Officials To Meet Dam Project

Officials of Eastland, Ranger, German and De Leon have met to another meeting at Eastland Courthouse Thursday next week to consider the Bureau of Reclamation's plan for a dam on the Leon and another system to carry the five towns. Plans from the bureau will be carried out by Bureleigh of Austin, planning engineer. A regular meeting was held last week at which businessmen outlined plans for a \$500,000 project, and at that time was agreed to hold a further meeting at which officials of all the towns involved would express their views on the matter. The cost of the project is estimated at \$1,000,000. It is unlikely this week that any of the towns would be called to view the project.

Mass X-Rays To Be Taken In Eastland By Mobile Unit

Plans for mass chest X-rays of residents of Eastland and nearby territory were made Thursday afternoon at a meeting in the Courthouse. A mobile TB X-ray unit of the State Health Department will be in Eastland Friday and Saturday of next week and Monday and Tuesday of the following week, March 24-25-27-28, to take the X-rays. The unit will be stationed in the building behind the Texas Electric Service office, it was announced. At the meeting Thursday, principal efforts were devoted to devising means for getting public cooperation in the move. Heading the drive are Judge M. L. Long and Mrs. Marene Johnson. Local sponsor for the mass X-ray program is Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, and its co-chairmen are Mrs. Oscar Avera and Mrs. M. D. Fox. It was stressed that the examinations will be free to all, but that the project is not for charity. The purpose is to catch unknown cases of lung trouble and thus halt its spread among the general population. Only persons 15 years of age or older are to be examined. It will take only a few minutes to take the X-ray picture, and disrobing will not be necessary, it was stressed. A special time was to be announced later for X-raying high school students. The examinations on a mass scale are sponsored by the Texas Medical Association in a move to get rid of tuberculosis, once the number one killer of mankind but now far down the line as a result of such measures as the mass examinations. The goal of the program will be to have a chest X-ray made of every able-bodied person in and near Eastland during the four days the unit will be here. The unit will be in Ranger Friday and Saturday of this week and Monday and Tuesday of next week; it will be in Cisco March 31-April 1-4-5, and will be in Rising Star April 7 and 8.

Ranger Man Charged In Pipkin Burglary

Tommy Higdon, 22, of Ranger, was arrested Tuesday in Colorado City and charged with burglary of the Pipkin Grocery Company office in Eastland Jan. 26, Sheriff J. B. Williams said. Burglars got \$120 and a watch in the job. The watch has been recovered. James A. Houghton of Ranger has been charged with burglary in connection with the Pipkin job and is free on \$2000 bond.

Peanut Growers Get Break Under Proposed Law

Peanut growers of Eastland and other Texas counties get a break under a bill that was adopted by a joint Senate-House committee in Washington, but whether they will benefit depends on whether both houses finally pass the bill, E. D. David, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association of Gorman, said Thursday. Under the bill, peanut growers of Texas would have their acreage quotas raised about 10 percent, and would be able to grow unlimited quantities of peanuts for pressing into peanut oil. The oil-bound peanuts would not have any support price, however, but would sell at an open market price. David said the hitch is that the peanut measure is tied up with a bill to restore some acreage to cotton and wheat growers, and all must sink or swim together. There is no particular opposition to the peanut measure, he said, but some has developed for the other two crops. The cotton part of the bill if finally passed would give cotton growers at least 75 percent of their average cotton acreage for 1946, 1947 and 1948. Eastland PMA Administrator Emmett Powell said the cotton measure will be of immense benefit to a handful of farmers in the county who have been consistent cotton growers. Meanwhile, Powell's office was holding up peanut quota mailings until Congress arrives at some decision.

With the thoroughness with which Mrs. T. E. Richardson and her Civic League ladies are going about the job of the clean-up drive in Eastland, the town should be not only clean but shining when the drive is over. Help them—they're trying to help you live in a better town.

Once a good while ago away out in West Texas I used to take on the job of weather maker and produce rain when it was needed, and dry weather when somebody was throwing a big shindig. The dry weather was lots easier to produce out there, I might add. The last week, what with a pair of dust storms, two nights of hard freezes, and various other miscellaneous weather, I was mighty glad no one could blame me for the weather we've been getting in Eastland County. But I am going to see if I can't do something to get it to rain a bit more.

Speaking of rain, the water level in Lake Eastland is only about 20 inches or so below the level of the spillway, so I guess it won't be time to start worrying about that for a while.

City To Take On Several Projects

Members of the Eastland City Commission Friday night of last week voted to buy a weed cutter for Eastland, to extend a water main to the Negro section of town so a fire hydrant can be installed there, and to buy 250 feet of fire hose every three months for a year. The weed cutter was expected to cost around \$1100. Action on the projects had been considered earlier, and had been deferred until after the parking meter election to see if the city would have a continued income from that source. The commission also voted to take up eight parking meters on South Seaman Street near the Sinclair-Prairie Building and return them to the parking meter company for credit, along with others on hand that had been taken up earlier.

A thousand feet of pipe will be required to lay the line to the colored section. The commission advised V. A. Cross of Abilene, State Department of Health employee who has been campaigning for a rat-proofing drive in Eastland, to see owners of buildings here to find if they will cooperate in the project to rid the downtown area of rats.

Two Charged With Theft Of Gasoline

A. C. Baker and Tommy Craven of Eastland were charged last week end in justice court in Eastland with theft of gasoline and tampering with a pipeline after Baker was burned about the legs in a flash fire that destroyed his car near Morton Valley. Sheriff's officers said the men were taking drip gasoline from a Lone Star Gas Company line when the fire occurred. 40-60 Per Cent Yield Predicted By County Agent

Eastland County and surrounding areas should have a 40 to 60 per cent fruit crop this summer despite the paralyzing cold Monday and Tuesday mornings, of no further late freezes come, County Agent J. M. Cooper said Thursday after an inspection of some of the orchards in the county. Cooper warned that hail or other weather conditions also have to be taken into account in forecasting fruit conditions. The thermometer dropped to 26 degrees in Eastland Monday morning and to 21 Tuesday, said Weatherman J. A. Beard. Cooper said these temperatures likely would have killed all apricots, peaches, and other tenderer fruits had they come a bit later, but that when the freeze came, most trees still had some dormant buds on them, and these promise to bear fruit. Many buds still were alive in the main orchard of J. E. Spencer near Long Branch, even though most of the trees had been blooming when the cold hit, Cooper said. In a young peach orchard owned by Spencer at Long Branch, very little frost damage seemed to have been done, Cooper said. At still another orchard, none of the trees had bloomed to any extent, he said, and little damage was evident. In the towns of the county, the chief damage was to early blooming shrubs and to trees that had put out green leaves, but by Thursday it was evident that even this damage was not as great as it might have been. Home owners whose fast-growing young shrubs had been frozen back were advised to prune back to the old growth. Ranchers complained that the freeze nipped young range grass that was just putting on good growth, but said a few warm days and a good rain would soon remedy that. Beard reported that Eastland got 31 inch of rainfall Sunday morning when the norther hit. Any benefit from that, however, apparently was more than offset by the dry air that accompanied Wednesday's severe dust storm.

Evaluation Program To End At E.H.S.

The current evaluation program at Eastland High School will be concluded Friday when a summarization of the program will be held by the committees that have been doing the work. The program began Wednesday under direction of Dr. R. A. Collins of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene. Fifteen men and women from outside Eastland have been serving on the committees that have been finding out what is right and wrong with the school, and what is needed to make it better. The summarization meeting has been set tentatively for 2 p. m. Friday. Members of the Eastland School Board and possibly others from outside the school system will be on hand, it was said.
