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Clean-up Drive For Eastland To Begin Monday

The annual Eastland clean-up campaign sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club will begin Monday and continue for a month, until Saturday, April 9.

All citizens of Eastland were urged in a proclamation by Mayor W. W. Linkenhogger to get behind the drive and clean up their premises.

The plan of action will follow much the same pattern as former years. Household holders are asked to gather up all unsightly trash, weeds, old limbs, and other unsightly rubbish and pile it near the street or adjacent to an alley, where a special city pickup crew will load it and haul it away.

Trash not ordinarily handled by the city garbage truck, such as tree limbs and part of old car bodies, will be picked up during the drive.

Posters publicizing the drive are to be made by students of the two grade schools in Eastland, and the best one will win a prize awarded by the Civic League.

The posters will be displayed in downtown Eastland windows. Service Clubs and the Boy Scouts of Eastland will be asked to help the campaign.

EHS Evaluation Program To Be Held Next Week

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week will mark the Eastland High School evaluation program toward which teachers and students have been working for several weeks.

Purpose of the program is to weigh the school program both from the standpoint of the outsider and of the teacher and student, so better methods and objectives may be set up.

Such a program is required of member schools each five years by the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, which admitted Eastland High as a member this year for the first time.

City Land Nearly Sold For Taxes

County Special Tax Collector Horace Walker tried to sell some of the City of Eastland's property in the tax sale he held Tuesday on the Courthouse steps, but was halted by City Attorney Frank Sparks.

Listed for sale for taxes was the Brelsford property above Lake Eastland.

City Manager I. C. Heck said Walker argued that the city was not using the property for municipal purposes, and thus it was subject to county taxes, but Heck and Sparks contended that it is being used to protect the watershed of the city drinking water lake.

The tax sale attracted a large crowd, and bidding was spirited on many pieces of property.

2. Stage a membership drive, with the banquet to serve as a kickoff affair. Henderson also is chairman of the membership committee.

3. Work toward a number of projects, including a summer softball program for young boys and girls of Eastland, a cinder track for Eastland High trackmen, and tennis courts for all tennis players.

New Ford And \$700 Cash To Be Given Contestants

In the last standings made public, which were published in The Record two weeks ago, Mrs. Jack Lusk was on top, followed closely by Mrs. John Love and Joe Williams, with Mrs. Roy Justice in fourth place.

The car to be given away now is on display on the King Motor Company showroom floor, and may be seen there by anyone interested until the time of the presentation ceremony.

The campaign has lasted for seven weeks, and undoubtedly is the most successful of its kind ever put on in Eastland County.

During its progress, the circulation list of The Record has more than doubled, and more copies of The Record now are being distributed in Eastland County to paid subscribers than once were distributed on a free basis, many years ago when the newspaper was distributed without charge.

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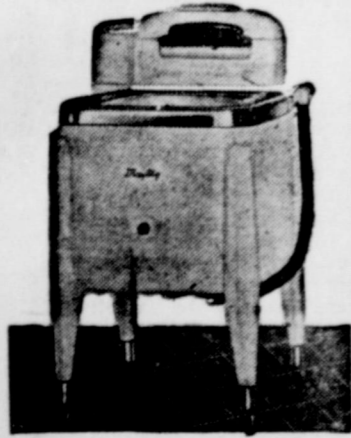

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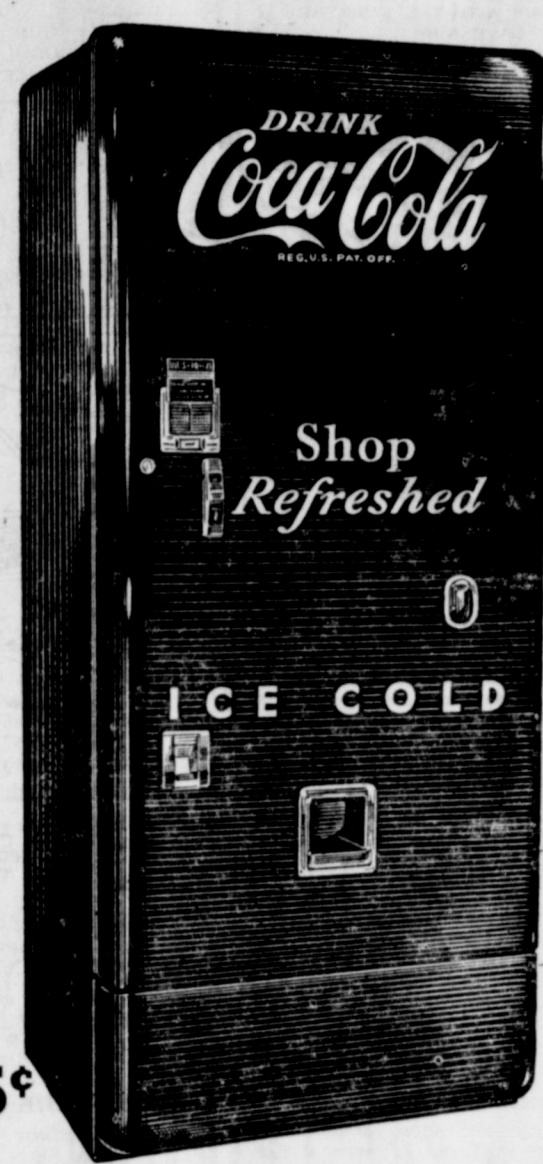
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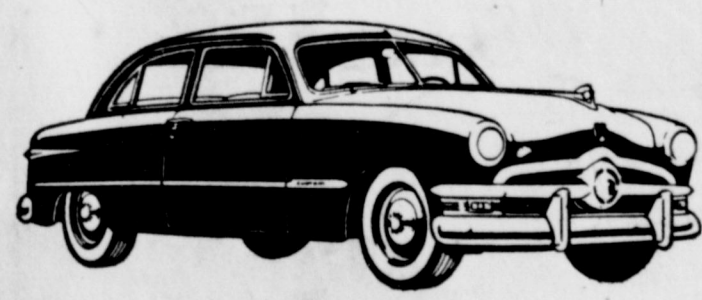

