### **Old Sewage Beds To Be Used** For Burying Trash Disposal

Work on the new sewer pipe line, connecting the south part of town to the disposal plant, has been completed and tie-in to the main line was made this week

Installed at a cost of approximately \$5,500 ,the line makes it possible to cover the old sewage beds located southeast of town on the branch of the Leon River.

Included in the installation of the 2,200 feet of line is a pump house and a seperator unit. The pump house is equipped with two centrifugal automatic pumps that boost the refuge on to the plant. The seperator unit is enclosed in a 16 foot deep trench. Both units are cemented throughout to prevent leakage.

#### SAVED \$2,500

By using bricks from the old inenerator east of town and personnel from the regular city employees, Eastland saved some \$2,-500 on the project. It took about two months to complete the in-
