Mavericks Given Slight Chance To Upset Hamilton

Eastland's Mavericks for the second time this season will essay the role of giant killers when they meet the Hamilton Bulldogs at Hamilton at 8 p. m. Friday in an all-important District 8-A contest.

The Mavericks donned the gin-killer mantle against Comanche, wore it proudly to a 20-7 lead, and then saw the whole thing crumble as key Eastland injuries riddled the team in the second half. Comanche won going away, 41-20.

Now Hamilton is THE team to beat in the district by virtue of its 25 to 19 win over Ranger last week. And Eastland is cast in the role of possible upsetter through its tie with Dublin and 31 to 12 victory over De Leon last week.

The Mavericks are a greatly improved team, but whether they have improved enough to surprise Pete Roach's Bulldogs is another matter.

The versatile Mavericks have learned just about all the formations for offensive play that anyone has thought of, and during the last two weeks little Rodney Stephens has been showing the results of game experience by making wiser and wider choices of plays, and by doing some brilliant broken field running when occasion demanded.

Eastland Coach Wendell Siebert said the starting lineup for Hamilton may be changed to include one of three freshmen, Laverne Meroney, Jamie Jessop or Alan Vermillion, as a starting guard. Big Derrell Black has been trying out in the center slot to put more beef there in the Mavericks' plays from single and double wing.

Otherwise, the same boys who ran De Leon into the ground will be on hand, with Doug King expected to start at halfback despite a troublesome leg bruise. De Leon and Eastland played to a 12-12 halftime tie score, and then for the first time this year the Mavericks took firm control in the second half and ran up the other 19 points while silencing the De Leon artillery.

Harold Justice recovered a De Leon fumble to lead to Eastland's first touchdown, which came after a long pass to Edwin Aaron and a short one to Dick Evtatt over the goal. Then early in the second period, Quarterback Irbey of De Leon tied it up, and later plunged for a second score that put the Bearcats ahead 12-6. But on the second play after the ensuing kickoff, and just before the halftime gun, Stephens found Bobby Womack open and passed to him down the middle. Womack outran everybody for 60 yards to score, for a total gain of 71 yards.

The first time Eastland got the ball in the third quarter, Stephens passed the same pass to Gerald Davis, tackle who was made an eligible receiver by a spread formation, and Davis outran everybody too for a 77-yard touchdown play.

Then late in the game, 117-pound Stephens discovered the spread was good for something besides to pass from, and ran for two touchdowns on weaving, twisting runs that seemed to baffle the Bearcats. One run was for 17 yards and the other for 25 yards. And after the last one, Aaron finally kicked a point.

It was Eastland's first win of the season, and the automobile horns were blaring all over town for an hour or two after the game as happy students celebrated.

Soil Judging To Be Studied By Cooper

County Agent J. M. Cooper said this week that soil judging has been added to the Extension Service's list of work projects, and meetings are being scheduled to instruct county agents in the new field.

Cooper said he will attend one of the meetings in Graham Nov. 9. He said his main interest in attending the meeting is to learn methods to be used in soil judging so he can instruct the 400-plus 4-H Club boys in Eastland County. Cooper is very much in favor of the added service, and thinks that it will have valuable results.

P. G. Haines, soil conservation specialist for the extension service, will instruct the agents.

Cost Of Producing Milk Varies Widely, Dairy Farmers Find Through Checks

Cost of producing milk in tested dairy herds in Eastland County in October varied from \$1.69 per 100 pounds to \$5.27 per 100 pounds, according to Forrest Boone of Rising Star, Dairy Herd Improvement Association supervisor, said this week.

