IF YOU LISTENED to President Reagan's State of the Union speech last Tuesday evening, there is a good chance you saw the political advertisement which followed, advertised as "The Democratic Response."

If you are a Reagan fan, or just unbiased but willing to give anyone in office for just a year his fair chance, there is a good chance that you found the Democratic film, which was produced well in advance, very offensive.

Some Reagan critics like to say "Well, you know he's just an exactor," implying that you can't believe what an actor says or does. So, what did the Democrats do? Why, they went to Hollywood and had their "response" produced right in one of Reagan's old studios.

One commentator pointed out that on the Democratic cinema, a senator indicated Reagan because there were more bankruptcies in 1981 than in any year since 1933. The reverse of that coin is the fact that 1933 was the first year of another president's term: Franklin D. Roosevelt. If the Demos are to lay all the faults of Reagan's first year at Reagan's feet, then they also must be prepared to say that the difficulties during FDR's first year were his fault, and not Herbert, Hoover's.

The public should be aware that the economic mess in which the country finds itself did not happen overnight, nor did it happen just in the last year. Things did not just suddenly go sour when Reagan replaced Carter (by the way, good ole Jimmy's name was not even mentioned in the Democratic "movie" last Tuesday.)

One would think the Democratic response would have dealt on a more logical plane, such as how the states are going to take over such programs as food stamps and other welfare programs, which the president says he will shift from Washington to the

Although most state governments have been opposed to the shifting of such programs into their jurisdiction, there is something good to be said for this: usually, welfare, or any other program, is more adequately administered on the local level than through Washington.

If the tax money which supported these programs were to be returned to the states, we have every confidence that Texas could handle its welfare far better than it has been handled from the banks of the Potomac.



Court Approves New Precinct Boundaries boxes, will be required as a result of

Parmer County Commissioners approved new precinct, voting precinct and Justice of the Peace precinct boundary lines at their regular meeting Monday, January 25.

Changing of the precinct lines was mandated by the Voting Act of 1965, which calls for "one man, one vote," in other words, that every representative have basically the same number of people in their district or precinct.

The re-apportionment project has caused a sweeping change in Precinct four (Lazbuddie's precinct), which now has a corridor running up Highway 214 into the City of Friona. A sizeable area inside Friona has been added to precinct four, to make up the needed population.

Precinct two, which includes Bovina, also added the western side of Friona, in order to bring its population up to the required norm. The Farwell precinct added some rural area to meet the requirements.

Commissioners have attempting to create four precincts with approximately 2,760 people

The plan as approved Monday will now be submitted to the Justice Department for their approval. It was drawn by the law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley.

County Democratic chairman Richard Collard, appearing before the commissioners, told the group "I wish you'd have done it (the reapportionment) a little differently, but since we're forced to do something, I'm supporting you 100 per cent, and will work to see that it (your plan) goes through."

Collard had indicated that he wished the re-apportionment issue could have been completed in 1981, so it would not have had to be "rushed through" on an election year. But members of the court, including County Judge Porter Roberts, assured him that they had been doing everything in their power to get the issue resolved.

It seems that there is always at least one irritant at every social gathering

By irritant, I mean someone who persists in talking while a concert is being held, the National Anthem is being played or while the prayer is being offered, and at sermons, funerals and weddings, alike.

These persons must think that the world will excuse their lack of manners, thereby making it alright for them to be disruptive for everyone who attends.

I had the misfortune of having to sit in front of two such irritants at the All-Region Band Concert last weekend. And, I think that one of the things which made me most irritated was that one of these young people was a band student.

Neither of them was from this county, but were from a neighboring county, and I am sure their band director would have been terribly embarrassed had he known they were acting in such a manner.

They persisted in talking through much of the 5-A band's concert, and when I finally had all I could take and shushed them, one of them decided to act "cute" and pop his gum, then.

I was outraged that high school aged kids would act that way, and especially band kids. I should think that with the discipline one received in most band programs, these students in particular would not dream of acting in such a fashion.

This type of person can, and usually does, show up anywhere, from church to ball games, and most generally makes a fool of himself.

He talks throughout the National Anthem, during the prayers prior to ball games, and also at church, as well as at band concerts and other social gatherings such as class plays.

He, and his kind, are a nuisance to society, as they only make the rest of us who are there to enjoy the concert, sermon or game, find it less enjoyable by their behavior.

There have been times I was tempted to say, "Look, I've paid my money to listen, and you have no right to take that privilege away from me. If you want to talk to your

neighbor, you'll just have to do it somewhere else, because I won't let you ruin my evening."

There is never an excuse for bad manners with anyone and talking during a concert, sermon, prayer, National Anthem, or play, is not a place or time for exception of this

And, should there be any of you out there who are guilty of this type of behavior, I hope you have seen yourselves in this column and will work to right your wrongs.

You are making those who have to sit around you nervous, irritated, and, in some cases, even mad.



Water Is **HPWD** Subject

The High Plains Water District has begun its annual program of measuring the depth to water levels in more than 900 observation wells scattered throughout the fifteen county District area.

Parmer County irrigators may see a blue and white Water District vehicle in the vicinity of their property in the coming weeks while Ken Carver and Jerry Funck of the District staff measure the 97 wells in the District's observation network in Parmer County.

Since most of the wells to be measured are operational irrigation wells, the month of January was chosen to begin observations in order to allow for a dormant period and well recovery from the cone of depression developed during the pumping season. Wells will be measured to find the depth to "static" water level. After measuring, each well will receive a red District identification tag for the owner's information.

Data gained from this program is used for decline rate projections, determining the amount of water left in storage, and very importantly, as a basis for the income-tax depletion allowance claims on landowner's tax returns.

The annual measurement program is expected to be completed in February, weather permitting. Data on individual wells will be available within a few days of completed readings, but tabulated data on the entire network is not expected until mid-year.


Bovina led off with a big 23-13 edge, and scored 13 more points in the second period, to take a halftime lead of 36-22.




