AN INVITATION BY J. ROSS RUCKER

The April 21st Muster Tradition At Ranger Country Club At 2:30

An invitation is extended to all ex-Aggies to attend an open air barbecue at the Ranger Country Club beginning at 2:30 P. M. Friday, April 21, 1950. This occasion is an annual affair where A & M men muster together to commemorate Aggies who have passed on and to observe the anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto—Texans greatest battle victory.

This year on April 21st, A & M men are observing officially for the forty-seventh consecutive year a day which ranks in history as a memorable turning point in the destiny and freedom of the State of Texas. They will come together to pay solemn tribute to their fellow A & M men who have gone before and to honor the troops under General Sam Houston who bludgeoned their way through the Mexican Armies of Santa Anna in the historic Battle of San Jacinto on April 21, 1836.

On April 21, 1903, the A & M College Student Body felt that some ceremony or observance of this Battle was vital to the military spirit upon which the A & M Cadet Corps was founded. The students carried the matter to the highest level of authority. The President, and at that time it was agreed that "Forever Afterwards" April 21st would be a day of musing for all A & M men to pay tribute to the Texans who won their freedom with the grit and raw courage that has symbolized Texans ever since. Also, the students decided that April 21st would be a time to pay homage to all A & M men who have passed on, and that some living comrade would call out "here" when the roll call for the absent was read.

And so it had been over the nearly half a century since that group of students brought to an issue the observance of Texas' Battle for Freedom fought 114 years ago. Each year the muster grows in intensity of purpose and in numbers of A & M men participating. The tradition is symbolical of the great loyalty which binds A & M men to their college and to each other in what is one of the most sincere devotions in the world today.

In the passing of time since the final rifle shot rang out across the rolling prairies along Buffalo Bayou, other battles have been fought by Texans which have added to the April 21st muster tradition. The day has a double significance for A & M men since April 21, 1942, when that little group of twenty-five men joined each other in the tunnel on the Island of Corregidor to muster before returning to their battle posts against the invading Japanese forces.

The April 21st muster is a pledge and responsibility of A & M men which has been handed down to them through the years to carry on. From the courage of that charge at San Jacinto and the unshakable defense of Corregidor has sprung a new luster to man's willingness to give up life itself for a right and just cause. It is a way for A & M men to renew each year their loyalty and unity which constitutes the foundation of their friendship for each other and love for their school, the A & M College of Texas.

New Mercury-Vapor Light System On Tap For Streets Of Eastland

A new street-lighting system is in store for Eastland within the next 60 days, according to I. C. Heck, city manager. A mercury vapor system will replace the lights now being used to light the city streets.

The system will include a complete new installation of standards approximately 26 feet in height. The standards are constructed of steel with a three-foot beam which will support the bulb units. Approximately 59 units will be installed.

Locations of the units will be around the square, from city limits, on Highway 80, to North Walnut, the first street West of Post Office; on Commerce Street from the Coca Cola plant to the City Hall corner; three blocks North and South on Seaman; and one block North and South on Lamar.

The committee in charge of installing the fixtures are Jack Muirhead, and J. H. Rushing. The City Commission gave the green light to the project in its Friday night meeting.

Texas Electric Service will be in charge of maintenance of the lighting system.

Six Of Eight Joyriders Killed

VESTAL, N. Y., April 20 (UP)—Six of a party of eight gay, joy-riding teen-agers were killed last night when their borrowed sedan skidded on wet pavement and crashed head-on into a tractor-trailer.

State Police Lt. Joseph A. Murphy said the car "must have been traveling at least 65 miles an hour."

"The impact tore the motor loose and tossed it 250 feet down the highway," he said. "The bodies were thrown out of the car and we found them anywhere from 45 to 100 feet away from the scene of the crash."

He said "the kids were singing and joking" when the car crashed during a rainstorm while enroute back to nearby Binghamton after a joyride.

All the victims, except the driver, Raymond Scudder, 19, of Owego, were high school students.

The other victims were Donna Pudiak, 17, Ida Diute, 18, Joseph Combs, 14, Patricia Riegel, 16, and James Winfield, 16, all of Binghamton.

