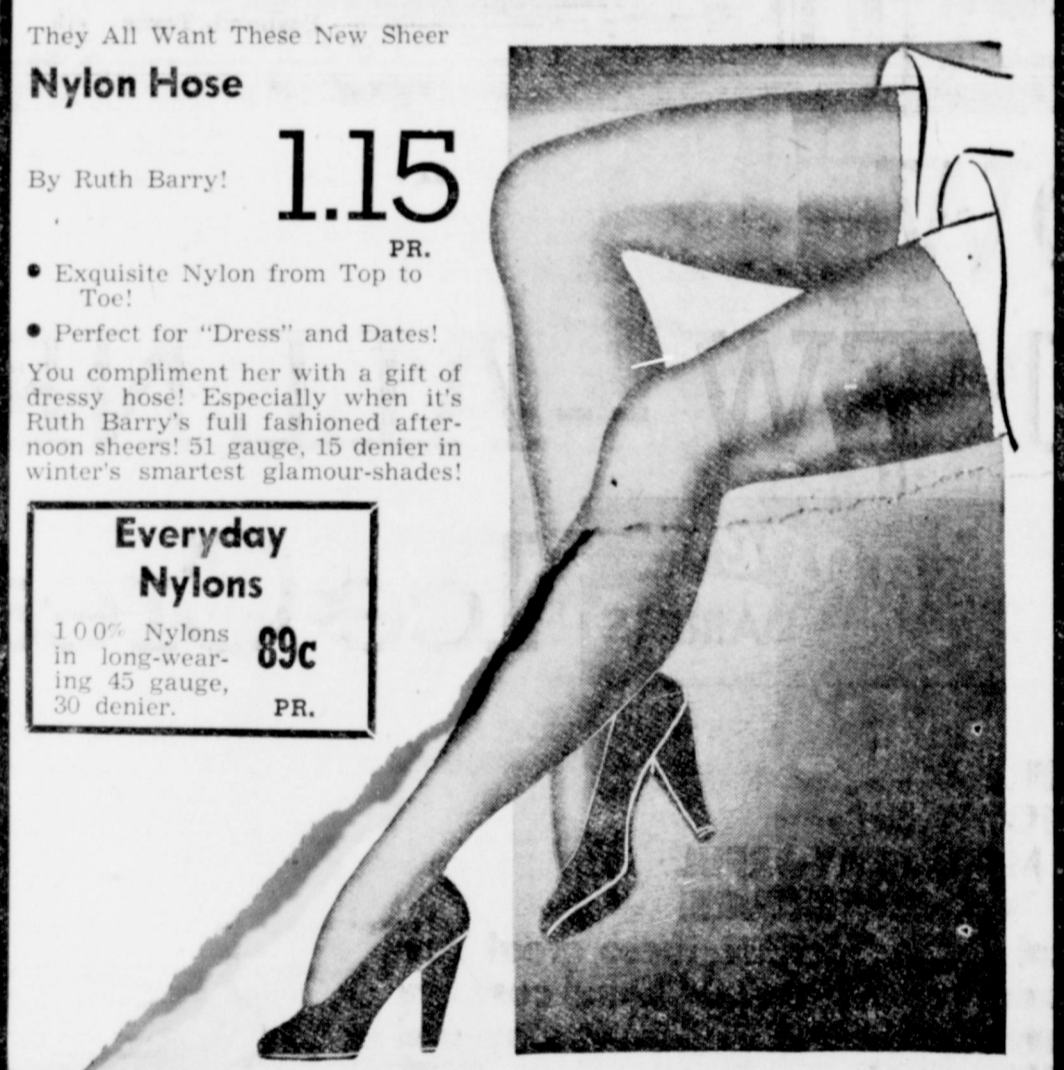
