

Choose Bible County For Defeated Amendment

Bovina and Parmer County voters were strongly in favor of

a proposed constitutional amendment to enlarge the state senate from 31 to 39 members.

In the election which was held Tuesday, Parmer voters favored the amendment by almost a 5-1 margin. It was, however, soundly defeated across the state. This means the state senate will continue to have 31 members in the future.

There will be some redistricting.

In this county voters 228 "for" ballots with 45 against. Bovina voters favored the amendment, 43-8. Other county precincts voted like this; Friona, 85 for, four against; Oklahoma Lane, seven for, two against; Lakeview, 16 for, three against; Lazbuddie, 27 for, four against; Farwell, 27 for, 14 against; Rhea, 10 for, two against; and Black, 12 for and eight against.

As the total voter turnout indicated, there was only a minimum of interest in the election. OKL






Fullback Larry Flowers was called on eight times and made a total of 24. Larry Suttle, a halfback who didn't play all