The wide range of costs illustrates the value of the testing work, Boone said. Many a dairyman has no knowledge of the cost of producing milk from any one cow, unless he keeps records like those of the association, he said. A total of 252 dairy cows were on DHIA test in 11 different dairies during October and the highest producing cow on test during the month was a Holstein belonging to J. P. Herrington, north of Ranger. This cow produced 1,490 pounds of milk with 49 lbs. of butterfat. A Jersey cow belonging to N. E. Padgett of Moran was second with 1,360 pounds of milk and 50 pounds of butterfat. Boone had a milking Shorthorn cow in his dairy herd that produced 1,050 pounds of milk with 68 pounds of butterfat. The total value of milk produced on the 11 dairies for October was \$6,623.40. Those with cows on test during the month included Boone, A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, Raymond Sprawls

776-barrel Well Tested On Clark; Two More Are In

Bankline Oil Company's No. 6 Clark was completed for a producer Wednesday, and on a Railroad Commission test made 776 barrels on a half inch choke in 24 hours. The well thus is one of the best yet in the prolific new Briggs Owen field between Eastland and Cisco. It is located 993 feet from the west line and 1263 feet from the south line of Sec. 49, Block 4, H&TC Survey. It is the fifth producer brought in on the Clark, which is north of the Mrs. Briggs Owen tract.

Cooper and Hemphill's No. 1 Carlisle, which came in on a natural flow, without treatment of any kind, last Friday, has been completed for a 192-barrel per day well, flowing on 23-64 inch choke. The gas-oil ratio is 334 to 1 and gravity of the oil is 42.8-10. Pressure on tubing is 225 pounds and on casing 735 pounds.

The Bert Field No. - Dick Smith Thursday was reported to be making five barrels per hour on a 23-64 inch choke. This well, located in Section 60, southwest of the Briggs Owen, drilled to the Ranger sand and encountered oil, but the operator decided to complete the well in the Lake Sand and plugged back. Plans are to drill to the Ranger later. The well also tested the Duffer.

A south offset to the W. W. Bradley No. 1 Courtney is drilling and Thursday was drilling around 900 feet. It is the Sweringen No. 1 Ted Hale, and is seeking pay in the shallow Strawn sand.

Anyone Can Enter Exhibits In Eastland Flower Show To Be Held Wednesday

"Autumn Beauty" has been chosen as the theme for the 1950 Flower Show of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club which is to be held from 2 until 10 p. m. Wednesday in the High School Gymnasium, it was announced by Mrs. Veon Howard, chairman for the show.

The public was invited to attend the show. Admission prices will be 30 cents for adults and 10 cents for children.

For the first time in Eastland, the show will be conducted according to the rules for national flower shows, and also for the first time, exhibits will be judged by three national judges. Mrs. Walter Jernigan and Mrs. Jim Weatherby of Goldthwaite will be two of the judges, and the third will come from Fort Worth with Mrs. Mary Daggett Lake, who will be the principal speaker.

Suit To Condemn Kendrick Property Dismissed In Court

Eastland County's condemnation suit against J. A. Kendrick to obtain right of way for the new four-lane Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco was cancelled out Tuesday when attorneys for both sides of the case agreed on dismissal of the suit.

But, resident Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard said, that does not mean the highway route will be changed by Kendrick's house.

If the county cannot obtain the land reasonably, Pritchard said, the state will step in and condemn the land.

The highway will follow the proposed route near Kendrick's home, Pritchard said.

Kendrick, through his lawyer, W. D. R. Owen, had claimed that the route would damage his rock home, complete with swimming pool, to the extent of \$25,000. A commission of three Cisco men had set the fair value of the damage at less than \$550.

Next proceedings in the case apparently lay between the state and Kendrick. Meanwhile, crews were at work on the new highway route.

Slight Interest Shown In Election Tuesday

Slight interest in Eastland County in the general election to be held Tuesday was indicated by the fact that Thursday at noon only 10 absentee ballots had been cast for the election.

Saturday is the last day for absentee voting.

Voting in Eastland will be at the Courthouse and City Hall. The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. There are no local contested races.

Myrick Is Named Farm Bureau Head; Law Changes Asked

A. Z. Myrick of Cisco has been elected head of the Eastland County Farm Bureau and Howard Ingram of Nimrod vice-president.

