At this time of year on voting years, so many demands are made on your time and attention that I know you become weary, and sometimes, maybe, bored to the extent of tossing the card or the announcement of the candidate for office aside with an "oh well, just another candidate." I know office procedure and management. The first job I held after I graduated from high school was bookkeeper-cashier in a garage and general repair shop which regularly employed eight to 11 men, besides the office staff.

That job was with Montgomery-Ward and Company's mail order department, and I took it because they wanted women to take jobs to release the men holding jobs for military service. We were actually doing men's work, and the two years I worked there I had under my supervision from eight to 35 people—both young men and women.

Since coming back to Gorman I set up my own office which took care of the work of Public Stenographer, Notary Public, map service, news service, general contact and information work, and leasing work during our little oil field this year.

## REMINESCES ON ANNIVERSARY OF UNION OF YANKS, RUSSIANS

EDITORS NOTE: The following dispatch, on the fifth anniversary of the day the Russian and U. S. Armies joined forces on the Elbe, is written by a United Press wire correspondent who was on the scene at the time. He now is UP manager in Berlin.

BERLIN, April 25 (UP)—Five years ago today American and Russian armies racing across shattered and vanquished Nazi Germany met at the Elbe River. It was a great day for the Allies and for the world. Peace was near. The fusing of brotherhood between the East and the West, symbolized by the meeting on the Elbe, would guarantee peace forever. Or almost.

The historic hour was noon, April 25, 1945. Lt. Koe Kotzebue of Houston, Texas, led his U. S. First Army infantry patrol of six men to the west bank of the Elbe. They boarded a creaky old wooden boat and paddled to the east bank. There they met the Russians. Reversing Kipling, the East and the West did meet.

Two Russian officers knew history when they saw it in the making under their noses. They voiced the hope that the meeting would be commemorated each year as a symbol of Russian-American friendship.

Business included the assigning of future programs to members and a discussion concerning the purchase of a public address system. The Board of Directors voted to contribute \$75 toward sending a Rotary Boy Scout to the National Jamboree in Washington. Invocation was by the Rev. Morris Bailey, pastor of the First Methodist Church and the meeting was presided over by Earl Bender, vice-president of the Eastland Rotarians.

## Plenty Of Water, Disposal Plant To Close Soon

"The lake is full of water and there should be an adequate supply to last for another year." So reports I. C. Heck, Eastland City Manager.

The pipeline to the new disposal plant located east of the city, is just about completed and the old plant south of the city will be closed some time this week.

Material is now on hand to run a four-inch pipeline to the north-east part of town to supply that section with a fire hydrant. Here before, the Colored Section of the city has not been supplied with this service.

Eastland streets are soon to be topped with a new coating of gravel.

Inspection is soon to be made of the City Hall and a report of the condition of the auditorium, located on the second floor of the building made. Necessary repairs, making the auditorium safe for civic affairs, are tentatively scheduled for the near future.

## Fire Follows Perryton Grain Elevator Blast

PERRYTON, Tex., April 25 (UP)—A 700,000-bushel grain elevator burned out of control early today following an explosion which rocked this Panhandle city yesterday.

Firemen on the scene said they did not believe there would be another blast in the 110-foot elevator, but the highway patrol roped off one street to safeguard men on duty if the building should topple.

Two men were burned critically. They were Jim Woodard and Don Herring, employees of the Perryton Equity Exchange.

"Don's in a very critical condition," a member of the highway patrol said. "About 85 per cent of his body has been burned. Jim Woodard's in a critical condition, too."

J. L. Eskildsen of Enid, Okla., an insurance inspector, arrived in Perryton last night. He said it would be impossible to extinguish the fire and the only logical thing to do was allow the elevator's contents to smolder away.

The explosion occurred about 2 p. m. yesterday while Woodard and Herring were digging wheat from corners of the pit at the bottom of the concrete elevator.

The blast tossed concrete slabs weighing hundreds of pounds as far as 80 feet and thick smoke billowed from the tall building.

At first authorities believed there would be a second explosion and ordered a six-block square of downtown Perryton blocked off. Traffic on two highways which intersect near the elevator was rerouted.

Grain dust was blamed for the explosion.

