## Changed Season Asked For Duck Hunting In Texas

Helping arrange shooting dates so that migratory waterfowl hunters in the sprawling state of Texas may get a fair break this fall has been undertaken by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. In the matter of when to shoot ducks and geese, what time of day to begin and quit and the daily bag and possession limit total, the commission functions merely in an advisory capacity. This is because the final decision is made by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

The commission, through action at its recent meeting at Pampa, already has asked the Federal authorities to cut Texas into two zones so that the season in the Panhandle and extreme West Texas might run concurrent with the surrounding areas of Oklahoma and New Mexico, thus providing for an earlier shooting season than the state at large. Later open season dates are preferable in the more southerly sections of Texas since the waterfowl reach those areas later.

For the main part of the state, the commission has suggested that the split season plan of last fall be replaced by a straight shooting period beginning November 10. In 1949, Texas duck and goose gunners hunted from November 4 to November 21 and then from December 21 to January 7.

Bag limits also would be changed to provide for eight birds a day or the same number in possession. Game Department field men have observed some tendency by hunters to kill more than the bag limit when the daily limit is only four birds, leaving the less desirable species to waste where they fall. Thus, waste would be eliminated through a higher daily limit since the proposed possession limit would be unchanged. Similar problems involve the suggested zoning plan to accommodate the Panhandle sportsman. Texas, although as large as two or three ordinary states, has never been zoned for waterfowl hunting. Perhaps one reason is, that with the season in the northern extremity

of the state opened two or three weeks earlier than that in the state at large, hunters from the southern area would move in to share in the earlier season, and the hunters in the northern area would legally travel southward to enjoy a prolonged gunning period within their own state. The commission may recommend and suggest but the final decision is to the Federal authorities.

## U. S. Tax Income Lagging In Texas

Federal internal revenue collections in Texas from July 1, 1949 through April 30, 1950 lagged 10 per cent behind the comparable period in the 1948-49 fiscal year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Employment taxes were down three per cent from the first 10 months of last fiscal year, with holding taxes, four per cent, and income taxes, six per cent.

First district (South Texas) turned in an 8 per cent decline in collections as compared with a six per cent decrease for second district (North Texas). With the exception of a two per cent rise in employment taxes in the second district, all classes of internal revenue collections were below their year-earlier levels in both districts.

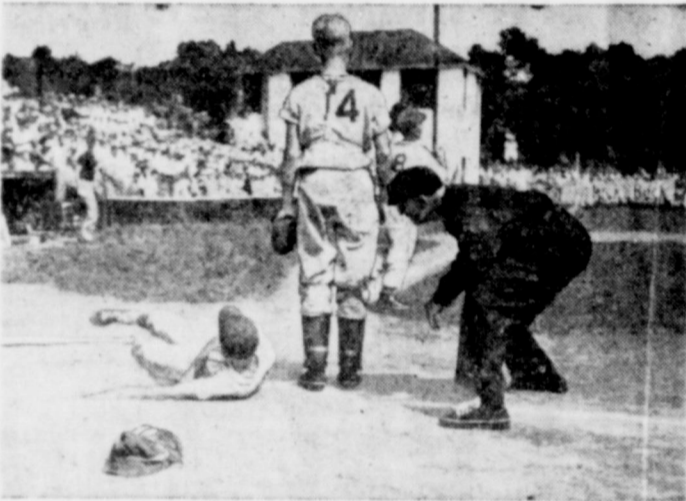

# June Is Proclaimed Dairy Month

June is dairy month in Texas as the multi-million dollar industry is seeking to focus the attention of some 7 million Texas consumers on the greater use of dairy products as the road to better health.

Cities large and small, in homes and on farms, consumers are being told through a 30-day statewide observance that buttermilk, cheese, ice cream and milk "roads-to-good-health-musts" are the family table 365 days of the year.

Governor Allen Shivers is promoting June as Dairy Month in Texas and has paid tribute to the industry responsible — "Old Bossie", the mascot of the dairy industry. It is proper that attention be directed upon a faithful servant whose tireless service has brought health, strength and economic well-being to the people of Texas."

Governor Shivers said: "Old Bossie will be honored during June for that service and for the health and life-giving qualities of her milk which science claims as nature's most nearly perfect food."

The Dairy Products Institute of Texas, coordinating the June program, released figures citing the contributions of the industry to the state.

Last year dairying produced more than \$200 millions in farm income for 3 out of 4 Texas farms and some 12,000 commercial dairies. A dairies dependent upon it as their chief income. Some 500,000 farm units, the Institute estimated, depended upon milk and dairy products for their incomes.

The Institute estimated that the dairy industry contributed \$400 million annually to the commerce of the state with some 500,000 persons earning a livelihood from production, processing, distribution and sale of dairy products.