Other officers elected at the meeting Tuesday night at the Texas Electric Service Company's conference room were Joe Bob Browning of Gorman, secretary-treasurer, and Mrs. J. F. Moseley of Olden, reporter.

Directors who will serve the next term are W. B. Starr of Cisco, E. E. Blackwell of Ranger, Lloyd Freeman of Pioneer, Roy L. Palmer of Gorman, John Love of Alameda, George Bennett of Eastland, J. F. Moseley of Olden, Herman Schaefer of Nimrod and Lee Starr of Cisco.

It was unanimously voted at the meeting to present a resolution to the state convention in Mineral Wells to permit a farmer to have a second grading of his peanuts for the initial charge of \$1 per ton. It was pointed out that in cases where farmers were dissatisfied with the grading of their peanuts, they had taken them to another grader and the \$1 per ton charge had been made on the second grading.

Members also voted to present a resolution asking that a bonded and licensed weigher weigh all livestock sold at small public livestock auction barns.

Love and W. B. Starr were elected delegates to the convention and Ingram and Palmer were named alternate delegates. Bennett was named non-voting delegate to the national convention to be held in Dallas.

Plans are being made to invite Congressman Omar Burleson to speak at a big agriculture meeting being planned by the bureau. Mr. and Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. B. B. Freeman, Ed Steele, Jr., and Mrs. John Love were named a committee to work out details for the meeting. Love reported that the bureau membership now stands above 127.

A vote of thanks was given Mrs. Love for her excellent services as secretary-treasurer of the organization. Mrs. Love asked to be relieved of her duties, but she was retained to handle the insurance and hospitalization plans.

New Fruit Varieties To Be Reported On

Eastland county fruit growers may have some new angles on new fruit varieties the later part of this month, according to J. M. Cooper, county agent.

Cooper said that he, Ed Steele, assistant county agent, Mrs. Joe Sparks, county home demonstration agent, and Miss Evelyn Bigby of the home demonstration staff in the county, will attend a meeting at the Stephenville extension service experiment station Nov. 15 to hear of results of experiments on various fruits.

Cooper pointed out that the station has been experimenting in an effort to determine what yellow meat peach is most suitable for frozen storage. He said that some peaches turn dark when prepared for the frozen food locker and this is the thing the station staff is working to eliminate.

Eastland's first trades day of a new series will be held Saturday, with the principal events to be at the northwest corner of the square at 2:30 p. m.

At that time, \$75 in cash will be given away.

The trades day events will be held each Saturday through Dec. 30, under an agreement between the 43 Eastland merchants who are sponsoring the events. After that date, a new series may or may not be started.

Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner said this week that a number of merchants had voluntarily added their names during the week to the list of sponsors of the events.

Trades Day special bargains are featured by a number of Eastland merchants in this issue of The Record, which goes into about 2000 Eastland County homes, as do all issues of this newspaper.

Tanner said the trades day events were started by Eastland merchants in an effort to strengthen the bonds of friendship with the residents of Eastland County, particularly those living outside of Eastland.

Rat Control Work Begun In County

A rat control program for Eastland County will be undertaken by the Extension Department of Texas A. & M. College, using a new product, County Agent J. M. Cooper said Thursday.

The eradication agent is Warfarin, an anti-coagulant compound discovered by a Wisconsin research foundation.

Bob Wilson of the Department of the Interior was in Eastland Thursday, and he and Cooper inspected two test cases, one on the Lee Williamson dairy farm at Olden and one at the Lee Sprawls dairy farm at Scranton. Cooper said both tests proved the new product quite effective.

The county agent said rats and mice must eat the compound at least three times in a week to cause death. It is odorless and tasteless, he said, and arouses no suspicion in the rat population.

Cooper said the rat population in the county is the greatest in five years.

Warfarin is a government product and the agencies that handle it are allowed only enough profit to defray handling costs. Cooper termed such agencies "public minded" citizens.

In Eastland, the product is being handled by the Perkins Implement Company.

