Attachment Writ Filed Against Tax Contract Holder

Eastland County's five-year-old delinquent tax collection program, which has been embroiled in political and other kinds of debate during most of its lifetime, was climaxed this week with the filing of a \$101,229.24 civil suit against Horace Walker of Dallas, the tax attorney who conducted the pro-

The suit, filed by the State of Texas in 91st District Court in Eastland, alleges that Walker 'fraudulently and illegally" took that much money for himself that should have gone to Eastland County and the state.

A writ of attachment was issued against Walker's property by District Clerk Roy Lane after the filing of an affidavit of attachment in the district clerk's office by W. P. Geppert, Texas assistant attorney general who helped investigate the Walker case here. It was set forth that the writ was asked by Texas Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and Attorney Gen-

eral Price Daniel. The affidavit claims the writ was necessary because in the belief of the plaintiffs, Walker was about to "dispose of property to defraud his creditors, and to convert property to money to place beyond the reach of his creditors."
