### Milo Best Yet; Cotton Good This year can be marked down as one of the best in history

from an agricultural standpoint in Parmer County and the Bovina area in particular.

Grain sorghum vields have exceeded all previous records. The average yield per acre exceeds previous records by as much as 15 or 20 per cent, according to elevator men here. The overall grain sorghum production totals more pounds than any previous year eventhough acreage controls have reduced the total number of acres to the crop.

Harvest is considered to be 95 per cent complete in this area. All that remains now is the "cleaning up" of fields which matured late.

Promise of a bumper cotton crop adds to the rosy farm picture for 1965.

The cotton has been benefited greatly by a late freeze date this season. The late freeze date has allowed the cotton to mature and thus increase the yield. Also, the quality of the cotton is expected to be greatly improved because of the increased length of the growing season this year.

Cotton harvest isn't expected to get into full swing for the next couple of weeks -- sometime after the first hard freeze. A lengthy period of damp weather could handicap cotton harvesting and also hurt the quality of the crop. Barring an excessive amount of rain, however, cotton in the area will have one of the best years ever.

Floyd Coates of Oklahoma Lane Gin says he expects average cotton yields of a bale and a half per acre to be common this

Ovid Lawlis of Lawlis Gin Co. says, "We have prospects now for one of the best crops ever. From an area standpoint, we have missed hail damage this year and good rains during the summer helped production."

Don Sides of Bovina Gin Co. agrees that the prospects are bright with the yield and the quality of the crop both aided by the late freeze date.

Elevator men agree that a conservative estimate for the average yield of grain sorghum per acre is 6500 pounds. This total is up by as much as 20 per cent over last year. The late freeze apparently didn't help or hurt the grain sorohum. The crop was, however, benefited greatly by ade-

quate rainfall during June and July. Reports of small acreages of grain sorghum producing as much as 10,000 pounds per acre indicate what a great year this was for grain sorghum.

Jim Russell of Bovina Wheat Growers says this was one of the best years ever from a total production standpoint even with the decreased total number of acres.

Harry Johnson of Sherley Grain Co. points out that this year has seen some of the highest individual yields ever. He has reports of a 334 acre field yielding an average of 8677 pounds per acre, of 72 acres making a 9105 average and 52 acres producing an average of 8788, among others. Adding to the brightness of the agriculture picture are sugar beets which are producing another great crop. This is only the second year for sugar beets to be grown here so this year's crop can't be called a bumper one since there's only one other year to use for a comparison. Individual high yields may not hit the peaks which some did last year, but the overall average is expected to be considerably better than 1964. Sugar beets were hindered by leaf spot disease this year.

For vegetables, 1965 was considered to be only an "average" year, according to Charlie Flynn of Gateway Produce Co. The vegetable packing season is now all over except for cabbage, which will continue for another month, Flynn indi-

Bell peppers and cucumbers were considered to be the best vegetable crops this year from a profit standpoint. "Blight and mildew caused by too much moisture and humid-

ity during the summer hurt the yield of some vegetables," Thus, the summer rains which greatly helped milo and aided



#### Deposits Show Slight Increase

Deposits in First State Bank of Bovina as of October 13 showed a slight increase over comparable time a year ago. Total deposits this year on that date were \$1,657,782,39 as compared with the figure of 12 months earlier, \$1,620,354,444. Loans at the third quarter call this year totaled \$1,129,-410,98. They were down considerably from the total of the same period in 1964, \$1,407,565,09. Deposits at the bank have increased at a fast clip during the past three weeks -- since the call, according to Alfred Moody, cashier. Total deposits this week were near the \$2,000,000 mark, he said,


