

## **CENSUS DIVIDES WHOLE INTO HOLES**

ON APRIL 1, about 140,000 enumerators-fact-finders for the nation-will begin a canvas of 45 million American dwelling units and over six million farms, containing 150 million Americans.

On that day, the job of collecting the largest single body of data available for general the largest single statistical survey ever made, will get under way.

The United States census has its beginning in the heated debates of the federal constitutional convention of 1787 over the question as to whether states should have equal or proportional representation in the congress of the United States. The struggle resolved itself in the true democratic fashion of compromise. Two seats in the senate were provided for each state and a varying number of seats in the house of representatives in proportion to the popula-

To implement this provision. the framers of our constitution provided for a population count of each state at 10-year intervals. Three years later, in 1790, the first count was taken and the decennial census of the United States was born.

Compared with later ones, that first census was a simple under taking. Only the names of house hold heads were listed, and the facts sought were two: the number of males and females in each household; and whether free or

Two hundred questions-though not everyone will be asked all of them-make up the questionnaires for this year's census, covering population, housing, and agricul-ture; two hundred questions to be asked from the Mississippi Delta country to above the Arctic circle; 200 questions to be asked from the Maine lobster pots to the smudge pots in the California orchards.

The census law requires completion of all reports by December 31, 1952! And by December first of this year the

## **Nearly 1500 Have** Free X-rays Taken

Just short of 1500 persons were X-rayed in the mass Eastland program which ended Wednesday, said Mrs. Marene Johnson, chairman of the project for Beta Sigma

Phi sorority, which sponsored it. The mobile X-ray unit, which had been set up in a room at the rear of the Texas Electric Service Company office, was dismantled Wednesday evening to take to Cisco, where a similar program was to be started to run four days, as did the one in Eastland.

The Eastland total was not entirely satisfactory, Mrs. Johnson said, since a goal of about 3000 chest X-rays had been set, but was fair in view of the fact that it was the first time such a program ever had been atempted in Eastland County except for the one in Ranger last week.

In Ranger, slightly over 1100 X-rays were taken.

Women of various clubs and civic organizations of Eastland helped register those who had X-rays made in the program.

Most of those who had the Xrays taken never will hear any more about it, Mrs. Johnson said, because those whose lungs show

no trouble will not be notified. Anyone whose X-ray picture has indications of trouble will be notified, and advised that he would do well to see his family doctor.