## Thornton Out On Bond, Trial Date Has Not Been Set

Bane Thornton, charged with cattle theft in Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood's court, is free under a \$1500 bond, according to the Eastland County Sheriff's office. He is awaiting action of the Grand Jury concerning his case.

Thornton is accused of stealing two cows from a local merchant and selling them through an auction ring in San Angelo. The cows were identified by a brand inspector who was present at the auction. He notified Sheriff J. B. Williams and Williams, acting on the tip, apprehended the suspect in Brownwood.

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## MEDIATORS CALL SESSION IN FRANTIC EFFORT TO HALT WALKOUT

### Traffic Deaths Near Texarkana Eight In 5 Days

TEXARKANA, Tex., April 25 (UP)—The death of three persons in an automobile-trail collision at a Texarkana grade crossing last night brought the number of traffic fatalities in this area to eight within the past five days.

Five persons died last week when a car skidded into a fire chief's automobile and struck a third car near Texarkana.

The victims of last night's tragedy were Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Schrader, both about 22, and Mrs. Betty Tidwell, 21, all of Clarksville, Texas.

Witnesses said that the automobile struck the second section of a Kansas City Southern Passenger train which was en route to the Texarkana Railroad Station. The car, thrown about 30 feet, was demolished.

The train stopped for several minutes but proceeded to the station after a checkup revealed it had not been damaged and none of its passengers had been injured.

Relatives of the victims said they were driving from Clarksville to Texarkana to go skating.

## Printer Strike Shuts Down Paper

TEXARKANA, April 25 (UP)—The Texarkana Gazette's Tuesday morning edition did not appear today because of a printing problem.

Editor J. Q. Mahaffey said that the Texarkana local of the International Typographical Union went into a "continued closed session" at 9 P. M. and when the printers had not returned to their machines by midnight plans to publish the paper as usual were abandoned.

## Auto Tag Sales At All-Time High In Eastland Co.

Automobile tag sales have reached an all-time high in Eastland County, Neal Day, County Tax Assessor-Collector has announced.

"There were 9,469 tags sold, amounting to \$156,762.65, up till April 15," Day said.

"The first \$50,000 collected may be kept by the county to use on its road and bridge program," Day said. The remainder, up to \$175,000, will be divided 50-50, with the Texas State Highway Department. After the tag sales reach \$175,000 the county will receive 50 cents for the first 1,000 tags sold and 40 cents for the next 9,000. This is merely a collection fee," Day added.

A breakdown of vehicles licensed shows that 7,210 passenger cars were tagged, bringing in \$86,459.78; commercial, 1,083, \$42,280.97; farm trucks, 769, \$7,271.02; truck-tractor, 70, \$8,713.25; trailers, 224, \$10,776.98; house trailers, 20, \$190.70; motorcycles, 40, \$200; and dealer's tags, 80, \$870.

The A. T. and T. said executives and supervisory employees would handle maintenance jobs and emergency long distance calls. The company classifies as emergency calls those made in connection with fires, floods, wrecks, storms, accidents, sickness and death.

Calls also would be accepted for aid from police, fire, hospital, doctors, and government functions.

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## ASK REMOVAL OF KANSAS CITY POLICE COMMISSIONERS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 25 (UP)—Replacement of the four appointed members of the Kansas City Board of Police Commissioners was demanded today in a letter from the Chamber of Commerce to Gov. Forrest Smith.

The chamber, making known the contents of its letter written April 21 and received by the governor's office in Jefferson City last Saturday, specifically stressed its dissatisfaction with J. L. (Tuck) Milligan, chairman of the board, and Sheridan Farrell.

Farrell, a hotel manager and one of two Commissioners appointed by Smith, submitted his resignation to the governor the same day the chamber's letter was received in Jefferson City. The Board of Directors of the

Chamber of Commerce, the chamber's letter read, "expresses to you as the Governor of the State of Missouri and to the citizens of Kansas City, its lack of confidence in the Police Commissioners of Kansas City, especially Mr. J. L. (Tuck) Milligan as president and Mr. Sheridan Farrell as a member."

The letter commended the efforts of Mayor William E. Kemp, ex-officio member of the police board who demanded a state investigation of the police department following the spot playing April 5 of Charles Binaggio and Charles Gargotta.

