

EXPECT OVER 2,000 VOTERS

'74 General Election Balloting Tuesday

Polls will be open in Bovina from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the American Legion Hall on Third Street Tuesday for the 1974 General Election, announces J.E. Sherrill, who will serve as presiding judge. Taking the spotlight in the '74 election is the race for the governor of Texas. Voters will mark the ballot for one of five candidates—Democratic Incumbent Dolph Briscoe, Republican Jim Granberry, Ramsey Muniz of the Raza Unida Party, Sherry Smith of the Socialist Workers Party or S.W. (Sam) McDonnell of the American Party. Briscoe is seeking his

second term in the governor's mansion at Austin. Only seven races are being contested at the state level with two contested races at the county level—one a write-in campaign announced Tuesday in Bovina. Seventeen races at both levels are uncontested. Other races of prime interest at the state level are those of lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, commissioner of general land office and commissioner of agriculture. At the county level, races exist for county commissioner in Precinct No. 4 and Precinct

No. 2 (Bovina and Rhea). Richard Carson, 27, of Bovina announced Tuesday he would be a write-in candidate for county commissioner in Precinct 2. C.H. Jefferson (Democrat) is running for re-election to that post. Carson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. M.H. Carson, is a life-long resident of Bovina and a graduate of Bovina High School. He has a BBA degree in economics from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, is a member of the Bovina Jaycees and First Baptist Church, and farms in the community. He has also served a two year stint in the Peace Corps. Carson

spent 14 months in Cameroon on a project to analyze the cattle industry in the 73,000 square mile Ngaoundere region. In the other race at the county level, Democrat Roy Miller is opposed by Republican Jimmy Briggs for county commissioner of Precinct No. 4. Seeking the Lieutenant Governor's post is Democrat Bill Hobby, Republican George Marshall and Dan Fein of the Socialist Workers Party. Democrat Incumbent John Hill is opposed by Republican Tom Cole and Pedro Vasquez of the Socialist Workers for Attor-

ney General. Seeking the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts is Democrat Bob Bullock, Republican Nick Rowe and Socialist Workers Sas Scoggins. State Treasurer Jesse James, Democratic Incumbent, is opposed by Republican Robert G. Holt. Democrat Bob Armstrong is seeking to return to the office of commissioner of general land office, opposed by Republican Mary Lou Grier and William Rayson of the Socialist Workers Party. Democrat Incumbent John C. White is seeking re-election as commissioner of agriculture. He

is opposed by Republican Zack Fisher. With the exception of the two races for county commissioner, no opposition is on the ballot for county officials. Those include Pat Boone Jr., district judge, 154th Judicial District; Dorothy Quickel, district clerk; Paul Fortenberry, county judge and ex-officio county school superintendent; Bonnie Warren, county clerk; Benna Felts, county treasurer; Ray Mears, justice of the peace, Precinct No. 1; Frances Euler, justice of the peace, Precinct No. 2; and Wilbur Charles, justice of the peace, Precinct No. 3.

In the 1972 general election, 477 votes were cast in Bovina with 2930 cast in the county. This will be the second general election in which 18-year-olds may vote. A sample ballot, sponsored by First State Bank, may be found in an advertisement elsewhere in this week's issue of The Blade. Mayor Tom Bonds signed a petition this week calling for citizens of the community to cast their ballots in Tuesday's election. The petition reads as follows: I, Tom Bonds, do proclaim Oct. 29 through Nov. 5 as "poll power"

week. Everyone is urged to vote on Nov. 5. Each resident is asked to turn on their porch lights at 7 p.m. on Nov. 5 to signify that they have voted. The fire siren will be heard at 7 p.m. on Nov. 5. The voting campaign is sponsored by Bovina Woman's Study Club and the Young Homemakers Chapter of Bovina. 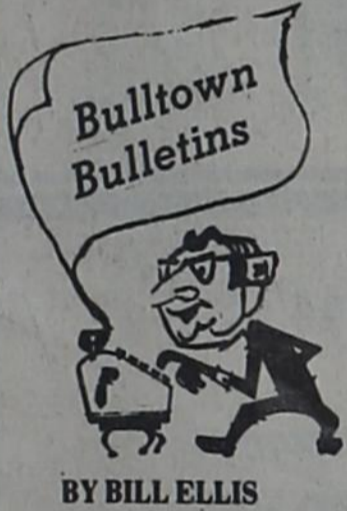

DURING PAST WEEK

RESIDENTS OF this part of the country went back to the late mornings and early evenings clock time, with the switch back to Central Standard Time.

It's always a dramatic switch when you lop off a whole hour and move it to the other part of the day.

As we understand it, the nation must return to Daylight Savings Time next February 23, unless Congress decides to do something about it in the meantime.

