Chicago Cracks Down On Big Narcotics Ring

CHICAGO, Dec. 17 (UP)-Federal Narcotics Agents and Police to smash their way into police staged a series of sweepingt hideouts, most of them on the raids today in an attempt to break sprawling south side. up a drug ring that has peddled narcotics to addicts including college and high school students throughout the midwest.

At dawn today, the raids had netted 26 prisoners and were still going on in neighborhoods through out the city.


