For a wedding trip to Colorado Springs, Colo., the bride chose a blue tweed three-piece sweater knit pants suit with matching accessories and a corsage of

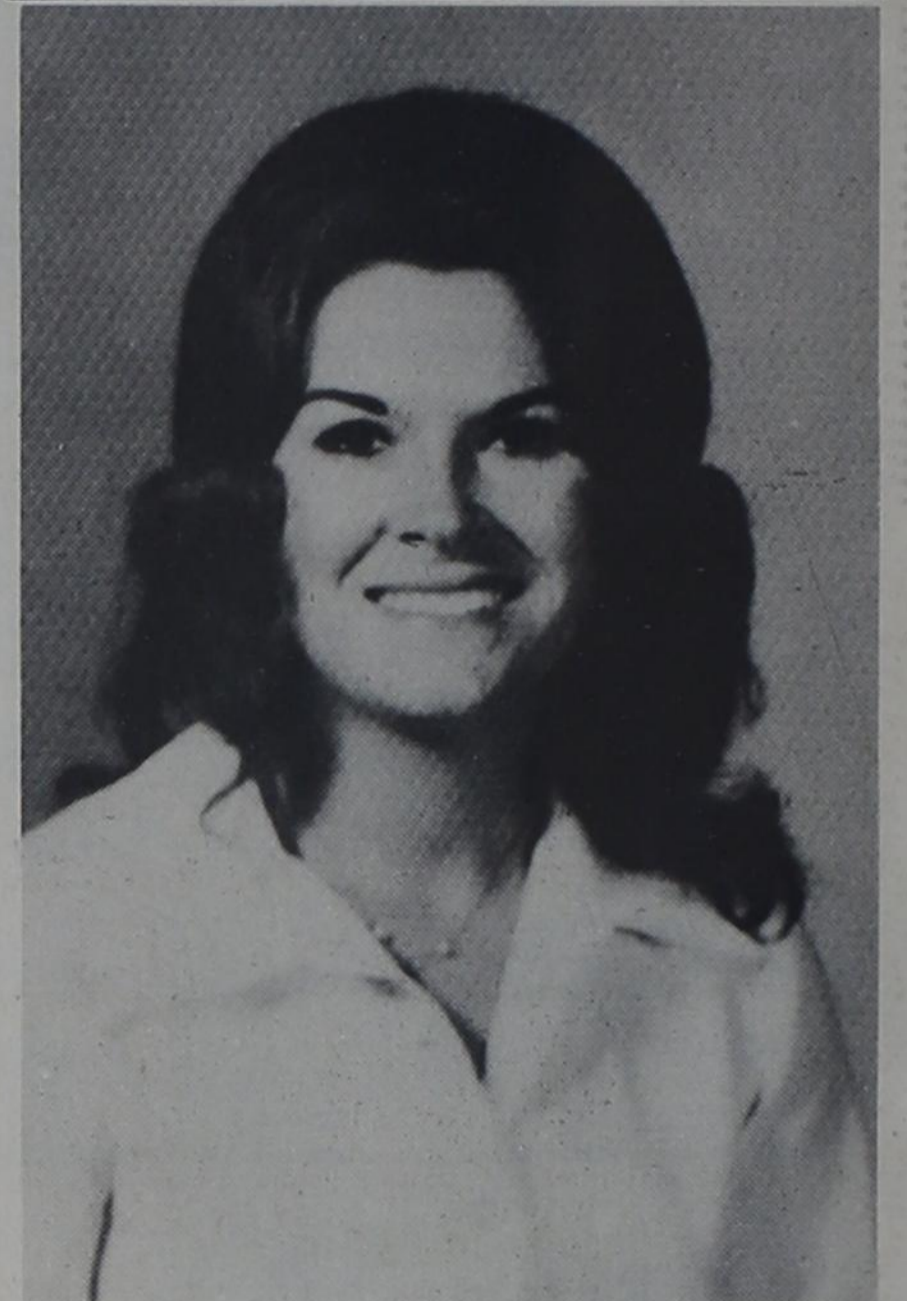
white rosebuds.