Year-around Daylight Savings Time was proposed by last January by former president Nixon as a fuel-saving measure, designed to offset the effects of last winter's fuel crisis.

However, according to a report developed by the Department of Transportation following extensive study of statistics, "There is no unambiguous direct evidence that Daylight Saving Time is beneficial or harmful."

Thus, we'll apparently turn our clocks forward next February, sending children off to school in the dark once again, complying with the DST experiment of dubious worth.

NEXT THURSDAY'S election has not generated the interest for voters that was expected of it earlier.

The expected state-wide race for the governor's chair failed to come off, as apparently the state's Republican chiefs decided it was a lost cause. Lubbock's Jim Granberry remains the GOP's standard-bearer in the race, but apparently he's just a figurehead.

Republicans have some candidates in races for other state offices, but unless they have campaigned harder downstate than they have in this area, they may not fare too well.

There is only one contested race in Parmer County, in the Lazbuddie commissioner's race. However, a local group has started a write-in campaign in the Precinct 2 commissioner's race, so a local race developed at the last minute. (See stories, ads in this issue.)

In the immediate area, Parmer voters miss out on what appears to be a good race between Congressman Bob Price and Democratic challenger Jack Hightower of Vernon.

Both of these men formerly represented Parmer. (Continued on Page 12)

REPORT SHOWS

Bank Deposits Continue Rise

Deposits at First State Bank of Bovina as of October 15, totaled \$6,145,661.59, an increase of approximately \$443,926.99 over the same period a year ago.

Total deposits as of Oct. 17, 1973, were \$5,701,734.60. The Oct. 15 deposits also reveal an increase over the June '74 figure of \$5,913,712.78, approximately \$231,948.81.

Loans at the end of the Oct. 15 period totaled \$4,350,871.98, up \$185,358.35 from the '73 total of \$4,165,513.63. Loans at the end of June totaled \$4,035,327.80.

The increase in total deposits from Oct. '73 to Oct. '74 is less than usual with the delayed harvest operations and cattle market situation cited as the main factors in the lesser figures.

The bank's official statement of condition appears elsewhere in this week's issue of The Blade.

Measurements Push 4 Inches

Nearly four inches of rain, accompanied by hail, fog and chilly temperatures, have drenched the Bovina area within the last week, completely paralyzing farming operations. It came at the peak of the corn harvest and practically before farmers could harvest any of the '74 milo crop.

Rainfall began Tuesday afternoon of last week and continued most of the afternoon and night before coming to a temporary halt. Heavy fog and chilly temperatures combined to deter drying operations following the almost three inches accumulated during that time.

Drizzly weather returned Sunday with Parmer County, along with most of the Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico, placed in a severe weather watch Sunday night with large hail and damaging winds predicted from about 7:30 to midnight.

The cloud struck here

The Marymount College girls volleyball team has been selected for the 1969-70 school year. Members include Linda Rejino of Bovina. Last year's Marymount girls' volleyball team placed first in the state in competition that involved all Kansas colleges and universities.

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines, enjoying one of those nights when everything they did seemed to be right, and catching the Bovina Mustangs at a time when everything they did seemed to be wrong, roared to a 64-0 District 3-A win Friday night in a football game played in the Lamb County community.

Farm Census Set In Jan.

The 1974 Census of Agriculture, the largest agricultural statistical project of the past five years, will begin in January. It will be conducted by the Bureau of the Census, part of the Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

From Alaska to Florida, from Maine to Hawaii, farmers and ranchers will receive census forms in the mail around the first of the new year. The report forms are to be filled out and mailed back promptly.

Farmers themselves have participated in deciding what information is collected in the census. Representatives of farm organizations such as the Farm Bureau, The Grange, Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, and Farmers Cooperatives serve on the Advisory Committee that recom-

mends to the Bureau the questions that should be included in the census.

Three kinds of information are requested about operations during 1974: first, a count of farm resources, number of farms, area of farm land, acres of cropland and pasture, number of each kind of livestock and poultry, number of persons working on farms, number of various kinds of farm equipment; second, a record of farm products produced and sold during 1974; and third, selected farming activities during 1974 such as number of days of off-farm work by the farmer, amount spent for farm labor, for custom work, for feed, for gasoline and oil.

To report this kind of information, a farmer will need to have a few simple records. The Census Bureau is urging each farmer to have his records of quantities harvested, products sold, major farm expenses and the like readily available so that he can easily and accurately fill out his census report when it comes.

It is from the Census of Agriculture, conducted every five years, that data are taken to form the basis for programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Congressional farm legislation, farm organization policies, farm programs established and administered by State departments of agriculture, and many other services provided by colleges, business firms, manufacturers, publishers and broadcasters.

