# Good Oil Show Found In Holcomb Well Near City Hydrafrac To Be Applied Friday; Interest Is High

An area immediately east of Eastland was the center of new oil interest Thursday as oil was found between 3120 and 3175 feet in the A. D. Bradley and others No. 1/ Holcomb

The free oil was found in the Lake Sand in the test, which is about a half mile east of the city limits of Eastland, located on land whed by Spud Holcomb of Cisco. Pipe has been set in the well, and the casing was being perforted and the well swabbed Thursday in preparation for Hydrafrac reatment Friday.

Oddly enough, the new well is an offset to the States Oil Company's No. 1 Norwood, which thas been producing in the Lake Sand since 1919. Ordinarily, oil men say, such a test would cause little on no interest, but the advent of the Hydrafrac treatment has caused great deal of interest in sand formations that once were believed stripped of all the oil they would give up.

On an open hole basis, the well was gauged at an unofficial production rate of nearly 2800 barrels per day, which would have made it a good well indeed even in the old gusher days.


The official test was made with the well flowing through threefourths inch choke

The Carlisle well is north and somewhat west of the discovery well in the Briggs Owen pool.

The well is producing from the 3397-foot level, from three feet of open hole.
