## Rabies Epidemic

TYLER, Tex., March 19, (UP) -A rabies epidemic raged in 27 central Texas today, with more than 100 persons undergoing preventive treatment.

Dr. Kenneth S. Young, state health department veterinarian assigned to this area on a fulltime basis, warned last night that the disease would spread to more than 50 counties before the end of the year unless effective con-

trols are practiced . Young said the disease was most prevalent at present in Kaufman, Houston, Angelina, Henderson and Wood counties.

More than 100 persons had been bitten by rabid dogs and foxes or exposed to rabies in handling livestock. Young said.

An area-wide meeting was held last night at Quitman, Wood Hicks Employed County seat, with farmers voting to plan a campaign against foxes. By Warren Motors Another meeting will be held