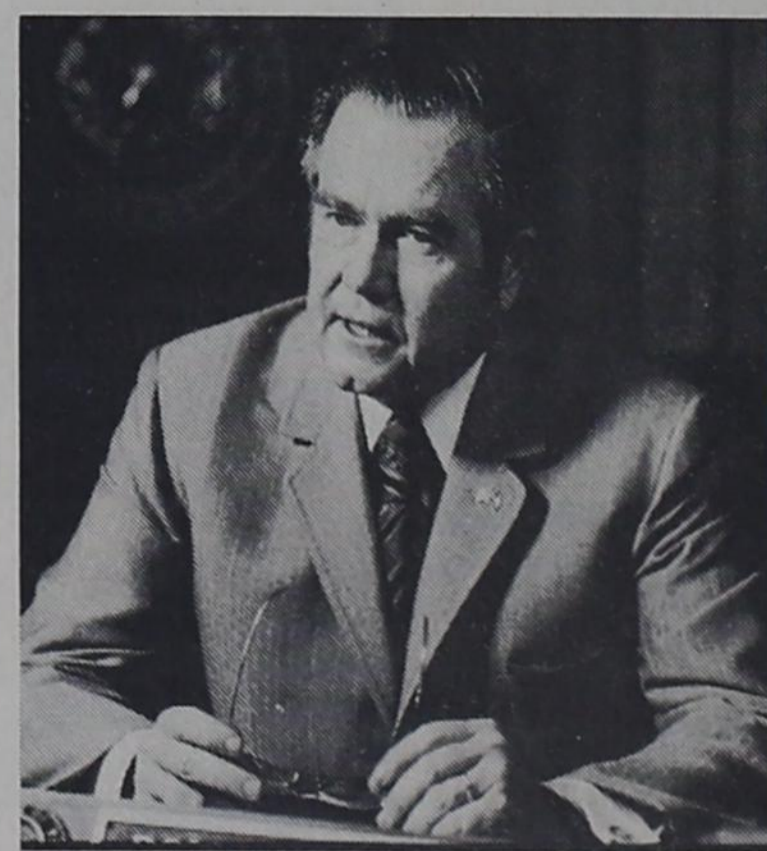




Rereading the above verse now, he might have seen a hidden message in it for him—that he would sail the seas—and that God had a plan for his life which he could not foresee.

Rain, Markets Scare Farmers

Showers, totaling about .30 here Saturday night and Sunday morning, and the government's decision to block a \$500 million grain shipment to the Soviet Union combined to create dismay and uncertainty among area farmers and elevator operators this week.

The rainfall, along with cloudy, cold weather over the weekend and Monday, brought a screeching halt to the corn and milo harvest which was just beginning to pick up the pace. However, by Monday evening the clouds were moving away and, with the hopes of sunny skies for the next week or so, the harvest should resume this week.

The picture isn't so bright, however, on the market scene.

Some experts were predicting that the consumer, in whose name the administration ostensibly acted, may face higher prices next year as a result of the action taken Saturday.

"If the farmer, who is now planting next year's crop, loses confidence in the market, he may not plant as much as he had planned to," said Bill Nelson of Amarillo, executive vice president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Nelson's assessment was echoed by G.D. Anderson Jr. of Sherley-Anderson Grain here.

"For the first time in history, we can't offer the farmer any market for his grain," Anderson said. "When people lose confidence like this, it could bring on a disaster."

"The farmers I've talked

to since 5 p.m. Friday are scared to death," he continued. "Every export buyer just pulled out of the market Friday afternoon."

Anderson said farmers have only the export market for support since crop subsidies were generally phased out about two years ago.

"I don't think it's at all wise for these (administration) people to be tampering with the Chicago grain futures market," he said. "This could pull the rug right out from under the farmer."

Spokesmen at both grain handling facilities in Bovina expressed concern over the instability of the market. One commented that it was the first time since he had been associated with the elevator business that they had gone three days without a market-Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The general consensus of opinion is that it would be several more days before a trend would be established, with a lot depending upon what President Ford said in his speech Tuesday afternoon.

On the local market scene, prices quoted Tuesday were up to 80 cents off those quoted on Friday before the action was announced.

On Tuesday, corn was quoted at \$5.52 per hundred weight, off 71 cents; milo quoted at \$5.20, 80 cents off; wheat quoted at \$4.63 per bushel, off 34 cents; and barley quoted at \$5, off 50 cents.

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
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

# Homecoming Tilt Features Win Over Cowboys

Displaying an almost unpenetrable defense inside their own 20-yard line, the Bovina Mustangs took advantage of a late fourth quarter break Friday night to ice down a 14-6 win over the Plains Cowboys of District 5-A.

The win was the first in five attempts against the South Plains team which made the game even more enjoyable for the large crowd of ex-students and Mustang fans at the finale of the 1974 homecoming.

The Mustangs received the opening kickoff, marching downfield at a steady clip behind the running of Ray Martinez, Alton McCormick, Clint Cox and Tommy DeLeon, reaching the 26-yard line of Plains in six plays before a fumbled handoff turned the ball over to the visitors.

The pigskin exchanged possession four times in the first quarter and the opening minutes of the second quarter with the Ponies putting the initial points on the scoreboard with 1:18 remaining in the first half of play.

The scoring drive began on Bovina's 24 with Senior Halfback McCormick picking up 30 yards in the drive. Junior Halfback Cox climaxed the drive with a one yard scamper around the right side of the line. The conversion attempt by Martinez was good and the Ponies led, 7-0.

