## Fire, Blasts Wreck Desdemona Refinery

### Too Many Explosions To Count Them, Says Town's Telephone Operator

Fire and explosions Thursday afternoon were wrecking the Desdemona gasoline plant of Magnolia Petroleum Co.

Details of the disaster were not clear, as most of the population of Desdemona reportedly left their homes fearing more disastrous blasts at the plant.

There were none known to be seriously hurt, although information was meager. The Desdemona telephone operator said the blasts had been so numerous "I wouldn't begin to guess how many there have been." She said the fire began about 12:45 p. m.

It was believed the plant would be a total loss. It was reported the roads in the vicinity were closed for a time in anticipation of the explosion of a large butane storage tank.

### Mavericks To Take On Single Wing Team In Albany

It will be a leap into the unknown for the Eastland Mavericks Friday night when they meet the Albany Lions on the Maverick Field turf in a non-conference football game.

Defeated last week 33 to 6 by a Ballinger team that displayed a strong ground game running from the T formation, the Mavericks will catch a lot of single and double wing plays from Albany. Few of the Mavericks were on hand a year ago when Albany double and triple reversed a Maverick team to the tune of 26 to 0.

Albany was beaten nearly that badly last week by a Winters team that must be stronger than anyone believed—Winters also had beaten the strong Snyder eleven. But it will be several weeks before Eastland plays Winters, and it was Albany that Coaches Wendell Siebert and Ed Hooker were working about this week.

The Lions will have a line that outweighs Eastland's by about 15 pounds to the man, and their 170-pound quarterback has 53 pounds advantage on Eastland's Rodney Stephen, if nothing in spirit and will to do.

It must be conceded that the Mavericks will be underdogs for the third time in a row, but perhaps not quite so far under as for the two previous weeks.

Siebert was wailing the loss of End Eddie Haines, his best boy, who re-hurt his ankle in the Ballinger game and probably will not suit out against Albany. Or so said Siebert.

The Eastland coach was not sure about the condition of Gerald Davis, Eastland's second best defensive player, behind Haines, who sprained his hand against Ballinger and left the game never to return.

It was the loss of these two lads, plus the pounding of fresh reserves for Ballinger against 48-minute Maverick players, that led to the 33-6 rout last week.

Eastland's Dickie Evatt plunged over for a touchdown in the second quarter to tie the score at 6-6, and it looked for a while as if a game was in the making. But Ballinger went ahead at 12-6 just before the half, and then little Harold Merrifield for Ballinger ran Eastland ragged in the second half as Ballinger piled up three more touchdowns.

Stalwart games were played by Evatt, Doug King, Stephen, and Morris Lee Riggan and Gerald Ables in the Maverick backfield, and by Haines, Harold Justice, Davis, Hill Gaeta, Larry Miller, Bob Womack, Norman Watson, Derrell Black and Edwin Aaron in the line.

But of that group, seven played the entire game, and they were pretty well worn down.

This week, Siebert planned to try using Justice, Gaeta, and perhaps Ables to plug defensive line holes, and to use Freshmen LaVerne Meroney and Jamie Jessop some as defensive linebacks, to give some of the other lads a bit of rest now and then.

### Football Contest To Be Announced

There will be a good public address system and good announcer on hand at Maverick Field for the Eastland-Albany football game at 8 p. m. Friday, James Dabney and George Fox said Thursday.

The game is to be re-broadcast over KSTB, Breckenridge, from 1 to 3 p. m. Saturday, they said. Dabney and Fox said they had been to Albany, and that 2000 fans there are planning to follow their team to Eastland.

### PMA Cover Crop Program Opening

With time at hand to plant the 1950-51 winter cover crops in Eastland County, County PMA Administrator Emmett Powell this week announced opening of the 1951 legume and cover crop program.

Powell said the support program is about the same as last year, with vetch payments 12 cents a pound and peas .055 per pound.

The PMA may help on phosphate fertilizer for winter legumes at the rate of 200 pounds per acre, and a straight rye cover crop will pay \$2 an acre if a good stand and growth is obtained and the rye is not harvested, Powell said.

Each farm is limited to one-third of the cropland for vetch or peas and one-half the cropland for rye.

Anyone wishing to grow a cover crop was advised to get in touch with the PMA office in the Courthouse in Eastland.

### Farmers To Receive Awards At Fair

Ten or 12 Eastland County farm owners are expected to be among the more than 300 Texas farmers who will receive Certificates of Achievement in ceremonies in the State Fair Auditorium Oct. 17, County Supervisor George I. Lane of the Farmers Home Administration, said this week.

Lane is planning to accompany the Eastland County delegation to Dallas for the event, and said a special bus will be chartered if there is enough local interest.

Persons who have paid up farm and home loans under the FHA program are to be honored, but Lane said that families whose farming operations are financed by the FHA are to make the trip.

In addition to the program honoring FHA paid-up borrowers, to begin at 1:30 p. m., there will be the Eastland County peanut exhibit on display again in the agricultural section of the fair.

Oct. 19 has been designated as Eastland County Peanut Day at the fair, he said.
