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Mavericks To Have New Formations Against Comanche

A revamped bunch of Eastland High School football Mavericks will go scalp hunting in Comanche at 8 p. m. Friday while Cisco and Ranger meet in Ranger in a game that is being billed as for the District 8-A championship.

Comanche logically will be favored over Eastland, and probably will win, with a bigger team that has more natural ability, but the smaller Eastland players have a fresh outlook on life that may give the forecasters a headache.

Coach Wendell Siebert thinks Comanche can be beaten, but he is not saying his Mavericks will do it. He does believe they have a fair chance.

To help them with that chance he has given them a new set of formations and plays, to the end that Eastland people may not realize they are looking at the same team when it goes into offensive action.

The Mavericks may be expected to try lots of passes, and to try some tricky offensive formations. More than that, the Indians of Comanche can find out for themselves.

Despite the three straight losses of the Mavericks to opponents that outclassed a light and green but always fighting team, a large contingent of Eastland citizens is expected to follow the team to Comanche.

A blow to the team this week was the loss of Gerald Ables, tall freshman who started as a back and had been used some in the line on defense. Ables quit the squad and told Siebert he had to go to work.

This left the Mavericks with almost no proven reserve backs. Alan Vermillion, who had been out since early in the season with a broken thumb, has been scrimmaging this week and may be used sparingly against Comanche. Lowell Herring, who fractured an arm, was out of his cast, but the arm still was tender.

After taking the week-end off last week, the Mavericks are in the best physical condition of the year, Siebert believes.

Comanche and Eastland were beaten by Coleman, their only common opponent, by similar scores, but Comanche otherwise has a better record. The Indians have a massive line from tackle to end, and much larger backs than Eastland.

Cisco is generally favored over Ranger in the big 8-A contest tonight, after Ranger's disastrous 62 to 20 loss to Brady a week ago. Brady earlier had a hard time winning from Cisco.

It will be heralded as a battle between two fine backs, Doug Johnson of Cisco and Jimmy Camacho of Ranger, but likely the outcome will be settled by which side can throw up the strongest defense.

In the other 8-A conference game Dublin will meet De Leon, with nothing much supposed to be at stake in the meeting of the traditional rivals. Dublin will be favored slightly.

Hamilton, rated as the third best team in the district, will be idle.

Truck Driver Dies After Accident

The body of David F. Harden, 20, Eastland truck driver who was fatally injured Wednesday in the crash of his truck near Putnam, was to be sent Friday afternoon to Pine Bluff, Ark., for burial.

Harden was taking a load of 12 cattle from Eastland to Loraine in a truck belonging to S. S. Faircloth, Jr., of Eastland when the truck apparently went out of control and plunged over a 20-foot embankment.

All of the cattle were killed. Harden was taken to the Baird hospital, where he died later in the day.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dave Harden of Arkansas, and a brother, Bill, also of Arkansas, who came to Eastland to make funeral arrangements.

Attachment Writ Filed Against Tax Contract Holder

Eastland County's five-year-old delinquent tax collection program, which has been embroiled in political and other kinds of debate during most of its lifetime, was climaxed this week with the filing of a \$101,229.24 civil suit against Horace Walker of Dallas, the tax attorney who conducted the program.

The suit, filed by the State of Texas in 91st District Court in Eastland, alleges that Walker "fraudulently and illegally" took that much money for himself that should have gone to Eastland County and the state.

A writ of attachment was issued against Walker's property by District Clerk Roy Lane after the filing of an affidavit of attachment in the district clerk's office by W. P. Geppert, Texas assistant attorney general who helped investigate the Walker case here. It was set forth that the writ was asked by Texas Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and Attorney General Price Daniel.

The affidavit claims the writ was necessary because in the belief of the plaintiffs, Walker was about to "dispose of property to defraud his creditors, and to convert property to money to place beyond the reach of his creditors."

In Dallas, Walker told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that there was no valid basis for the suit. He was quoted as saying that the investigators must have failed to take into account the factor of court costs in the hundreds of suits filed in the program.

Walker was awarded his original tax collection contract in Eastland County about June 1, 1945, after he had conducted similar projects in several other Texas counties. His contract had been renewed annually since.

He was to get 15 per cent of the taxes collected under the program, and it is alleged in the suit that the amount he kept over and above his legal 15 per cent.