Striking back almost before Bovina fans had time to get settled in their seats after the Mustang TD, Plains Quarterback Weldon Nelms connected on a

42-yard pass play which set the Cowboys up with a first and goal at the 10. With a second and eight to go for the counter, Nelms scored on a keeper play around right end and, suddenly, Plains was back in the ball game. The extra point conversion attempt failed when the kick sailed off to the left of the goalposts, giving Bovina a slim one point lead, 7-6, with only 43 seconds remaining on the clock.

The visitors came back after the halftime intermission like they meant

business. Receiving the kickoff, the Cowboys drove 74 yards in 10 plays before the Maroon defensive wall halted the drive. A half-the-distance penalty on the 17 gave Plains a first and goal from the eight. Three plays netted the Cowboys only three yards and on the fourth and five situation, the Mustangs held on the one to take over possession of the pigskin.

With their backs against the wall, Bovina could pick up only three yards and were forced to punt from the four. Willard got off a kick to

the Plains 49, which gave the visitors good field position.

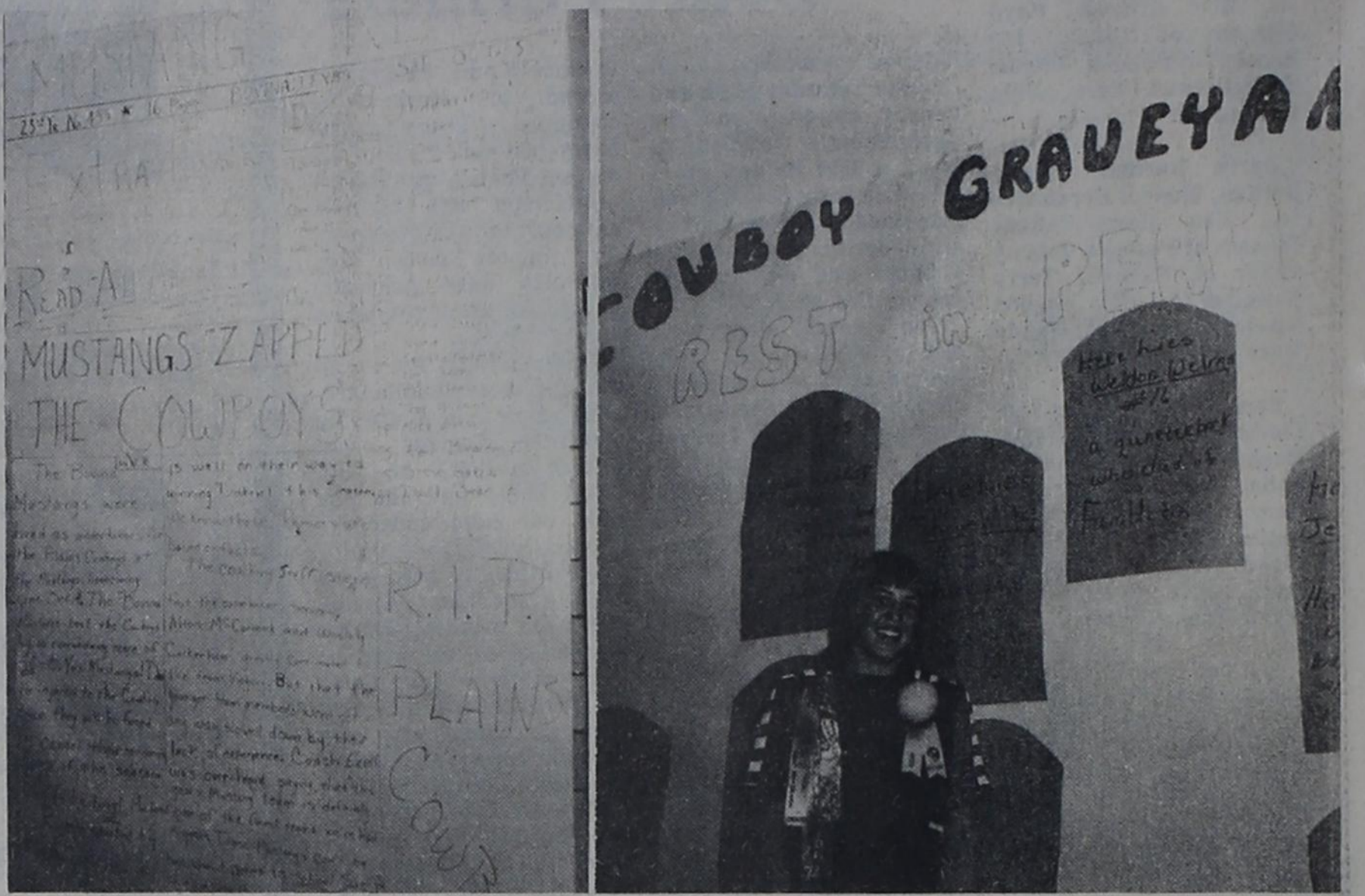
Plains again mounted a scoring drive which sent from their own 49 to the 17-yard line of the Mustangs before Noseguard Rickey Stanberry pounced on a fumble to kill the threat.