Among the reasons listed by the chamber for the lack of confidence were "general knowledge of the friendship and open and frequent and cordial association of Milligan and Farrell with Charles Binaggio and with the elements of which Charles Binaggio was leader, and the significance of these associations to the public to members of the underworld and especially to police officers."

In the letter the chamber expressed the belief that the governor is "not aware of the nationwide ridicule and shame to which Kansas City and its citizens have been exposed and we urge you to consider the business damage, as well as the moral and social harm

## TRUMAN LABELS RED CHARGES AS POLITICS

WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—President Truman came up today with a one-word answer to Republican charges that his administration is a haven for Communists: "Politics."

Mr. Truman defended his loyalty program in a speech last night before the 30th annual meeting of the Federal Bar Association, an organization of government lawyers.

"Not a single person who has been adjudged to be a Communist or otherwise disloyal remains on the government payroll today," he said.

At no point did the president specifically mention Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., or other Republicans who have accused the administration of being soft with Communists. But he told the lawyers:

"I have been surprised to see how much ignorance and misunderstanding there is about the loyalty program—even on the part of people who should know better. It has occurred to me that perhaps they do know better—that perhaps there is some element of politics in their recusations."

Mr. Truman belittled the influence of Communists in this country.

"The greatest threat to us comes not from the Communists in this country where they are a noisy, but small and universally despised group," he said. "The greatest threat comes from Communist imperialism abroad where the center of its military might and economic strength lies."

"The real danger is that Communism might overrun other free nations and thus strengthen itself for an ultimate attack against us."

Emphasizing that his administration fights Communism "with action and not just words," the president revealed that the government is investigating over 1,000 citizens for possible denaturalization proceedings on subversive ground.

He noted that 138 persons "are under orders of deportation on grounds involving Communism."

Mr. Truman paid tribute to the "able and distinguished people" of the FBI, the Loyalty Review Board and the Civil Service Commission which results from this breakdown of police administration.

mission for their efforts against Communists.

"They know," he said, "that the job cannot be done by publicly denouncing men as 'Communists' without having evidence to support such charges, or by blackening the character of persons because their views are different from those of the accuser, or by hurling sensational accusations based on gossip, hearsay or hunch."

"No known instance of Communist subversion—or any other kind investigated," he said. "No case where the facts warranted has gone unprosecuted."

McCarthy was quick to reply.

"The most disturbing thing about Mr. Truman's talk," he said, "was his apparent delusion that the entire government structure is his own personal toy and that anyone who tries to clean it up does so for the sole purpose of embarrassing Mr. Truman."

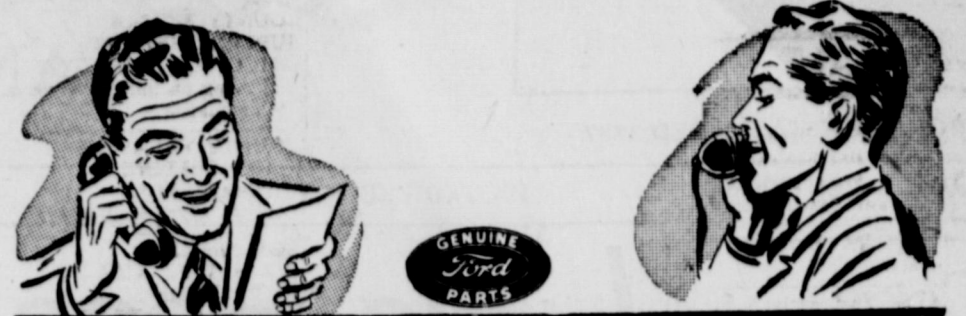

## TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS

**AUSTIN, Tex., April 25 (UP)**—March was a bad month for employers, the Texas Employment Commission noted today, with 3,940 workers involved in labor disputes during the 30-day period. The figure was highest since last October, when 4,200 workers were involved, the commission said.

**HARLINGEN, Tex., April 25 (UP)**—The House Un-American Activities committee may investigate reports that the border patrol has mistreated Latin-Americans, an Edinburg attorney said today. Sid Hardin said Louis J. Russell, senior investigator for the committee, told him steps already had been taken on conducting an inquiry.

Hardin, in a letter to the committee said he believed the incidents were "Communist inspired, brought to a head by labor agitators who have put pressure on the border patrol."

