Eastland, Coleman To Open Season

Bluecats Favored To Repeat Victories Of Last Two Years

Whether the gloomy things Coach Wendell Siebert has been saying about his Eastland High School Maverick football team are true will be demonstrated when the Mavericks open their 1950 season at 8 p. m. Friday against Coleman at Coleman.

The Bluecats will be heavily favored to win, in any event, but how well the unseasoned Maverick eleven fares in Coleman may be to some extent a tip-off on how the season will go.

Last year a not quite so green Eastland team opened with Coleman, and lost 19 to 0. A year before that, another green Maverick eleven lost to the Bluecats 14 to 0. And in both of those seasons the Mavericks came along later to have fair seasons and to play some real football before the end of the year.

Siebert said his starters will be Rodney Stephen at quarterback, with Doug King, Dick Evatt and Gerald Ables or Morris Lee Riggan as the other backs; Bob Womack at center, Norman Watson and Hill Gaeta or Larry Miller at guards, Derrell Black and Gerald Davis at tackles and Eddie Haines and Edwin Aaron at ends.

Out of that whole group, only Womack, Davis, and King are seniors. Most of the rest are juniors. As in past years, a large delegation of Eastland fans is expected to make the trek to Coleman to see the Mavericks begin their season. The Coleman field holds around 5,000 people.

The Mavericks were showing a little more cohesion in practice this week, but still failed to remember blocking and other assignments too well in scrimmage, of which there was plenty.

All of the crippled boys except two were recovering from their hurts, and seemed in good shape to play. The exceptions are Lowell Herring, who cracked an arm bone, and Alan Vermillion, who did likewise to a thumb bone.

Siebert said this week that he has been delighted with the spirit shown by his squad, and hopes the boys will show as much in actual competition.

His biggest worry was lack of depth; injuries to any of three or four boys could damage the team play immeasurably.

Assistant Coach Ed Hooker will see a Maverick team in action for the first time in Coleman.

He said this week in a very few well chosen words that he has been pleased with the attitude shown by the boys, and thinks they will progress as the season rolls along—barring injuries.

In practice, offensive standouts for Eastland have been King and Ables in running, with Stephen as passer and punter despite his 117 pounds. Defensively, Haines has been in a class by himself, with Black, Watson, Womack, Evatt and others showing up well.

Aaron got a late start because of illness, but is fast getting back strength and weight.

If a number of Mavericks can refrain from getting state fright in the Coleman game, the Eastland eleven just might stage an upset. But with so many inexperienced players, that is just about too much to expect. Only Haines, Davis, King and Evatt have seen much football from the playing field, and most of that was on defense.

Coleman is not reported as too strong this year, but has a number of experienced players, and a big and husky squad to choose from.

A full schedule of games will be played by teams of District 8-A Friday.

Eastland will play at Coleman, Ranger at Hobbs, N. M., and Cisco at Nocona. Comanche, Dublin will entertain Hico at home, and Hamilton will be host to Goldthwaite. De Leon will go to Lakeview.

At this stage, Ranger is the district favorite, with Comanche and Hamilton trailing in that order. Cisco is an unknown factor, having had several bad years in Class AA before dropping to Class A this season.

Bids Are Called On New Highway

A call for bids on constructing 6.596 miles of new highway between Eastland and Cisco was made this week by the State Highway Department to assure early construction of Eastland County's first major four-lane highway.

The bids are to be opened in Austin Sept. 20. Clearance for the project came when Commissioner Arch Birt of Eastland Precinct 4 had five suits filed to condemn property for right of way for the highway.

Plans are to use the present highway for two lanes of the new Highway 80 strip, and to build a new two-lane highway alongside it.

Highway 80 already is four-laned on Strawn Hill in the county, and the Ranger-Morton Valley road is having a few four-lane sections built in on top of hills, but the Eastland-Cisco strip will be the first of any length in this area.

The proposal for bids calls for the new highway to be built from .9 mile east of Cisco to Hillcrest Avenue in Eastland.

Over 70 Attend Party, Graduation

Over 70 veterans and members of their families and friends last week attended the annual family party of the Bookkeeping and Accounting Class of the Eastland County Vocational School.

This year, as a special event, Eight of the students who have been continuously enrolled in the class since it started in February, 1946, received certificates showing completion of the Bookkeeping course, which also included work in public speaking, business English, spelling, vocabulary, arithmetic, filing, typing, commercial law, personality development, office management and economics.

Purpose of the visits, of course, will be to interview young men interested in enlisting in the Marine Corps.

Sergeant Norton said men now can enlist in the Corps for three or four years, or for the duration. The Marines now also are taking married men and men with dependants, he said.