Housewives spend more than 10 per cent of their food budgets on dairy products," said E. O. Urbach, state chairman of June Dairy Month program. "For this year we get 30 per cent of the food consumed in this state. And in one-third of the family food, the housewife provides her family with three-fourths of its calcium, half of its riboflavin, and substantial quantities of every other nutrient vital to human development."

ample. Isn't it ridiculous for children to have to suffer with it when it may be prevented by simple vaccination?

Whooping cough goes by the scientific name of pertussis. Regardless of what you call it, it still means violent, painful wracking coughing that takes the breath and tears at the chest and throat walls.

Pertussis is prevalent among children everywhere. About 15 out of every 100 cases are in children under two. North America, from time to time, seems to have more than its fair share of cases.

Sometimes it's fatal, especially to very small children. About 85 out of every 100 whooping cough deaths are among two-year-olds and less. And, strangely enough, most deaths are among girls. In 1949 Texas had 46 whooping cough deaths so far in 1950, an average of 323 cases have been reported every week.

Whooping cough is spread through droplet infection — that is, by breathing air contaminated by a sneeze or cough of an infected person. You can get it from kissing the personal things of an infected person, too. It is communicable from about seven days after exposure until three weeks after the coughing starts.

The important thing about whooping cough is that vaccination may protect against it. It's the only thing that will. If an unvaccinated child gets the disease, he will thereafter have what is called a "definite and prolonged immunity." But the fact of the matter is that second attacks have been known to occur.

Vaccination of all preschool children is the answer to control. "Booster" shots may be advisable within a year after the initial vaccination. Your family doctor will make that decision.

## More Farm Loan Bonds Advocated

An additional issuance of \$50,000,000 bonds for the Veteran's Land Program plus additional appropriations for increasing the staff of the office to facilitate the handling of loan requests will be urged by the next Legislature by Senator Kyle Vick of Waco, candidate for lieutenant governor.

"This increase in bonds and staff allotments can be handled without a penny cost to the Texas taxpayers," Senator Vick said. "Of the \$25,000,000 bonds issued last year, \$5,000,000 have already been used, another \$10,000,000 in bonds have been cashed, leaving only a \$10,000,000 surplus, with thousands of loan applications crowding the loan staff."

Some veterans' applications have been in the mill for from six to eight months with no action in sight. "This is not the fault of the Veteran's Land Board," Senator Vick emphasized. "The staff is just not large enough to take care of the flood of loan applications, and the original bond issue will not be sufficient to cover all applications."

The Veterans' Loan Bill authorized the issuance of \$25,000,000

in state bonds to cover loans to GI's of the last war for the purpose of buying farm and ranch loans. Veterans may borrow as much as \$7,500, less a five per cent down payment at three per cent interest for a 40-year period. The loan is repayable in monthly installments.

planting. If these seeds have a hard coat, soaking in warm water over night is suggested for better germination.

After the garden is planted, it is important to stir the soil frequently to conserve moisture and prevent packing.

If the garden is irrigated during the winter months, it is essential to cultivate as soon as the soil is dry enough to pulverize.

Some recommended vegetables for fall gardens are Irish potatoes, tomatoes, cabbage, leaf lettuce, carrots, beets, English peas, onions and spinach.

Insect control is just as important for fall gardens as for spring gardens and should not be forgotten.

to plant shelled seed that have been treated with arasan or ceresan. The peanuts should be dug as soon as they are matured if the disease is present. Rotation of crops helps to reduce the presence of the disease.

Leaf spot which produces black spots on the leaves, may cause damage if wet weather prevails in June and July. This disease may be controlled by dusting with 325 mesh dusting sulphur at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds per acre, and making two to four applications at intervals of two weeks as needed.

The time necessary to cure peanuts before threshing depends on weather conditions. Peanuts that are placed in small piles are usually ready to thresh in four to six days.

If the peanuts are threshed shortly after harvesting, they must be further dried in sacks. A good piling of sacks of peanuts to dry them is to make a rick, one sack length in thickness, the rick running north and south so that the sun may shine on one end of each sack in the forenoon and on the other end in the afternoon.

## Precautions Given To Increase Peanut Yield

Most peanuts have been planted or will be planted soon, but precautions should be taken to increase yields, says E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A & M College.

Diseases attack this crop quite readily, and measures should be taken against them. The plants are resistant to nematode infections.

Southern blight is one of the diseases most prevalent in the field. The best control measure is

## Now Is Time To Plant Fall Gardens

BY GEORGE G. McBEE

Now is the time to start planning for a fall and winter garden, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist, at Texas A & M College.

Hardy vegetables planted in the fall will last through the entire winter season and into the early spring. If the winter is extremely bad, a frame garden may have to be used.

In preparing a plot of land for the spring garden, remove all weeds and vegetable plant refuse before plowing. If manure is available, it should be spread on the ground. Plowing should not be more than four or five inches.

After plowing is completed, all clods and lumps should be broken up and the surface of the ground smoothed off. This allows for proper drainage of the soil in case of heavy rainfall.

Seed saved from the spring planted gardens may be used for fall planting. About one-fourth more seed should be used for fall