**WICHITA FALLS, April 25 (UP)**—Horace Robinson, 60, today faced a life sentence following his trial for the murder of oilman Arnold Thom, member of a pioneer Wichita County family.

A 78th district court jury ruled Robinson was guilty after two hours and 40 minutes of deliberating yesterday.

Thom was shot to death last Jan. 27 as he sat on his father's front porch. Robinson's defense pleaded insanity.

**HOUSTON, April 25 (UP)**—Gene Cleghorn, 16, died of a fractured skull yesterday after he was pinned under the trunk of a falling tree. Neighbors said heavy rains had loosened the tree, which had grown to 40 feet.

**EDINBURG, April 25 (UP)**—The Rio Grande Valley marked down its 16th polio fatality of the year today.

Latest victim of the epidemic was Robert Swanzey, 10. He died yesterday shortly after he had been admitted to Edinburg's Polio Clinic.

## CZECH PRESIDENT SAYS REORGANIZATION DUE

**Prague, Czechoslovakia, April 25 (UP)**—The official news agency today published a statement by President Klement Gottwald announcing a major reorganization of the Czechoslovak government.

Minister of Defense Ludvik Svoboda was appointed Vice Prime Minister and Chief of the State Office for Education and Sports.

Vice Prime Minister Zdenek Fierlinger was made head of the Church Office.

Minister of Justice Dr. Alexei Cepicka was appointed Minister of Defense.

Dr. Stefan Reis, head of the presidential office, was appointed Minister of Justice.

The presidential announcement said the changes in the government were made "at the desire" of the officials concerned.

Minister of Information Vacek Kopecky, who also had been head of the Office for Education and

Sports, retained his ministerial post.

The most important of the changes announced by Gottwald seemed to be the replacement of Svoboda by Gottwald's son-in-law, Cepicka.

As Minister of Justice Cepicka was believed responsible for the anti-church campaign and the wave of trails of "American spies."

The announcement that Cepicka has taken over the Defense Ministry ended rumors that a Russian general would be "invited" to the post as had been done in Poland.

The appointment of Fierlinger to the State Church Office was believed to mean a continuation of the drive started by Cepicka in church-state relations.

As head of the Leftist Social Democrats, Fierlinger played a major role in the Communist seizure of power.

The announcement said Gottwald's action was taken "upon the proposal of Premier Antonin Zapotocky."

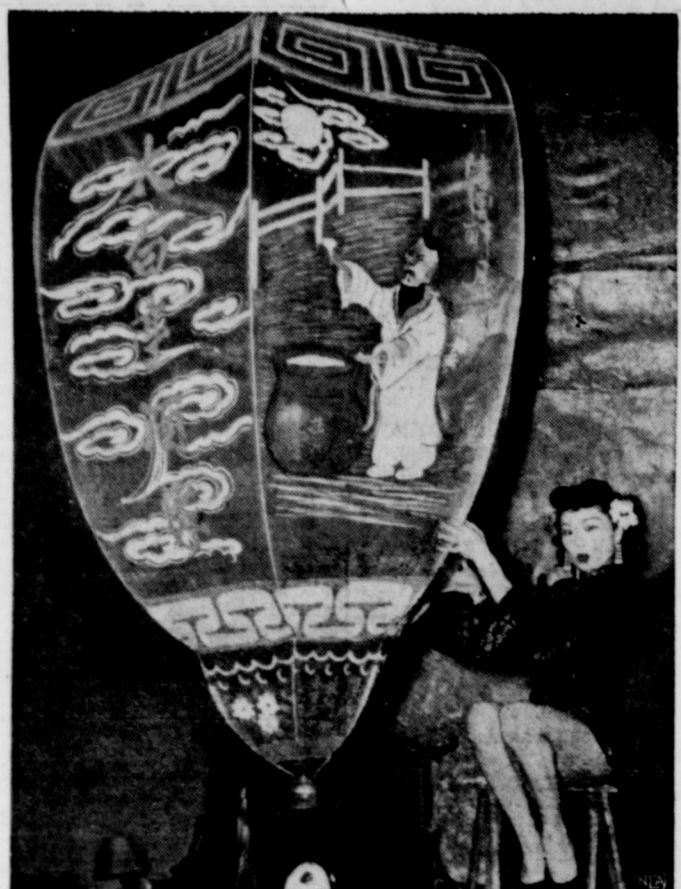