The Census of Agriculture is the only source of statistics on agriculture that are comparable from county to county nationwide. It is the sole source of comprehensive data tabulated for each State and for the U.S. for farms classified by size, tenure, type of organization, market value of products sold, and type of farm enterprise.

Every farmer's report is confidential by law. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The mail census method reinforces confidentiality. And it allows the farmers to complete his report on his convenience with accurate information from his records.

Committee To Hear PRP Rep.

Ernest Clark, a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo, will be guest speaker at a meeting of the Bovina Development Committee Tuesday at Community Room of First State Bank of Bovina. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m.

Clark was invited to speak at the meeting through the Bovina City Council. He will answer questions concerning city policies on industrial growth and will also be able to discuss many federal programs from which funds can be obtained for community improvement, according to Lawrence Kriegel, chairman of the Development Committee.

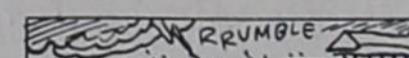
New Schedule Told For License Office

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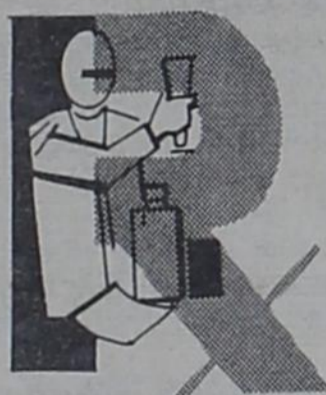

Mustangs Seeking First Loop Victory At Kress

Bovina's Mustangs will travel to Kress Friday night in search of their first District 3-A win in three outings, facing elimination from the title race unless they are able to win the final three games.

Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. this week, as will the remainder of the games on the schedule.

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines, following last week's surprise 30-6 win over Bovina, took over the lead in the district race with two wins and no defeats. Bovina fell to the cellar slot with two losses and no wins. Farwell, Kress, Vega and Hart have 1-1 records and remain in the thick of the battle.

"Kress is quick, has good pursuit and is strong defensively," said Head Coach Roger Ezell this week. He noted that the Kangaroos would be about the same size as the Mustangs, a factor which hasn't come up too often this season.

The Kangaroos, 3-7 last year, have 15 lettermen

returning to the team this year, including four offensive and seven defensive starters.

New Head Coach Leon Kendall runs a slot I offense, favoring the option, and utilizes a multiple defense. "They never line up in the same place twice on defense," Ezell commented.

The team is led by Senior Quarterback Barry Street (6-1, 155), an All-South Plains pick for the past two consecutive years. Street is a dangerous runner and an adequate passer.

Fullback Lance McClendon (5-9, 143, Sr.) is touted as the team's hardest runner. Tailback Martin Alcozer (5-8, 161, Jr.) is the team's leading scorer and possesses the necessary speed.

Other starters include Halfback Max Jones (5-6, 136, Sr.), Split End John Weathered (5-9, 138, Jr.), Halfback Dane Sizemore (139, Soph.), End Denver Roden (5-8, 145, Sr.), Center Wayne Reed (6-2, 161, Sr.), Guard Glen Foster (6-0, 140, Sr.), Guard Victor Castilleja

(5-4, 155, Sr.), Tackle Donnie Young (5-11, 146, Sr.), and Tackle Remigo Segura (155, Soph.).

Kress carries 11 seniors, seven juniors and three sophomores on the roster.

The Kangaroos head into Friday night's game with a 3-4 record, owning a 6-0 victory over Farwell last week, a 28-13 win over New Home in the fourth week of the season, and a 29-28 upset victory over Lockney in the fifth week of the season. The Roos have lost to Silverton, 14-12; Hale Center, 39-13; Petersburg, 17-15; and Kress (Dist. 3-A), 27-7.

"We didn't play well at all; the boys weren't mentally ready for Springlake-Earth," commented Ezell about last Friday night's game.

"A couple of our starters were out and several boys were in new positions and we knew that was going to hurt us," continued Ezell, "but, we just weren't prepared, and we were sluggish."

"Plus the fact they manhandled us—which was discouraging for us and the boys. But we had some good individual performances," Ezell added.

He singled out Defensive End Ellie Hernandez who was credited with 14 tackles in the game. "That was the best game by far for Ellie."

Ezell also commented on Ken Sorley's game. "Ken was playing defensive end for the first time and he did a real good job there."

The Mustangs were hampered at the onset of the game by injuries to key players. Ray Martinez, offensive fullback and defensive end, saw action on the opening five plays in the defensive line but had to be taken out. He suffered a severe ankle sprain in the Farwell game the week before. "It may just be a severe sprain, but if it hasn't responded better by the middle of the week, we'll send him to a doctor."