On March 12, the churches which support the service (about 100,000 churches with 25 million members) will join in a coordinated appeal for support of overseas relief and reconstruction projects. Church World Service is the overseas relief agency of 23 cooperating protestant and eastern orthodox church bodies.

WHY WAIT FOR HEAVEN?

We were fortunate to have as our guest speaker Friday morning Rev. J. B. Blunk, pastor of the First Christian Church. Mr. Blunk spoke to the students of Eastland High School on the topic, "Why Wait for Heaven?" It was an interesting speech, enjoyed by all the students.

Following is a summary of his talk:

More and more people every day are becoming aware of God's desire for us to have Heaven on earth, and not wait for it in the real sense. He wants us to live each day abundantly and to the fullest. The lives of youth should especially be enjoyed. Often we seek everywhere for happiness when it really is all around us. We just cannot seem to find it. When the war began many people were of the opinion that after we had won it, then, and only then, could we be happy. But after the war reconstruction began, and it seemed the world was in as much turmoil as it had ever been.

Those who are not happy on earth certainly cannot be happy in Heaven, because you still have the same character and personality. A survey to give the percentage of people who were happy and those who were unhappy showed that one-fourth were happy and three-fourths were unhappy. This is a bad situation. A verse from the Bible states this: "The Kingdom of God is within us and is good." This very verse tells us that happiness and goodness should radiate from each of us.

Unhappiness is caused chiefly by our holding on to past failures and our stubborn refusal to forget them. Often we attempt to grasp things that can not, and never really do happen. Failures weigh some people down. There is a skill in forgetting our wrong doings and things that make us

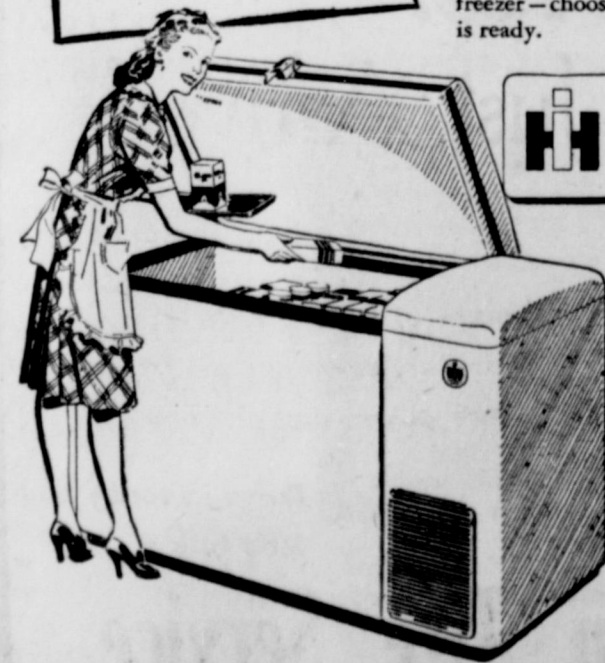

the lake was not large enough to make the project feasible, but said he intended to talk to the City Commission about it anyway.

Further engineering can be done to check the figures, he said.

Except for Ranger, costs of water to the other towns in the project as outlined by the reclamation engineers would be even higher than Eastland's.

Ranger would have to pay 17 cents per 1000 at the city gates. Cisco would have to pay 24 cents, Gorman 23 cents and De Leon 32 cents.

Burleigh said these rates are not prohibitive for towns that are really in a bind for water.

Burleigh said possible lake sites at Cisco and at Mangum had been surveyed, but both had been rejected because of inadequate water supply.

The water at the Leon dam would be essentially the same as Eastland's present water, which is of excellent quality, Burleigh said.

At the meeting's close, Mayor Price Crawley of Ranger said he would call a meeting in a short

Census Will Reveal Trend In Farm Sizes

How the post-war years have affected the size of farms in Eastland County will be one of the interesting disclosures to be revealed by the 1950 Census of Agriculture to be taken in April.

The 1945 farm census showed that one-tenth of all the farms in the country, or 594,561, were 10 acres or under in size. The number of such small farms had increased greatly during the "back to the farm" movement of depression years but declined during the later 1930's, and then showed another increase during the war years.

Farms of 10 acres and under increased in number all over the nation from 1940 to 1945, but the greatest increase was in the South.
