Method Of Administering City-County Hospital At-Ranger Changed By Board

The Ranger General Hospital, formerly the Ranger City-County Hospital and still operated under the city-county hospital laws, recently has gone under a new system of operation, and John Allen of Mineral Wells has been appointed administrator of the institution.

Allen, formerly supply officer in charge of the U. S. Naval Hospital at Charleston, S. C., is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles, and studied hospital administration in the graduate business school at Harvard University.

Under the new system, Allen works out plans for operation of the hospital, presents them to the board, and after action by that group, puts their orders into operation.

Jack Chamberlain, who is drilling the No. 1 Davenport oil test about four miles east of Eastland and a half mile south of Olden, said this week that he was having caving trouble in the pay sand, but that prospects are for a good well that may make about 15 barrels per hour.

Casing has been set at the producing level of about 2400 feet. The well was drilled to the Caddo at about 2900 feet, and then was backed up to the unidentified sand formation and shot with two quarts of nitroglycerine. Chamberlain said that 60 feet of over 100 feet of the pay section had been shot.



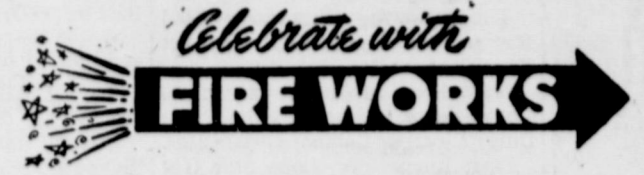

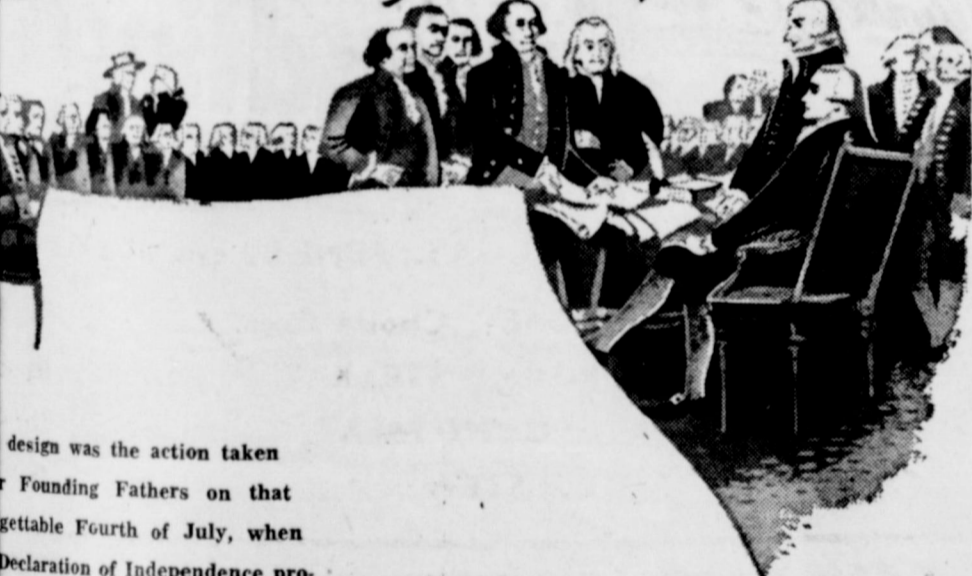

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 CENTS AN HOUR OR \$2.48 A DAY—although their present earnings are substantially higher than those of workers in other industries!

Board Says Demands Unjustified

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employees, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

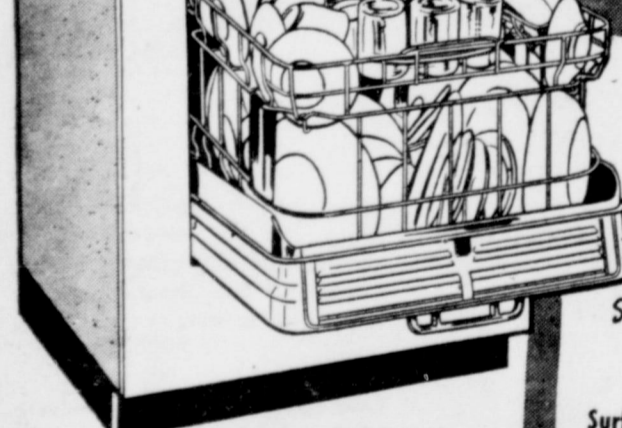

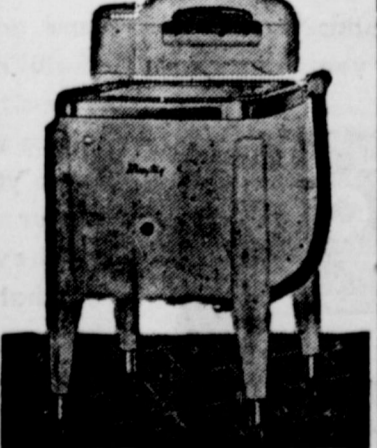