Blunk Leaves Monday For Duty As Chaplain

Rev. J. J. Blunk, who for several years has been pastor of the First Christian Church in Eastland, left Monday for Fort Jackson, S. C., to re-enter service of the Army as a chaplain.

Mr. Blunk will serve as chaplain in the infantry with the rank of captain. He was in the Army Reserve, having served as a chaplain in World War II.

Mrs. Blunk will be in Fort Worth temporarily, she said this week.

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

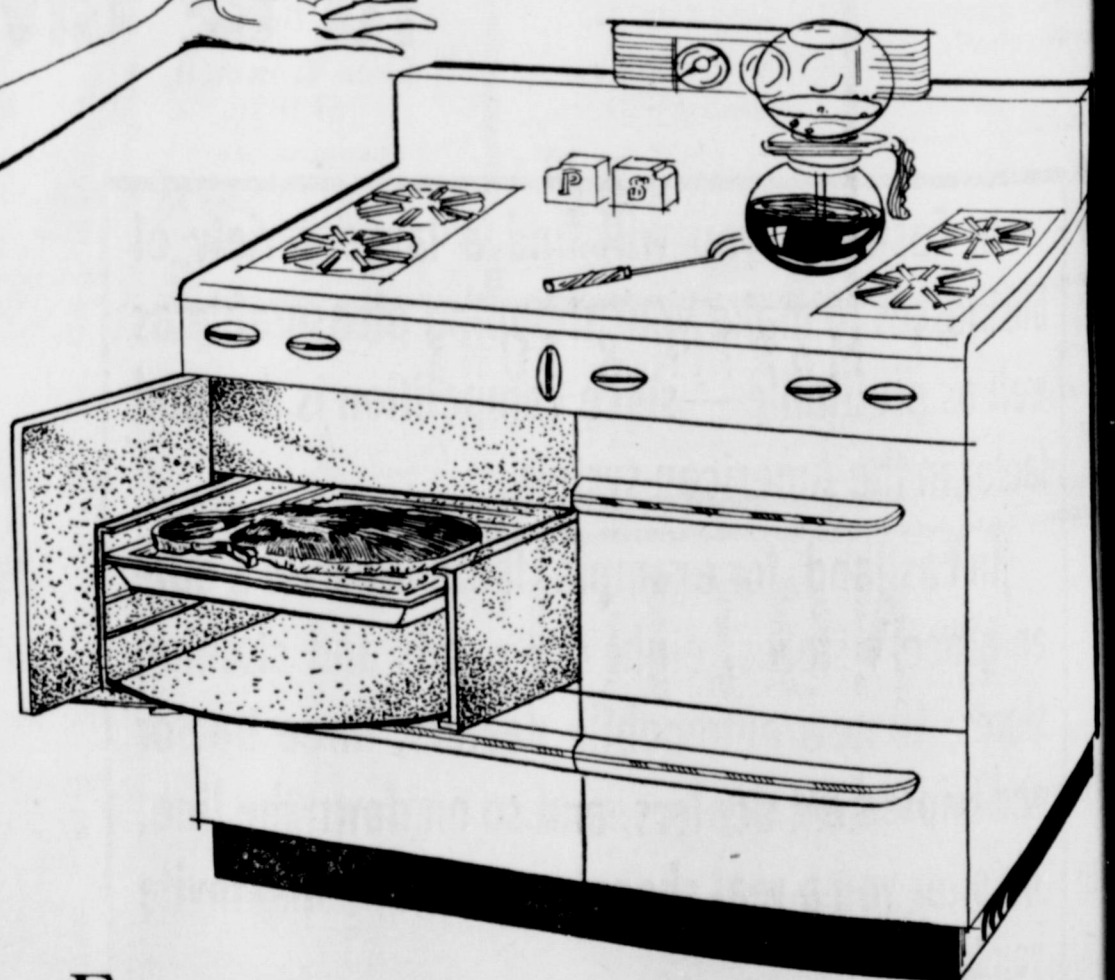
