

ANSWER: West Plains Medical Center is a thirty-one bed hospital facility with two-bed special care unit to facilitate our patients with more intense medical needs, and four bassinets for our newborn babies. It is the only hospital within a thirty mile radius which offers obstetrical services.

The staff consists of three family physicians with knowledge and skills of the newest and most effective procedures for treatment of sickness, disease and injury. Seven registered nurses, twelve licensed vocational nurses, one respiratory therapist, one x-ray technologist, as well as other support personnel.

This enables us to provide not only quality care, but also excellent emergency service, as recently demonstrated by treatment provided in the emergency rooms for patients which were involved in serious accidents or other life threatening emergencies such as heart attacks that have occurred over the past several months.

Advanced diagnostic testing is available through laboratory, x-ray, and mobile units such as C.T. scanners.

The family physician serves as a gate keeper for medical care. If specialty referral is required, a good rapport exists with specialists located in Lubbock.

A personal touch leaves the patient in our hospital feeling

One year ago Wednesday, that not only the disease was treated, but the whole person. QUESTION: Will the hospital

stay open? ANSWER: Perhaps this is the most difficult question of all.

The hospital has not been able to meet monthly operating expenses. The margins to the 'break even' point however, is small so an optimistic attitude prevails.

It should be pointed out that with our current financial status many problems exist. Our employees have no medical insurance. Nurses wages are becoming noncompetitive. No room is within the budget to allow for equipment replacement or repair although such things appear inevitable. We have recently been informed the boiler's condition is terminal, carpet is greatly worn and structural improvements are

At times, indigent care is supplied totally at the hospital's expense. People with life threatening emergencies are given care regardless of ability to pay and are often ineligible for indigent funds through the county or other sources. This leaves the hospital to bear a burden it is not able to carry. The Board however, is seeking long term solutions to these financial problems.

being taken by the Board to pursue financial stability?

ANSWER: In the past three years, the Board of Trustees of West Plains Medical Center have worked many hours scarching for a final solution to the financial woes of our community hospital. The board tried diligently to establish a financial relationship with Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. These attempts were met with resistence by the Board of Directors at Methodist and only a nonfinancial "wish you well" relationship exists.

In the spring of 1987, plans were made to present a bill to the Texas Legislature to establish a hospital district, boundary lines that included only the trade area. We were within 24 hours of having that legislation passed. Unfortunately, because of procedural legalities, the bill failed. This pushed our bid for a hospital district off until 1989.

In November of 1987, the Board of Trustees were pushed to the wall to get the hospital opened. That feat was accomplished with the help of hundreds of community volunteers, hard work by administrative perthe grace of God. We had sparse financial resources but a great deal of dedication. Since that time, the hospital has functioned on a month to month basis and has managed to keep things together for the past year.

The opening, however, has not ensured our long term viability. We have been inundated with many unexpected financial burdens since the reopening. The burdens include increased taxes, and insurance premiums that have drained us of any borderline profits we have made.

We have not addressed other financial responsibilities to the Farm Home Administration in over two years. They have been understanding, but their patience grows thin.

The feelings of most Board members is that there is only one viable option to secure long term viability of our medical center; to establish voter approval of a hospital district that serves the local trade area. The Board is actively pursuing and ready to present appropriate legislation to the Texas Congress when it convenes in 1989. With legislative approval, we will bring the

The details of the necessary legislation have not been finalized, but we feel that the numerous advantages received from having a local hospital far outweigh the small increase in tax liability. One must remember that the hospital is an industry second only in size to the local school district. It has produced. for example, sixty new jobs and has infused over \$750,000 from payroll into the local economy in this one year, besides excellent Healthcare. The Board will not consider another corporate agreement as experienced by the

future plans for WPMC? ANSWER: With long term financial stability, we can then add to the Medical Staff a full time surgeon, nurse anesthetist. and additional family physicians. We will also become medicare certified and serve the senior citizen community. Ancillary services will increase by adding a full time physical therapist so people requiring rehabilitation can be served. Needless to say, we hope to provide competitive nursing salaries, employee insurance, buy equipment, repair equipment, and hire additional nursing as needed.

QUESTION: Why do we not have Medicare certification?

ANSWER: This question has several aspects to the answer.

First, in order to be medicare certified, certification requirements must be met by the hospital. There are minimum staffing requirements for registered nurses. There are also additional administrative personnel to just keep up with medicare filing, changes in medicare iaws. as well as to maximize reimbursement within the medicare system. All of these additional people cost money. Unfortunatly, the amount recovered from medicare claims does not come close to covering the additional

Secondly, there is and has been for several years, inequality in reimbursement for rural hospitals as compared to urban hospitals. We receive some times as much as 40 percent less pay for the same services rendered by urban hospitals. Medicare patients often require longer hospital stays, more numerous diagnostic tests and procedures as well as more expensive medical regimens. It is unfortunate that the medicare program has such inequalities in reimbursement. One would think if anything, we in the rural setting should be allowed as much, if not more, because of our increased cost per patient to serve. There are some legislative bills that have been introduced to Congress to eliminate some of these inequalities. We are

optimistic. Hopefully, if another avenue of financial stabilitation (i.e. hospital district) occurs, Medicare certification will be obtained.

QUESTION: What happens to the Medicare patient now in an emergency situation?

ANSWER: Presently, if a Medicare patient presents to the emergency room, they are cared for as any other patient. They will, however, be responsible for the emergency charge they incur. We have applied for emergency room Medicare certification that would make West Plains Medical Center able to give up to 24 hours of care as an outpatient, and still be reimbursed by the medicare

#### FmHA Farm Loans Slated For Minorities

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State

Director, said this week. Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county, Futch said.

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get

The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as one percent in some New England and midwestern states to highs of 68 percent in Hawaii, 57 percent in New Mexico and somewhat lower percentages in southeastern states. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific

Persons who think they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office serving their area, Futch said.