Joe Olvera, offensive and defensive tackle, was believed to have suffered a shoulder separation in the Farwell game, however, it was diagnosed as a "bad" sprain. Ezell hopes Olvera will be able to play this week.

The Mustangs' first possession of the ball ended abruptly on a third and six situation when S-E's Brad Barden intercepted a Dennis Willard pass meant for Tommy DeLeon. Barden was downed on his own 43 yard line.

Seven plays, three penalties and a fine play by Defensive Lineman Dana Harris later, the Wolverines had only managed to advance the ball one yard and elected to go for a quick kick on a third and 36 situation.

On the first play of the

series, the Mustang ball carrier lost the handle on the pigskin and the Wolverines were back in business on the Bovina 16. Again, the Mustang defense stiffened, holding the visitors to three yards in three carries. An attempted field goal by Monreal on the first play of the second quarter failed when Tommy Serna crashed through to block the effort.

The two teams exchanged punts after failing to pick up first downs with Bovina finally getting on the scoreboard for the first, and final time, some four minutes deep in the quarter.

DeLeon fielded a S-E punt at his own 10 and nearly broke loose for the touchdown with the officials ruling he stepped out of bounds on the Bovina 42.

The fired-up Ponies scored on the following play with Willard tossing a 58-yard scoring strike to End Clint Cox. Cox pulled the ball down on the S-E 30 and with the other end, Ken Sorley, running interference outdistanced the defenders to the goal line. On the attempt at the extra point, a high punt from center sailed over the holder's head with Bovina taking what was to be a short-lived 6-3 lead.

A fumbled pitchout late in the second quarter gave the Wolverines possession on the Mustang 30 and five plays later, Quarterback Lee Brown bulldozed over from the one for the go-ahead TD

with 3:23 remaining in the first half. The extra point attempt by Monreal was good to put S-E into a 10-6 lead.

The Wolverines appeared to be just getting unwound, scoring once again before halftime on a 36-yard drive. Brown connected on a 10-yard pass over the middle of the Mustang line to End Junior Saucedo with Monreal's kick for the extra point good. Only 37 seconds remained on the clock in the half with the Wolverines going to the dressing room at halftime, owning a 17-6 edge.

The Mustangs failed to generate any offense in the second half with fumbled pitchouts and incomplete passes frustrating any serious scoring threat.

Springlake-Earth put seven more points on the scoreboard with 2:47 remaining in the third quarter on a 61-yard drive. Fullback Doug Jones crashed over from one yard out with Monreal making good on the extra point attempt for a 24-6 edge over the Ponies.

The Wolverines pushed the final touchdown across with 3:52 left in the fourth quarter. Brown went to his favorite receiver, Saucedo, once again for a 27-yard scoring toss. Monreal's kick was wide and the scoring was over for the evening.

The Maroons just couldn't seem to find the right offensive combination to work against the much larger Wolverines with numerous penalties, incomplete passes and fumbled pitchouts combining to frustrate the offense. Defensively, the Ponies were led by Linemen Ellie Hernandez, Dana Harris and Ken Sorley.

Hernandez, Dana Harris and Ken Sorley. Hernandez was credited with 10 tackles and four assists for a total of 14. Harris was credited with 11 tackles and recovered a Wolverine fumble. Sorley, in addition to his defensive chores, was credited with one pass reception for eight yards.

Offensively, Freshman Fullback Gerald Shelby, playing for injured Ray Martinez, was the workhorse for the Ponies, picking up 70 yards in 12 carries for a 5.8 average. End Clint Cox snagged three passes for 92 yards, one the 58-yard scoring toss. Fullback Tommy DeLeon picked up five yards in five attempts. Fullback Alton McCormick was credited with seven yards in 10 carries and Willard was credited with five yards in two carries for a 2.5 average. Sorley snared one pass for eight yards.

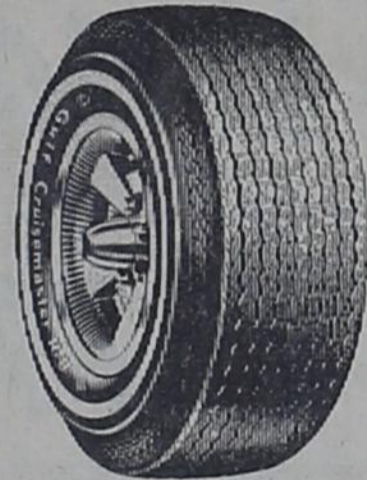

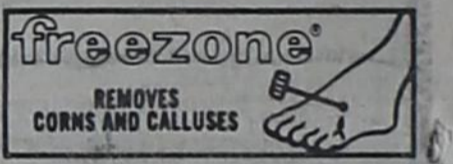
