

REPORT SHOWS

****************** **RESIDENTS OF** this part of the country went back to the late mornings and early evenings clock time, with the switch back to Central Standard Time.

It's always a dramatic switch when you lop off a whole hour and move it to the other part of the day.

As we understand it, the nation must return to **Daylight Savings Time next** February 23, unless Congress decides to do something about it in the meantime.

Year-around Daylight Savings Time was proposed by last January by former president Nixon as a fuel-saving measure, designed to offset the effects of last winter's fuel crisis.

However, according to a report developed by the Department of Transportation following extensive study of statistics, "There is no unambiguous direct evidence that Daylight Saving Time is beneficial or harmful."

Thus, we'll apparently turn our clocks forward next February, sending children off to school in the dark once again, complying with the DST experiment of dubious worth.

+ + + +

NEXT THURSDAY'S election has not generated the interest for voters that was expected of it earlier.

The expected state-wide race for the governor's chair failed to come off, as apparently the state's Republican chiefs decided it was a lost cause. Lubbock's Jim Granberry remains the GOP's standard-bearer in the race, but apparently he's just a figurehead.

Continue Rise


Deposits at First State Bank of Bovina as of October 15, totaled \$6,145,661.59, an increase of approximately \$443,926.99 over the same period a year ago.

Total deposits as of Oct. 17, 1973, were \$5,701,734,60. The Oct. 15 deposits also reveal an increase over the June '74 figure of \$5,913,712.78, approximately \$231,948.81.

Loans at the end of the Oct. 15 period totaled \$4,350,871.98, up \$185,358.35 from the '73 total of \$4,165,513.63. Loans at the end of June totaled \$4,035,327.80.

The increase in total deposits from Oct. '73 to Oct. '74 is less than usual with the delayed harvest operations and cattle market situation cited as the main factors in the lesser figures.

homemade goods on sale and overcast with the overcast skies clearing Tuesday. However, more rainy weather was being predicted by area forecasters for the latter part of the week.

> Farmers who weren't too upset about previous rains have definitely decided at this point that "enough is enough." Prospects for a cotton crop are very dim at this point and most farmers are becoming concerned about the milo and corn crop remaining in the fields.

However, the rain could not be better for wheat land since it has fallen slowly and soaked into the ground. Cattlemen are also thinking in terms of the beneficial moisture since grass land will be aided.

People living on unpaved rural roads have been hampered severely by the weather. The roads have absorbed as much as possible and have turned into boggy mires for the most part. Stories of being stuck have been a dime a dozen this month.

Although the rain has fallen slowly, the sodden land has not been able to absorb the four inches received this past week and run-off problems are now occurring. Land which has been prepared for planting has been washed out with some farmers planning to re-list some of the land. Since the drought of '74 (remember that) was broken the first week in July,