The tax collection campaign had a big part in two county political campaigns, and repercussions from it were widely credited this summer in primary defeats for three county office-holders, Tax Collector-Assessor Neil Day, County Judge P. L. Crossley, and Sheriff J. B. Williams.

Named with Walker in the suit was his bonding firm, the U. S. Trust and Guaranty Co. of Waco, through which Walker was bonded to the amount of \$5,000.

The specific charge in the petition reads, "Plaintiffs say that by reason of the fact stated in the petition, the said Horace Walker has retained in his hands the sum of \$101,229.24 of delinquent tax money that he collected under and by virtue of the delinquent tax contract mentioned in this petition and has converted the same to the use and benefit of him, the said Horace Walker."

In several paragraphs the petition sets forth that "the defendant Horace Walker fraudulently and for the purpose of defrauding the plaintiffs" used various methods to cover up his transactions, and to divert the money he collected to his own benefit.

The suit was filed after an investigation of several months by state auditors and lawyers, and after an Eastland County Grand Jury had investigated the tax collection program.

The civil suit petition was signed for the state by W. V. Geppert and L. P. Lollar, assistants to the attorney general, and by District Attorney Elzo Been of Eastland.

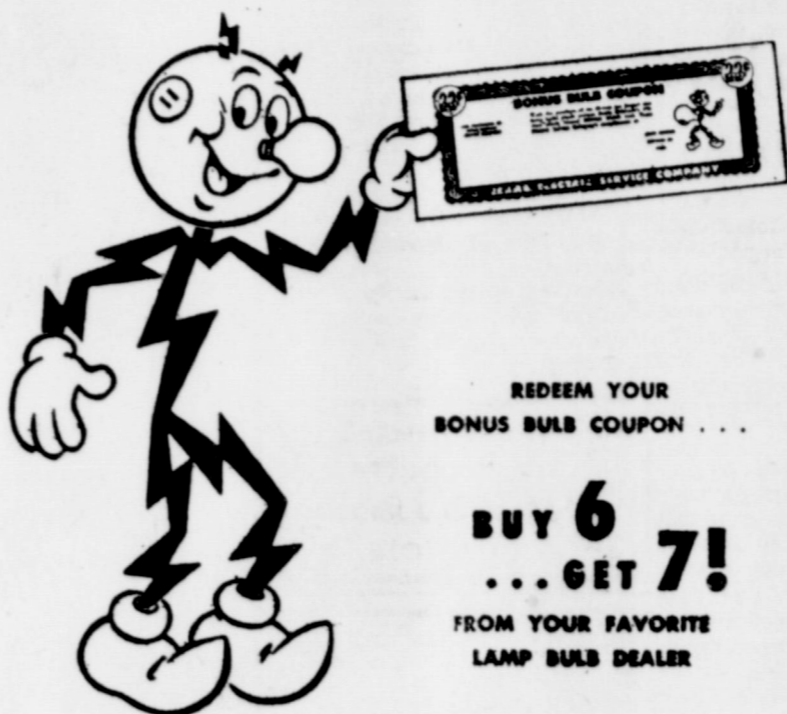

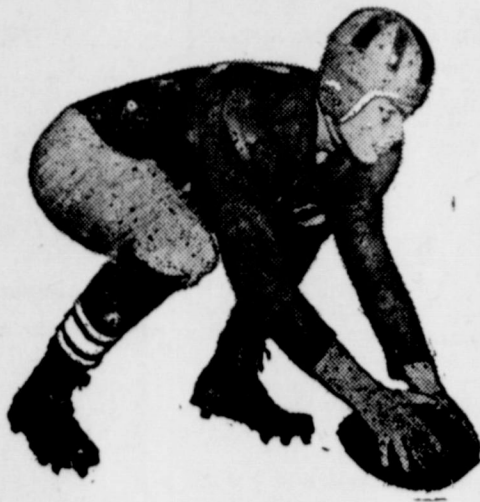

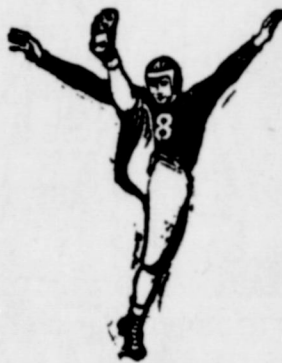