Band Program Here Set Up On 10-Year Basis By Board

Eastland High School's band program, which had been built with a great deal of work and expense in the period of three years, was safe this week when the Eastland School Board endorsed a plan for a ten-year program of financial expenditures needed to equip and supply the band.

The band program as it now exists had been threatened when Band Director T. R. Atwood earlier had turned in his resignation, saying he was going to take a job with the U. S. Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Atwood, the only band director the school has had since the band was reorganized, and who is recognized as having worked wonders with the musical organization, was persuaded to reconsider his resignation, and stayed on with the promise of the long-term plan for the band.

The school board beginning with the present year allocated a certain amount for the band, and in doing so, gave notice that the action was based on pledges of financial support from other Eastland groups.

The Band Boosters Club has pledged itself to raise \$500 a year or more for the band, and it was reported that a majority of the City Commission had agreed that the city could pay \$50 a month, or \$600 a year, for upkeep of the band.

Other organizations had been approached to contribute to the program.

At the meeting Wednesday, the resignation of Dr. W. K. Cowan as a board member was accepted and the board members sent a note of regret and appreciation to Dr. Cowan, who moved to Colorado City.

The board did not announce when a successor would be named.

Quarterback Club To Buy Equipment

Members of the Eastland Quarterback Club Tuesday night voted to buy a drying machine and a whirlpool massaging outfit for the Eastland High School athletic department.

The dryer is needed to dry out athletic uniforms which are washed by the school athletic managers, but which often cannot be dried out naturally because of unfavorable weather.

The club members also discussed the need for painting seats at Maverick Field, and President H. L. King appointed a committee to look into the matter.

Need of action on this score apparently was wiped out the next night, however, when the Eastland School Board voted to buy paint for the job. It was understood that volunteer labor will be used for the painting work.

784 Students Listed In Eastland Schools During First Week

Eastland schools to date have 784 students enrolled, including 42 Negroes, School Supt. W. G. Womack said Thursday.

Because of the fact that there are two less white teachers than a year ago, and the enrollment is about the same, Womack was having trouble this week with an over-concentration of children in some grades, such as the first and fifth.

However, he said the problem is being met by shifting children from school to school, and by shifting teaching personnel if necessary.

Mrs. Eugene Green Wednesday was elected to teach fifth grade work in the West Ward school.

Womack said that parents interested in starting pre-school age children in first grade work should contact him at once.

A plan was reported afoot under which parents of such pre-school age children would pay a certain amount of tuition, the money to be used for part of a teacher's salary. The schools would meet the rest of the salary cost, and would put the youngsters into regular first grade classes, which then would have plenty of room.

Womack said the ages of pre-school age children who wish to attend school should be filed with him at Telephone 142.

42 Are Enrolled In Negro School

Forty-two Negro students have enrolled in the Eastland Douglas School, a record number because of this year's arrangement where-by Cisco and Ranger colored high school students attend the Eastland school.

County School Supt. Carl Elliott, who engineered the arrangement, spoke to the students Wednesday and told them how important it is for them to attend school daily if the arrangement is to be continued. Having two teachers for the school may be continued only if attendance is high, because of the daily average attendance requirements of the Gilmer-Aikin Bill, he said.

Of the 42 students in the school, 17 are in high school.

There are 11 Negro students coming from Cisco each day and six from Ranger.

Both Elliott and Eastland Superintendent of Schools W. G. Womack said that they believed the two-teacher school will enable the colored students to get a much better education.

New Field Getting Too Little Attention, Says Oil Operator

Eastland County's new Briggs Owen oil field "isn't getting the attention it deserves" outside of Eastland County, M. Z. Dibble, former Snyder oil operator who came here to look the new field over, said Thursday.

Dibble, who helped build up the Snyder play through long years of effort and saw Snyder boom into a West Texas oil capitol, said he was quite impressed with the new Eastland field, which has seen ten producers come in with not a dry hole yet.

He came here to investigate investing in the field, he said.

The field was attracting more and more outside operators, and it was reported that leasing in the general area of the field is brisk, with good prices paid for leases, and some royalty changing owners.

Thursday, surface pipe had been set in the Briggs Owen No. 7 well, and the rig was skidded from No. 5 to No. 7, with drilling to begin at once, a spokesman for Bankline Oil Company said.

The No. 5 well was to be given a Hydrafrac treatment Friday, and a production test is scheduled for Saturday.

It was reported that no definite estimate had been made on production on the Crossman & Savage No. 1 Perdue in the Briggs Owen Field, but operators believe it will be one of the best wells in the field.

The Perdue well extended the field further northwest.

In the morning, farms of Albert Hendricks, J. G. Caraway and Cecil Self were examined. On the afternoon tour, directed by John Simpson of De Leon, farms of J. J. Brown, J. W. Brown, Odie Rodgers and Ed Harrison were inspected.