The fourth quarter opened with Bovina on its own 11-yard line following a Plains punt. The Ponies moved the ball to the 36 before being forced to punt into the wind. The stiff breeze held the ball up and a bad bounce for Bovina put

Plains into business at the mid-field stripe once again.

The Cowboys moved the ball from the 50 to Bovina's 16 in only six plays. Martinez sacked the runner for a yard loss there and two incomplete passes brought up a fourth and 11 at the 17. Nelms went back to pass but was smothered by Tackle Elbert Shelby for an eight yard loss.

Bovina, with its slim one point lead stuck to conservative football in an effort to eat up the remaining minutes on the clock. The Ponies drove to their own 43 before being forced to punt with Plains putting the ball into play on their own 17.

And that was when the

Mustangs created the break that iced down the long-sought victory.

On the first down play, Shelby dropped Nelms for a five yard loss at the 12. Two incomplete passes later, facing a fourth and 15 from that point and less than two minutes remaining on the clock, Plains elected to go for the first down. Shelby crashed through the line, dropping Nelms at the three to give the Ponies the ball.

Fullback Martinez was dropped for a three yard loss to the six and then Cox set sail through the right side of the line for the touchdown. The conversion attempt by Martinez was

good and the score stood at 14-6 with 1:31 remaining on the clock.

The win boosted the Mustangs' season record to three wins and one loss and dropped Plains to two wins and three losses.

Martinez was the leading rusher in the contest, picking up 60 steps in 15 carries for a four yard average. Cox stepped off 53 yards in 13 carries for a 4.1 average with McCormick garnering 38 yards in eight attempts for a 4.5 average. DeLeon picked up 27 steps in 12 attempts for a 2.4 average.

DeLeon led the defense with 12 tackles—nine solo and three assists, followed

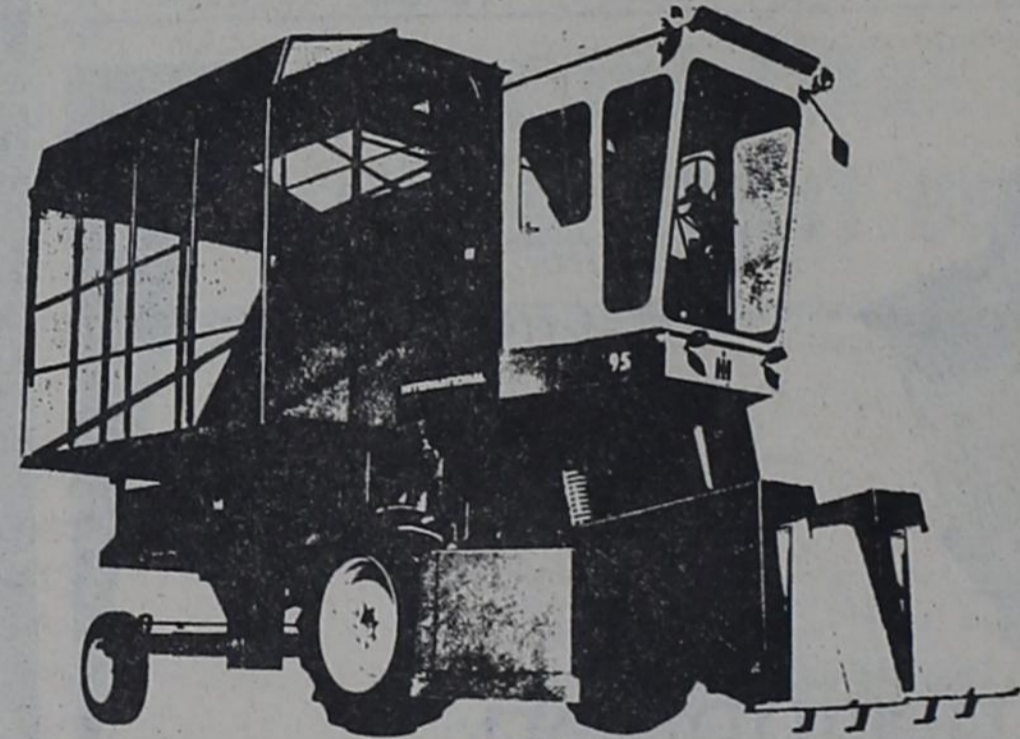
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## Re-Elect Mrs. Naegle
