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

Dr. Templin, principal of the Radford School at El Paso, discussed fathers' defects in an address yesterday before a good many fathers—members of the Central Lions Club.

She didn't mince words. She said that she believes that girls should learn to manage money and sometimes she tells fathers that their girl needs only \$1 a week for spending money.

"The father says that's swell," she said. "Then he goes to say goodbye to his daughter and slips her \$10."

Another fault of fathers, Dr. Templin said, is that they don't teach their children good manners. She told of one father who complained because she had corrected his daughter's table man-

ners. She said she told the father: "Your daughter is the only girl I have ever seen who butters her bread with her thumb, and I won't have it."

Dr. Templin also complained that fathers lack integrity and are "masters of the art of alibi." "Father brags how he put over a business deal, with the implication that it was questionable," she said, "but if you press him on it he'll claim it was legal."