John Pudiak, 15, brother of Donna, was discharged from a hospital after treatment for minor abrasions. Kenneth Schwartz, 17, Owego, was hospitalized with a broken leg and other injuries.

The driver of the truck, Louis C. Bolis, 46, of Buffalo, escaped injury.

Dr. Sander Is Silent Over Society Verdict

CONCORD, N. H., April 20 (UP)—Dr. Hermann N. Sander, stripped of his right to practice medicine in New Hampshire despite his acquittal as a mercy slayer, tried to decide today what to do next.

The 41-year-old Candia physician conferred with attorney Louis E. Wyman who won his freedom at the recent murder trial. He may appeal the decision of the State Board of Registration in Medicine of the State Supreme Court. Or he may wait for the opening left him when the board said it would consider his reinstatement two months from now.

The five-man board said Sander's conduct was "morally reprehensible" last Dec. 4 when he injected air into the arm of Mrs. Abbie C. Borroto, 59, a Manchester patient dying of cancer. Sander was acquitted of first degree murder March 9.

Dr. John S. Wheeler of Concord, secretary of the board, said the decision was "unanimous," but that Sander could appeal to the State Supreme Court for reversal of the finding.

The stipulation that Sander could apply for reinstatement after June 19 was described by several New Hampshire doctors as "most unusual." They said under ordinary circumstances when the board revokes a license "No such door is left open."

Nursing a black eye suffered in a skiing fall, Sander greeted the board's decision from his Candia home last night with a curt "no comment." He added that he was "going out to play canasta."

Dr. Sander has refrained from practicing since his acquittal, awaiting the board's decision. Friends said the doctor was borrowing heavily to maintain living expenses. His defense at the trial was reported to have cost \$40,000 and a defense fund started by sympathetic friends raised only \$21,000.

Oil Boom Hits Kansas Town

JETMORE, Kan., April 20 (UP)—Jetmore, with a normal population of 1,000, became a boom town today as oil lease makers swarmed into the community.

Editor Howard Wilson of the Jetmore Republican said the influx of outsiders started after Shell Oil made a discovery on a farm two miles north of the town last Saturday.

Wilson said drillers told him the well would be a good commercial producer.

Jetmore was so jam-packed today that visitors had to drive 40 miles to Dodge City for their meals and to use telephones.

The judging contests at the annual Eastland County Dairy Show to be held Friday April 21, at Fireman Field, is open to any 4-H Club, F.F.A. member, or adult farmer in the county, according to J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent.

Cash prizes will be awarded the first ten winners in each division, A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the Eastland County Dairy Association has announced.

The two judging contests are not to be confused with the judging of the cows on a classification. R. E. Burleson, dairy specialist of the Texas A&M College Extension Service will place the cows.

M. D. Fox, Eastland, Vocational Agricultural Teacher, will be in charge of both the boy and adult judging contest. This contest will pit the skills of participants in selecting good dairy type animals.

Burleson will place the cows in the show on a classification after the two judging contests are over. In this type of show, the animals compete against the ideal

Large Cast Included Announces Civil Service Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for Supply Specialists for filling positions in the fields of general supply, storekeeping and storage, property and stock control, requirements and distribution, surplus property disposal, printing and publications, and supply cataloging. The positions are located in Washington, D. C., and vicinity, and the salaries range from \$1,100 to \$6,400 a year.

To qualify, applicants must have had from 3 to 6 years of experience in the field of supply work for which they apply. The amount and quality of the experience varies with the grade of position. Appropriate education may be substituted for part of the experience. No written test is required. The age limit, eighteen to sixty-two years, are waived to persons entitled to veteran preference.

McDonald, located at Eastland Post Office, from civil-service regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission in Washington, D. C. Applications must be received in the Commission's Washington office not later than May 16, 1950.

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 20 (UP)—A 21-year-old Negro faced life imprisonment today after a district court jury found him guilty of raping a 71-year-old grandmother.

Arthur Lee Snerrod, who still is under indictment for three rape attempts, was so happy at escaping the death penalty the prosecution had asked that he did not plan to seek a new trial.

The verdict was returned late yesterday after the jury sent a note to the court during deliberations, asking if a jury could give a life sentence "and be assured that the defendant will never be free."
