# Side ssues

Eastland got something over an inch of rain Thursday, with .80 recorded by Weatherman J. Beard early in the morning, and that brought the July total rainfall to something like five and a half inches, which is pretty phenomenal, when you consider that the July average for the past 10 years or so has been about what fell Thursday.

Ruth W. Ducker, while talking to Manager H. J. Tanner of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, discovered he had weather records dating back for 15 years, and dug up some data on July rainfall in Eastland.

During those 15 years, the most rainfall that had ben recorded in July was 2.83 inches in 1936. In July of 1943 only a tenth of an inch of rain fell. In other Julys, rainfall measured in 1949 1.3; in 1948, 1.4; in 1947, 1.1; in 1946, 1.03, and 1945 1.8.

The Texas Almanac says that July rainfall in Eastland averages it. 1.89 inches, but recent years do not hold up the average-until along comes 1950 and knocks all the figures into a cocked hat, whatever that is.
